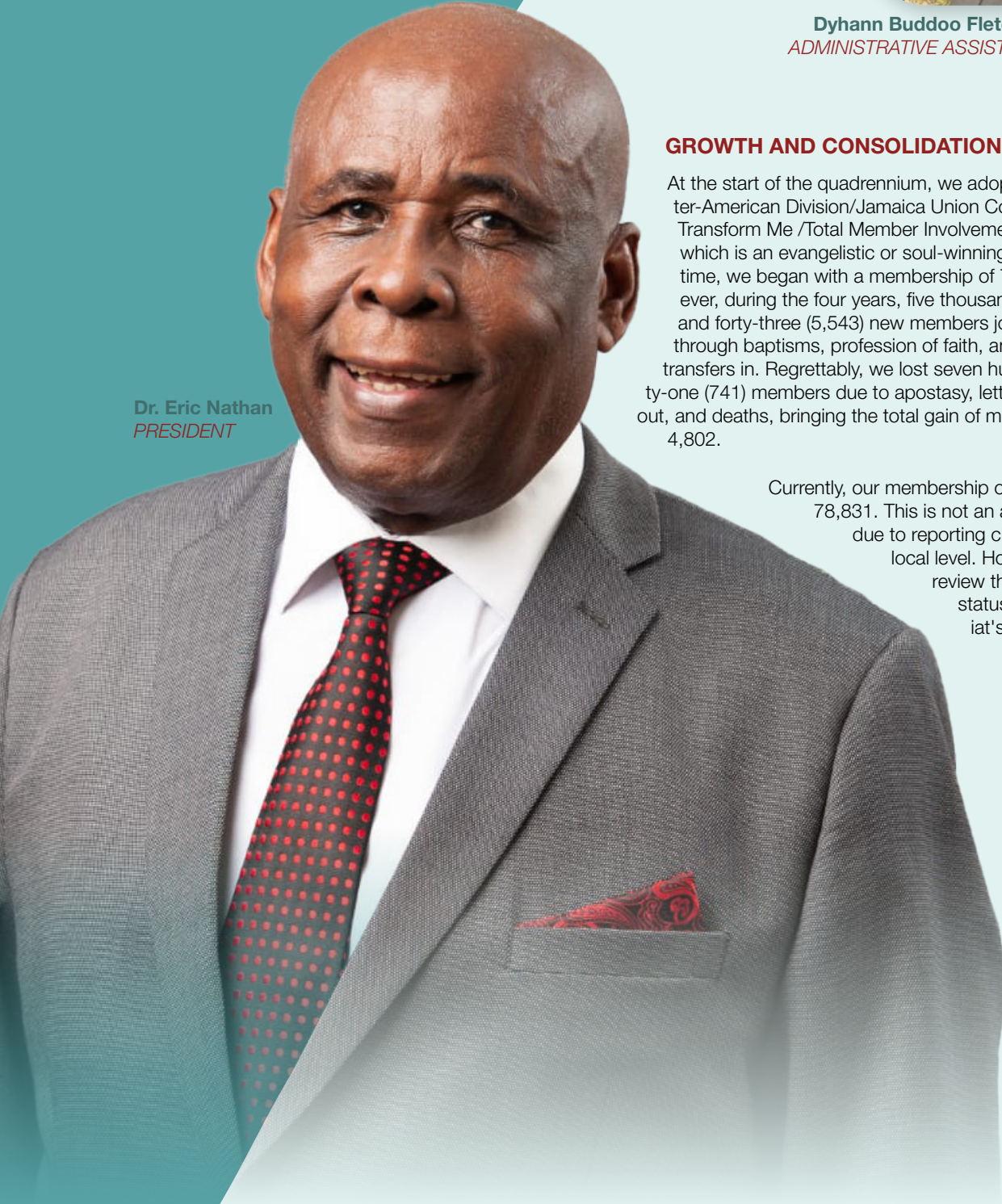
As we gather to deliberate on the agenda of this Session, you are invited to warmly greet, fellowship and pray for the Holy Spirit's guidance throughout this process.

The Administration of the East Jamaica Conference is guided by the strategic plans of the Jamaica Union Conference, which outline: Growth and Consolidation, Family Wellness, Christian Stewardship, Christian Education and Church in the Community.

However, we use this opportunity to briefly look at the growth of the Church in this region.

GROWTH AND CONSOLIDATION

At the start of the quadrennium, we adopted the Inter-American Division/Jamaica Union Conference's Lord Transform Me /Total Member Involvement initiative, which is an evangelistic or soul-winning effort. At that time, we began with a membership of 74,029. However, during the four years, five thousand, five hundred and forty-three (5,543) new members joined the Church through baptisms, profession of faith, and letters of transfers in. Regrettably, we lost seven hundred and forty-one (741) members due to apostasy, letters of transfers out, and deaths, bringing the total gain of membership to 4,802.

Currently, our membership on our books is 78,831. This is not an accurate picture due to reporting challenges at the local level. However, you may review the membership status in the Secretariat's Report in detail.

Church Organization and Dedication

During the quadrennium, the following Companies were organized into churches:

- **The New Kingston Fellowship on January 22, 2022.**
- **Pembroke Hall Company on March 28, 2022.**

Additionally, in honour and to the glory of God, two churches were rededicated:

- **Florence Hill on September 28, 2019.**
- **Hagley Park on December 3, 2021.**

Presently, there are thirty-one (31) pastoral districts, ninety-eight (98) organized churches, five (5) companies, one (1) branch Sabbath School, bringing a total of 104 congregations being served by twenty-four (24) ordained district Pastors, eight (8) Licentiate Ministers, four (4) Ministerial Interns and two (2) Evangelists/Bible workers.

The East Jamaica Conference Administration adopted five Strategic Pillars to guide our operation and influence our mission. These are:

- 1 **S – Spirituality**
- 2 **O – Ownership**
- 3 **F – Family**
- 4 **F – Fellowship**
- 5 **F – Faithfulness**

This report will share essential information on each director's and lay member's stewardship within the five strategic pillars. Additionally, I will highlight other aspects of Ministry based on the voted decisions of the EJC Executive Committee.

SPIRITUALITY

The Administration joins the leadership of the world Church in promoting Total Member Involvement. We support the idea that the Sabbath School and Personal Ministries Department is the "heart and lifeblood" of the Church; it includes every member and prospective convert. For the period under review, every method of Evangelism was encouraged. Great emphasis has been placed on Sabbath School and Small group evangelism. The Administration,

however, also promoted the importance of large evangelistic campaigns.

"I Will Go" Evangelistic Emphasis 2020-2021

Under the General Conference (GC), Quinquennial theme, "I Will Go", we began with great expectations and objectives for a massive onslaught against the enemy in 2020. Interestingly, we were organizing a mega Conference-wide online evangelistic series with guest presenter Pastor Abraham Jules when COVID-19 announced its entrance.

We were later reminded that "trust in God" must always be our watchword. On October 3 -17, 2020, another grand evangelistic opportunity came with the Jamaica Union's "Let's Talk About Him" Evangelistic Online Series with speaker Pastor Dane Fletcher. This introduced several other virtually-staged evangelistic series in 2021, including: "Tune-Up, Sounding Our Highest Praise" with Pastor Jermain Johnson; the Girls of Eloquence Moral and Standards, GEMS evangelistic campaign titled "Go PR2: Proclaim, Reclaim, Retain, Others for Christ;" The ASI Missionaries, "Increase Its Already Done", and the final campaign to end the series was "Christ, the Cross and His Coming Online Evangelistic Series" led by three of our most outstanding Lay Preachers, Elders Noel Jumpp, Noel Morgan and Basil Powell.

The year 2022 welcomed the Breaking the Evangelistic Glass Ceiling Series, IAD Centennial Anniversary Initiatives with our first campaign, 'Footprints of Hope.'

With the five English Speaking Unions of the Inter-American Division involved, International Evangelist Pastor Glen O Samuels preached with power and authority, resulting in "breaking the evangelistic glass ceiling" baptismal acces-

sions of over five thousand souls. In this program, the East Jamaica Conference now continues to build on God's blessing with over 518 precious infants won to Christ.

From 2018 to 2022, we helped over thirty-five churches establish community Bible Schools. Through the EJC School of

Small Groups Ministry strategy and the Jethro principle have been divinely designed. Hundreds of small groups continue to nurture faithfulness and engender soul-winning achievements. Thank God for the exemplary leadership of Elders Noel Morgan and Samuel Smiley, who, among others, continue to blaze the trail in small groups training, practice and emphasis in this Conference.

School of Evangelism

The Administration commends Pastor Carl Cunningham, the Director of the Sabbath School and Personal Ministries Department, for his passion for leading the School of Evangelism. To empower the membership of EJC, he has forged a partnership with the Personal Ministries Department of Jamaica Union in a massive training program in Discipleship, Reconciliation and Retention for "Mission, Growth and Consolidation" during this COVID-19 Pandemic.

Possibility Ministries and The Jamaica Disabilities Act

In keeping with the Gospel Commission to reach everyone, the EJC Sabbath School Department and some of our members have been very deliberate in seeking to carry on

the Ministry and passion of Christ for persons with disabilities. We have established the EJC Possibility Ministries; engaged our constituency in much training, education and special efforts in this area of Ministry. Thankfully, we have partnered in the founding and establishing of the first Church for the Deaf, the Portmore Seventh-day Adventist Deaf Congregation.

Prayer and Spiritual Convocations

This Administration recognizes that each member needs to have a closer walk with God. Therefore the concept of effort-focused Ministry was encouraged among pastors and members. This Ministry encouraged members to identify their spiritual gifts and make an effort to use these gifts for the glory of God. We worked with the understanding that for everyone who makes an effort to do his best, God promises that He would take responsibility for the result.

Therefore, the high content of spiritual experience was realized through Camp Meetings, Youth Congresses, Conventions, Weeks of Prayer, Day of Prayer for the Nation and days of fasting and prayer. In many cases, these special prayer emphases were done within the context of evangelistic campaigns and church revivals leading to baptisms.

OWNERSHIP

In an effort to encourage the principle of ownership among our members, the administration sought to organize individuals according to their Spiritual Gifts and talents, resulting in the formation of different ministries and committees that provide essential services to the church. Among the various volunteer groups are the EJC Wellness committee comprising the Social Workers, Counsellors, Psychologists, and Guidance Counselors; the Conference-Wide Development Management Committee, (CWDMC) Adventist Laymen's Services & Industries (ASI); the Good Samaritan Inn (GSI); the Adventist Health Professionals Associations (AHPA) and Health Volunteers (AHVA) and the Communication Production, Team. In 2021 the Legal Aid Clinic (LAC) and Strategic Development Committee (SDC) started.

Conference-Wide Development Management Committee (CWDMC)

Under the Chairmanship of Elder Desmond Young and a committee of fifteen Adventist professionals and experts in the field of building construction, the CWDMC was instructed to see to the completion of unfinished churches in the Conference; to oversee and advise the Administration on how to deal with the construction and maintenance of buildings and to help with the development of the Phillipsfield campsite in St Thomas.

We are happy to report that over the period, CWDMC saw an inflow of over \$114M and over \$105M:

The accomplishments of CWDMC are too many to mention, but in summary, their work included the following:

- **Church renovation and building activities**
- **School renovation and building projects at Kingsway, New Hope and Miramar**
- **Welfare and COVID assistance**
- **Camp Phillipsfield projects**
- **Procurement of two Block Making Machines**
- **Assistance with the acquisition of Mae's building at Pembroke Hall**
- **Help with the renovation of EJC Virtual Church.**

The extensive work of the CWDMC has saved EJC millions of dollars in fees, voluntary labour and General Consumption Tax waivers granted through the registered charitable organization of the Good Samaritan Inn Foundation (GSI).

Camp Phillipsfield

One of the outstanding accomplishments of this Administration is the development of the campsite at Phillipsfield in St. Thomas. This campsite is intended to cater to our members' physical, social, and spiritual needs. It was heartwarming to see the contribution of the constituency in working together for the clearing of lands to establish our campsite.

Thanks to the Conference-Wide Development Management Committee (CWDMC) and volunteers from across the Conference. We were able to see the campsite becoming a reality. With the construction of temporary bathroom facilities, a kitchen and tents, we could conduct summer camps to empower our youth.

Strategic Development Committee (SDC)

The Strategic Development Committee was voted into operation by the EJC Executive Committee in June 2020 with Chairman Bro. Errol Holmes and nine (9) Adventist profes-

signals. The committee's vision is to examine and propose a developmental plan for the EJC headquarters and its adjoining property at 6 Brynmar Avenue, Kingston 8.

After several meetings with EJC leaders across its constituency, the two-building designs for the renovation of the EJC headquarters and the building of apartments at 6 Brynmar Avenue were accepted. The SDC emphasizes that the renovation of the headquarters will better equip EJC for Ministry, provide an environmentally healthy space for

One Sabbath each year, ASI organizes Public Campus Ministries Day, where all SDA university students are allowed to worship and fellowship. all members, particularly the youth, and promote a robust stream of none-tithe income to fund its operations.

The two-building proposals were shared and accepted by a vote by the Jamaica Union Conference Executive Committee. The Inter-American Division also approved the two projects. The SDC aims to implement the two projects in phases.

Adventist Laymen's Services & Industries (ASI)

The Adventist Lay Persons Services and Industries (ASI) is a lay ministry run by Adventist church members who have a passion for sharing Christ in the marketplace, where they spend their time engaged in gainful employment. The Administration expresses gratitude to Elders Cecil Foster and Alfred Thomas and their committee, who served the constituency during the quadrennium.

While the ASI East Jamaica Chapter has provided collaborative Ministry in the marketplace, one particular highlight of their Ministry is that they accept the responsibility of ministering to all Seventh-day Adventist students attending universities in Kingston. At the beginning of each school year, during registration, there is an ASI booth present where SDA students are welcomed and presented with

Good Samaritan Inn (GSI)

The Administration of the East Conference (EJC) is proud of the Ministry offered at the Good Samaritan Inn (GSI) under the leadership of Elders Vermont Murray and Gavin Lowe.

The GSI is the flagship Community Services programme in EJC and Jamaica Union by extension. It is operated in partnership with the EJC ASI Ministry. GSI was organized to provide meals, medical care, counselling and bathing facilities for those who need it most. The GSI facility also serves as a temporary place of refuge for females who have been abused.

The GSI has refurbished its facilities during the quadrennium to accommodate its feeding programme better. In addition, they have benefited from volunteer services received from medical institutions and universities abroad. Additionally, the facility was outfitted with four dental chairs and equipment to provide dental services to those in the inner city of downtown Kingston and its surrounding communities.

We were pleased to know the Government of Jamaica recognizes the value and the contribution of GSI to nation-building. As a result, GSI was used as a vaccination centre where many of our government leaders and citizens received their COVID-19 vaccination.

Mae's Building Acquisition – Pembroke Hall Property

The EJC Administration learnt that the Government of Jamaica is making plans to develop the area surrounding the GSI. Hence, the Administration was cautioned against the

future development of the GSI. Against this background, a request was made through the Jamaica Union Conference to the General Conference to use a portion of the funds donated toward the GSI to assist in purchasing Mae's Building located in Pembroke Hall, Kingston. This building is now a place of worship for the Pembroke Hall Seventh-day Adventist Church and will be used as a centre of influence to carry forward the mission of the Church in that community.

The Music Ministry

Recognizing the power and value that music has on the mind and how music can influence behaviour change, the Administration reached out to the Ministry of National Security, offering assistance in reducing crime and violence in Jamaica through an initiative called Instruments for Change. The goal is to engage at-risk youth in meaningful activities through music.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Adiese Jonas Murphy, Instruments for Change was launched on December 29, 2019, at the National Heroes Circle, which encouraged individuals to donate instruments for the teaching of music in our churches, and schools with particular attention to inner-city communities.

This initiative was well on its way but was interrupted by the COVID-19 Pandemic. Hence, the Instruments for Change initiative was modified for the virtual audience to include the teaching of music and voice lessons offered free of cost on the EJC Virtual Church platform.

The Education Department

I must commend Dr. Donna Brown for her commitment to developing Seventh-day Adventist Christian Education in the East Jamaica Conference. She subscribes to the philosophy that the goal of education and redemption is one, and it is for this reason, that she encourages her teachers to prepare their students not only for a place in this world but for the world to come.

The Education Department has developed its Spiritual Master Plan; as a result, a total of 65 persons were baptized during the period 2018 - 2022. As it relates to the registration of students, steady growth was observed at the start of the quadrennium. With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, a decline in enrollment was evident. However, the 2021/2022 school term is seeing schools such as Hagley Park, Miramar, Kingsway and New Hope experiencing an increase in enrolment. The Woodford Preparatory School enrolment has declined over the past three years, and with a new Principal, Mrs. Iona Hyde-Newland, plans are in place to try and improve the enrolment for the upcoming year.

During the quadrennium, an average of approximately 83% of our students were placed in traditional high schools. For the Grade 4, Literacy and Numeracy external examination, over 95% of our students maintained the Mastery Level. Special commendations to the Kingsway Preparatory School, which in 2018, from a list of over 262 Preparatory Schools, was ranked 48th on the island and was labeled a Gold Standard School by the Gold Standard Preparatory School Guide.

Also, commendations to the Hagley Park Junior Schools' Challenge team for their hard work and dedication in making it to round 2 in the 2021 TVJ Junior Schools' Challenge Quiz competition. "Hats off" to the committed teachers for their hard work and consistency in the preparation of the

students.

The Kingsway High School recorded an average pass rate of approximately 70% over the past four (4) years. Four (3) subject areas, namely: Food, Nutrition & Health, Information Technology, and Physical Education, have seen 100% passes over the four years.

Accreditation

All our schools were able to complete their accreditation exercise for this quadrennium. Kingsway High had its accreditation assessment done in December 2018 and received three (3) years of accreditation status. In September and October 2019, Hagley Park, Kingsway, Miramar, New Hope and Woodford Preparatory Schools had their accreditation exercise conducted. Commendation to the Miramar School family for reaching such a significant milestone in completing their first accreditation exercise.

Teachers' Commissioning

In November 2021, 12 teachers, including Dr. Donna Brown, the Education Director of the Conference, were Certified and Commissioned by the Jamaica Union and, by extension, the Inter- American Division.

Infrastructural development

Over the past quadrennium, tremendous efforts have been made to improve all our schools' physical plant. With the assistance of the Conference-wide Development (CWD) Committee, five (5) additional classrooms were constructed at the Kingsway High School. The facility now hosts the Literacy Laboratory, Music Room, Auto Mechanic Room and a "state of the art" Food & Nutrition Laboratory. In collaboration with the Andrews Memorial SDA Church, Mrs. Novellette Tai and the Alumni Associations, the CWD committee also renovated the Science Laboratories. The Chemistry, Biology, Physics, and Integrated Science students now have comfortable, fully-equipped facilities to conduct their experiments. Due to the success of the "Mediathon 2020" hosted by all four (4) chapters of the Kingsway Alumni Associations, the school was able to renovate the Information Technology Laboratory, purchasing a new server, desktop computers, laptops for teachers to use for online classes and the re-painting of the room.

Communication Department

The Communication Department's goal is to represent the work of Christ and His Church in the best possible light through the use of contemporary technologies and other methods of communication.

The EJC Administration appreciates the hardworking Elder Phillip Castell and team for positioning EJC in a favourable light. As we observed, the Communication Department was able to achieve most of its goals and objectives through an Integrated Marketing Approach that capitalized on the use of Marketing, Public Relations, and Digital technology to enhance the reach of the everlasting gospel message.

One of the proud accomplishments of the Communication Department for the period under review is the establishment of the EJC Virtual Church, which currently has almost Forty-nine Thousand subscribers to our platform.

This came as a proactive response to the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. While churches were forced to close their doors and were unable to meet in the sanctuary, the Communication Department, through the assistance of individuals with mass-communication and information technology skills and several young volunteers, made worship possible through the EJC Virtual Church and JA-Adventist Online.

New Program Content for our YouTube Channel

The EJC Virtual Church YouTube channel created eight new programme contents, which provided inspiring sermons,

testimonies, and songs of praise to God during the difficult COVID-19 pandemic. The eight new programmes created are:

- (1) **EJC Virtual Church Sabbath Program**
- (2) **Youth Mission Live**
- (3) **O Give Thanks**
- (4) **EJC Virtual Church Bible Class**
- (5) **Instruments for Change**
- (6) **Mind Your Health**
- (7) **A New Beginning**
- (8) **It's All Connected.**

Thanks to our friends and members at home and abroad who assisted the Administration in purchasing equipment for more professional production. Today the EJC Virtual Church is ministering to thousands of individuals worldwide.

Public Affairs and Religious Liberty Department (PARL)

The Administration of East Jamaica Conference stands in solidarity with Elder Phillip Castell in the work of the Public Affairs and Religious Liberty Department, which is designed to build bridges to solve conflicts which arise, especially with people of faith in the workplace. In addition, the PARL department works mainly with governments, internal organizations and religious authorities. Their responsibilities deal primarily with human rights legislation, and they are called upon, on most occasions, to intervene when our members find themselves being discriminated against in schools and the workplace because of their strict observance of the biblical Sabbath.

During the period under review, PARL department managed to accomplish the following:

1. **Promoted Religious Liberty Day across the constituency each year in January as required by the world church.**
2. **Conducted Religious Liberty Consultations and Workshops each year.**
3. **Reintroduced the "Ambassador Training Program" in EJC - 2019**
4. **Defended the rights of members who were faced with challenges at work and school due to their observance of the Seventh-day Sabbath.**

5. **We collaborated with the West Jamaica Conference to have a joint Religious Liberty Congress on January 15, 2021, via EJC Virtual Church.**
6. **Held Religious Liberty Day Service on EJC Virtual Church on April 9, 2022.**

FAMILY WELLNESS

The Family Ministries Department

The Administration is pleased with the work of the Family Ministries Department and its leader, Elder Claudette Genas. The Family Ministries team has led out in ministering to the needs of the families within our churches and in the communities to encourage family wellness.

The plans from the department have seen the successful implementation of programmes and meaningful life-changing activities in addressing the needs of family members through:

- **Widows and Widowers Ministry**
- **Wellness and Counselling Service (Grief Seminars)**
- **Adventist Single Adult Ministry (ASAM)**
- **Committed Wives Ministry**
- **Committed Husbands Ministry**
- **Couples in Action Moments**
- **Men's Ministry**

Other enrichment activities executed through the Family Life department included Seminars, Couples' Recommitment Services, Retreats, Family Life Week Celebrations, Parenting forums and Special Sabbath celebrations which are all completed in collaboration with the local congregation and a few with the wider organizations, Jamaica Union Conference and the World Church.

Children and Adolescence Ministries

The Children's and Adolescence Ministries Director is committed to empowering its local leaders to be relevant and current. As such, seventy (70) certified leaders from the local Church assisted with conducting seminars and presentations to improve leadership quality at the local church level. This has helped the department to achieve the following activities during the quadrennium:

1. **Assign every child, 0 – 14, a church**

'Uncle' or 'Auntie' for mentorship.

2. **Encourage the inclusion of children in all programmes of the Church.**
3. **Increase the number of child preachers by at least ten (10) annually.**
4. **Engage the children in various 'discipleship' activities.**
5. **Conduct children's baptisms, especially during May.**
6. **Train and provide direction to engage parents and children with the knowledge and skills for personal growth now and in future years.**
7. **Teach leaders how to win the affection of children to draw them to Christ.**
8. **Make Church more child-friendly to help kids foster a closer relationship with Jesus.**

Conventions

Children's Convention is a recurrent feature on the Conference's calendar. The main objective of these conventions is to encourage spiritual growth through the spoken word, display talents, and foster good Christian fellowship. Annual consultations for Children and Adolescents' Ministries leaders were held face to face in 2019 for all zones; three in Kingston and the other in St. Thomas. After that, because of the pandemic, consultations were held via Zoom.

Child Month Baptisms

Between 2018 – 2022 the call continues in the constituency to engage our children in Bible study to equip them to make thoughtful, Spirit-guided decisions. As a result, approximately 300 children were baptized over the period.

Women in Evangelism and Leadership Convention

The women are committed to conducting evangelistic campaigns, leading or assisting in small groups and seminars, befriending their neighbours/ work associates and others and finding opportunities to lead them to Christ.

Girls of Eloquence, Morals and Standards (GEMS)

Girls together. GEMS forever going to the kingdom together!

The Girls of Eloquence Morals and Standards Ministry started in 2011 under the leadership of Elder Claudette Genas. This youth arm of the Women's Ministry department is responsible for mentoring young girls 12 years and older,

teaching them to utilize their God-given abilities while celebrating and affirming their journey from childhood through to womanhood.

Between 2019 and 2022, the EJC GEMS accomplished several significant milestones as they continued to be involved in the Ministry's spiritual, physical, mental, and social dimensions. Some activities held during the period were: Rap sessions, Toastmasters Training, GEMS retreats at Golden Acres, mentors' seminar, and attendance at JAMU International Women's Conference in Mandeville (2019), where GEMS from all five conferences attended.

The EJC Administration salutes the late Elder Joan Clarke, EJC Women's Ministries Chair and Veteran retreat coordinator. We continue to pray for the families who mourn.

Men's Ministry

The Men's Ministries Department of the Seventh-day Adventist Church was established to address the specific concerns and needs of the male membership population in our churches. It is an international Ministry aiming to support men in their roles as leaders, fathers, husbands, mentors and committed Christians.

A Men's Ministry Convention was held in Zone 4 on June 15, 2019, at the Morant Bay SDA Church during the quadrennium. The Divine service speaker was Dr. Gary Buddo-Fletcher, Chief Chaplain of the Jamaica Constabulary Force. Other speakers during the afternoon segment included Medical Doctor, Bongelo Gombele and Dental Surgeon, Dr. Andrew Phillips.

The "Alpha" of BEAMS

The appellation Brothers of Excellence Attaining Morals and Standards (BEAMS) is uniquely peculiar to the Jamaica Union and was born in East Jamaica Conference. The name was coined to provide a unique branding, which is meant to reflect the image that every young male should seek to portray a good standard of dress, speech, academic attainment, and morals.

The name BEAMS was suggested by Bro. Dave Allen of the North Street SDA Church. His thinking was that males, like "BEAMS" in a building, give support to the roof or floor. In the same way, young males should be mentored for the role of being "sturdy timber or metal" that will give support to the family.

Youth Ministry

The Administration expresses appreciation to Pastor Ray Davis for his contribution to the Youth Ministries department. We commend Pastor Bryan Shaw, who has taken the baton and is making his contribution to empowering the youths of our Conference. Pastor Davis migrated to Canada on January 1, 2020, to join his family and further his education.

According to a report from the Jamaica Union Conference, East Jamaica Conference has the highest percentage of young people among all five Conferences in Jamaica.

The primary objectives of the Adventist Youth Ministry

department are the salvation and service to our youths and also equipping them for service to God and others. For the period under review, the Youth Ministries Department has provided training and investiture services for Master Guides, Senior Youth Leaders, Pathfinders and Adventurers. In addition, the following activities were held: Bible Reading and Quiz Competitions; Youth Week of Prayers; Youth Congresses; Federation days; Youth Evangelism Campaigns; Pathfinder Days and Summer Camps.

Global Youth Day (GYD)

Youth are mobilized for service to contribute to the proclamation of the everlasting gospel to usher in the second coming of Jesus Christ. They go out into communities to "Be the Sermon" through acts of kindness to improve the welfare of those within and outside the Church, such as distributing care packages, building homes for the indigent, and constructing bus stops. Over the years, some of the impacted institutions are Vineyard Town Golden Age Home, Bethlehem Golden Age Home, Maxfield Park Children Home, Denham Town Golden Age Home, and Sir John Golding Rehabilitation Center.

Public Campus Ministry (PCM)

In 2016, the General Conference officially launched the Public Campus Ministry. With over 80% of Seventh-day Adventists college-aged students enrolled in non-Adventist universities and colleges, the need for this Ministry became evident. At the East Jamaica Conference, we oversee five (5) Universities and two non-Adventist Universities/Colleges. We have established a presence in most of these institutions by supporting their fellowships and fraternities.

Ministerial Department

The Administration commands Pastor Leabert Williams for his outstanding leadership in the Ministerial Department. This department minister to the needs of the Pastors and their families, the Elders, Deacons and Deaconesses by implementing strategies to empower, motivate, and support them. This is carried out through continuing education and training, recognition and appreciation, evaluation, and spiritual growth programmes.

Ordination of Pastors

During the quadrennium, Pastors Sadekie Beckford, Rayandro Brown, Michael Lewis, Sheldon Schooler, Andre Clark and Brian Shaw were ordained on November 16, 2019, at the Kencot Seventh-day Adventist Church. Thus, increasing the number of Ordained Ministers in EJC to thirty-two (32). Currently, the Conference has a complement of forty-four (44) pastors serving as Conference Administrators, Departmental Directors, District Pastors, and Ministerial Interns.

A total of sixteen (16) pastors are no longer with the Conference: ten migrated, three were placed on retirement, one is ill, and two are deceased. We stand in support of the mourning families and ask that you join us in prayer for these families.

On an optimistic note, during the quadrennium, this Administration welcomed four Pastors and their families, four Licentiate Pastors and two interns.

We are grateful for the Ministerial Fraternity, which contributes to the growth and development of our Pastors. Also, we are blessed with the Ministry of the EJC Chapter of Shepherdess International, which stands in support of the Pastoral families and their developmental initiatives.

FAITHFULNESS

Treasury Department

During the quadrennium, the Administration of East Jamaica Conference also experienced financial growth despite the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. We give thanks to God for His promise to supply all our needs according to HIS riches in glory.

We began with a working capital of 9% in 2018, which dipped to -4% in 2019; however, thanks to the hardworking Pastors and to you, our dedicated members, things have begun to move in the right direction. We were able to see the working capital move to 30% in 2020 and to 65% at the end of 2021. This is the highest achievement that the

Conference has seen in approximately ten years.

We are also grateful to God for His blessing seen in the movement and growth of our liquidity. We started the period in 2018 with the liquidity at 86%, which moved down to 72% in 2019; however, things began to move in the right direction in that we were able to close the year 2020 with a liquidity of 98%. We celebrate God's blessings for our members' sacrifice in helping us complete the year 2021 with the liquidity at 132%; this is the highest that we experienced as a Conference in over ten years.

The Conference has also experienced positive growth during the period under review; in 2018, we had an intake of 790 million dollars, which moved to 811 million in 2019, then declined to 773 million in 2020. As a Conference, however, we were able to close the year 2021 with an increase to 848.24 million dollars by 25.89%. To God be the Glory!

ANNUAL INGATHERING INTAKE

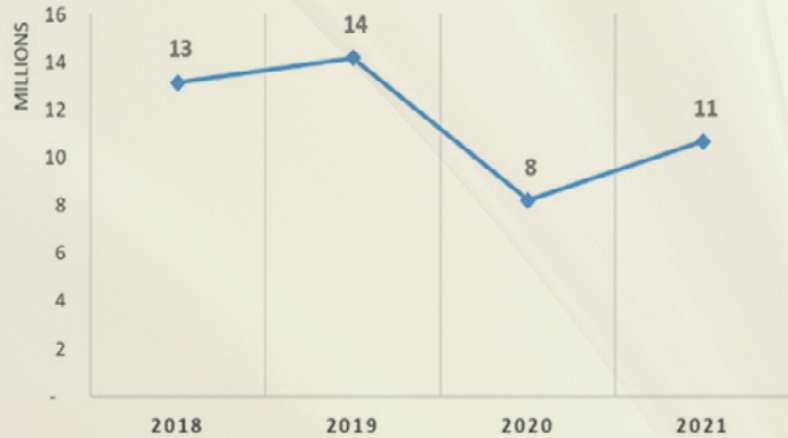


FIGURE 2: Graph showing Annual Ingathering intake

Compared to the previous quadrennium, the ingathering intake realized an increase. However, during this quadrennium, the annual intake showed a slight decrease in 2020 and 2021.

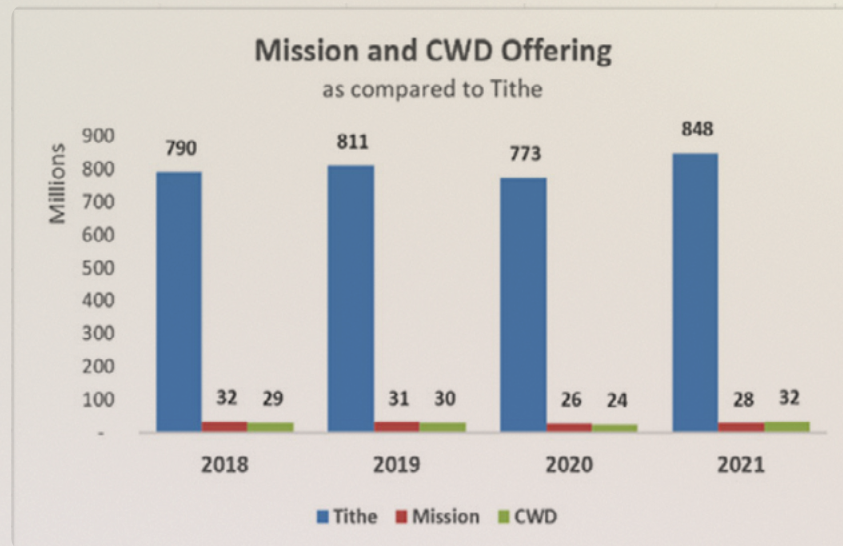


FIGURE 3: Graph Showing Mission and CWD Offering

The Mission Offering for the period under review saw a slight decrease. We started in 2018 with a collection of 32 million dollars; in 2019, we collected 31 million dollars and 26 million in 2020. We closed 2021 with a collection of 28 million dollars, leaving us with a slight reduction at the end of the quadrennium. This slight decrease was mainly due to the COVID-19 pandemic when members could not meet face to face to deposit their weekly offerings. We are grateful to God, however, for mercy and grace.

For the period, the CWD Offering increased from 29 million dollars in 2018 to close with 32 million dollars in 2021. For these blessings, we express our gratitude to God.

Stewardship

Fundamental to our beliefs as Seventh-day Adventists is the teaching that God is the creator, owner, sovereign Lord and ruler of our universe. Therefore, as stewards, we are obligated to put Him first in every area of our lives. We must never forget that all that we have belongs to Him. We brought nothing into this world, and we surely cannot take anything with us.

Legal Aid Clinic

The Stewardship Department encourages its members to be good stewards in life and in preparation for death. The department has established a Legal Aid Clinic with a number of Attorneys-at-law who are members of our Church. The aim is to encourage the preparation of wills and other legal documents by sharing relevant, current information regarding statutes of law and tax matters and directing constituents to competent legal advisors to draft such documents.

Community Services Department

The Administration of EJC uses this opportunity to commend Pastor Lorenzo Brown, the Community Services Director and Sis. Lorna Fowler, the leader of the Community Services Federation, for their outstanding work. During the quadrennium, the following were conducted:

“Love in the Marketplace”, an outreach initiative, was conducted on December 4 – 11, 2021, collaborating with all the departmental directors, ASI, GSI, CWD, and the Youth Department. For this initiative, East Jamaica Conference spent over \$2,000,000, with another \$500,000 from CWD; \$1,300,000 from churches and \$300,000 from the ASI. We distributed thousands of care packages, school supplies and wheelchairs. Collaborations were made with respec-

tive departments to realize Health clinics, family counselling, and educational awareness forums, and through CWD/MC, assistance was given to the repairing of homes.

Additionally, six hundred (600) pairs of reading glasses were distributed through a meaningful partnership with the Kiwanis Club of Kingston. Also, through the JAMU Food-bank, hundreds of individuals received well-needed food packages.

Each Sunday, Community Services Federation members from the churches in the zones take turns to prepare approximately 280 meals for the GSI. The Community Services kitchen prepares the meals in churches throughout the Conference.

The Health Department

The Health Ministries department congratulates Dr, Leonard Steele for his stewardship in this area. The department has managed to bring together some of our Adventist Health Professionals Associations (AHPA) and other Health Volunteers (AHVA) to minister to the needs of the people through Health Fairs, Health Clinics, Health Walk/Run and workshops that promote and encourage a healthier lifestyle among our people. During the period under review, the following were accomplished:

Major Health Expos

Churches in Kingston and parts of St. Andrew conducted in 2018 a Health Expo at the St. William Grant Park, downtown Kingston. Eight hundred persons received health checks, prayer and health magazines.

First Aid, CPR and AED Training

In 2018 and 2019, the Health Department conducted its First Aid, Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and Automated External Defibrillator (AED) training in the EJC boardroom, where 38 members and non-members were trained and certified as First Aiders and First Responders. Also, since the COVID-19 pandemic, sixteen members and non-members were trained at the V. H. Percy Centre, including one EJC staff member. Each training session covered 16 hours in two days.

The 2018-2019 theme, Wholistic Health for Personal and National Transformation. The following are some of the activities that took place during the period under review. Health projects reported:

Publishing Ministry

The Administration of East Jamaica Conference supports the Department of the Publishing Ministry with Pastor Lorenzo Brown at the helm. The department believes that “Bookselling is soul-winning.”

Between 2018 and 2021, fifteen Literature Evangelists moved up in status: Ten (10) to the top as Golden Credentials and five (5) as Credentials. Congratulations to champion colporteurs Venus Wallen, Anthony Gayle and Rosemarie Thompson, three Literature Evangelists who

have held the top positions during the period under review. Damain Phillips and Dalian Watson, two of the Student Literature Evangelists, were recognized as Champion Student Colporteurs.

The Publishing Ministries participated in a Joint Congress held in Curacao on August 21-24, 2019, which was a source of inspiration to all its attendees.

EJC said goodbye to four of its colporteurs, one retired and three through final settlement. Also, the Administration mourned the loss of Elvis McKay and Judy Kay Richards, both stalwart colporteurs in the Church.

FELLOWSHIP

Through the Human Resource department and departmental directors, EJC organizes periods for fellowship and affirmation so that all members of the body of Christ will experience a time of relaxation and joy.

Social & Family Enrichment Opportunities

The social support systems for pastoral families established by the Church allow for a rich experience. The Ministerial department hosted quarterly family enrichment events for the pastoral families. The COVID-19 pandemic affected everyday face-to-face interactions. However, we met virtually. A summary of the engagements includes:

March 30, 2019 - Dr. & Mrs. Joseph Smith presented to the pastors and their wives. Dr. Andrew Phillips (Dentist) and Ms. Alanie Lewis (Attorney-at-Law) engaged the pastors' children in a discussion on "Coping Skills for Pastors' Kids".

EJC hosted Part 2 of The Joys & Challenges of the Pastoral Family on November 28, 2020 - a virtual panel discussion with Pastor & Sis. Phillips, and the late Pastor and Sis Devon Osbourne

EJC hosted the annual Pan Jam Sports Day on April 25, 2019, at Jamaica College grounds. Pastoral families across JAMU engaged in friendly competitions in football, cricket, and other games.

The Ministerial Fraternity hosted a pastoral family enrichment retreat at Bahai Principe Hotel in Montego Bay from May 28-30, 2021.

Retreats

The Family Ministries directors facilitated church retreats and prayer breakfast during the period under review. In 2018 an "All of Us Retreat" combined family affair at the Grand Palladium Hotel in Hanover. In 2019 another, specifically geared for fun and relaxation, was held at Jewels Resort with outdoor sessions on Sabbath.

The Youth Ministries department continues to facilitate fellowship through Summer and Easter Camp activities.

Workers

At the EJC headquarters each year, the HR department ensures to celebrate special days with each worker, including birthdays, Administrative Professionals Day, and Teachers' Day.

Additionally, special programmes are planned for workers who go off on retirement. Year-end get-togethers and worker trips are part of the fellowship activities.

PROJECTIONS

Camp Phillipsfield

The pandemic has retarded our physical camp meetings at Phillipsfield and has halted further development; we are looking forward to continuing the development of our facilities.

This Administration intends to use the construction of the St. Thomas highway as a means of encouragement to re-galvanize the constituency toward the Phillipsfield camp-site development.

Youth Ministries

The Youth Ministries Department recognizes the absence of a suitable facility to engage our youths in wholesome physical activities. The Department has decided to rehabilitate the V.H. Percy Centre Auditorium and the sports field at the Kencot grounds as a unique project by reestablishing netball, volleyball, basketball courts and a cricket field. This will allow for collective and intentional efforts to relate to our youth's spiritual, social, and physical needs.

August Town Community Centre

As the Administration of EJC seeks to positively impact communities affected by crime and violence, the August Town community is being considered. Currently, the Administration is seeking to establish a partnership with different entities through grants to retrofit the community centre building on the property of August Town SDA Church. The plan is for this community centre to become a centre of influence by implementing programmes that can impact the lives of individuals in that community and provide skill training opportunities for those seeking self-empowerment.

The Secretariat also processes Service Calls, Service Requests, Annual Leaves (Vacations). Study Leave and is responsible for the preparation, distribution and custody of Executive Committee Minutes.

The office of the Secretariat is also the official channel and centre for the statistical information which flows from the local church to the conference, to the Union and then to the General Conference Headquarters. Information dealing with quarterly and yearly baptisms, number of churches and companies are also processed through this office.

This office also ensures that each worker receives the Employee Handbook and ensures that the policies of the organization are followed.

THE PERIOD UNDER REVIEW

MEMBERSHIP

In Matthew 28: 18-20 we have been given our mandate by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ to share the gospel story and to make disciples of men. This we proudly did and I am pleased to commend all Pastors, Conference Evangelists, Bible Workers, Lay Preachers, Elders, our Schools and the host of members in East Jamaica Conference for their passionate involvement in evangelism. During the quadrennium, Total Member Involvement, I will Go was the engine of our Conference and in spite of the challenges of Covid-19, we give thanks to God for the addition of new members to the church.

During the period under review 5386 new members were added by baptisms, 34 by profession of faith and 123 transfers in making a total addition of 5543 as at March 2022.

Regrettably, the records show that during the quadrennium, 741 members were removed from church membership, 128 by apostasy, 264 by letters of transfer out and 349 deaths. With this loss, the book membership now stands at 78,831. This gives us a gain of 4802 new members.

It should be noted, however, that this membership of 78,831 comprises members in the diaspora and those whose names still remain on the books who have compromised their membership statuses. Churches were asked by the Inter American Division to give a count of the active membership and the active membership is 50,374.

COVID-19 IMPACT ON MEMBERSHIP

The impact of Covid-19 also affected our churches. Over 150 cases of infections were reported with 8 deaths. We believe, however, that the number is higher and the Secretariat will gather more information and give further updates.

REPORTING

The major challenge we encountered in the Secretariat during the quadrennium was the matter of reporting. Some churches have been delinquent in reporting to the conference in a timely manner and there were some non-reporting churches.. This is a great concern to us because it affects the accuracy of the report that is sent to the higher organization. We have encouraged all clerks to present their quarterly reports at board meetings and to submit the same to their pastors. Some churches have improved on the quality and timeliness of reports but there is still more room for improvement. Although we are not 100% compliant, The Jamaica Union has commended us as the leading conference in submitting over 50% of the statistical reports

WORKSHOPS

This challenge of reporting statistical reports to the higher organization is not unique to our conference.

The General Conference has implemented a web-based platform called “Adventist Church Management System”(ACMS). The ACMS replaces the manual record keeping and was designed to modernize the recording and reporting system, resulting in an easier way to send reports to the conference.

A special training was organized by the Jamaica Union Conference Secretariat, led by Pastor Meric Walker, Executive Secretary, JAMU, and was streamed live by the Communication Production Team of East Jamaica Conference. Three presentations were made during the day, the first of which was captioned ‘The roles and responsibilities of the church clerk,’ was presented by Pastor Meric Walker.

The second presentation was captioned ‘The Taking and the Preservation of Minutes’, and this was presented by Mrs. Doreen Grant, Associate Secretary, JAMU.

The main presentation was made by Pastor Fernando Salazar of the Inter-America Division (IAD) Adventist Church Management System and that presentation was entitled ‘Introduction of the Adventist Church Management System.’

Here in East Jamaica, the Secretariat conducted several seminars to educate and encourage Clerks on the roles and responsibilities of the Church Clerk, the importance of church records management, the importance of timely submission of reports to the conference and the art of minutes taking.

Special thanks to Brother Leon Ffrench who was instrumental in the training of our clerks, primarily in the area of implementation of the ACMS.

As we look ahead, we wish to encourage those who accept the responsibility of church offices to embrace every opportunity to

become experts at what they are called to do.

Church Archives

During the quadrennium, the Secretariat sought to encourage all churches through Pastors and Church Clerks to update the history of their churches and to carefully document all significant events of the church and its members. It is the hope of the secretariat in the near future to establish a Resource arm in the department where information on our churches, its administration, its growth and development and how the church impacts the community.

WORKFORCE MOVEMENTS

Those who left us.

It is still quite true that we belong to a movement, and although most of our workers who were here at the beginning of the quadrennium are here today a few have left us, some through circumstances over which we had no control.

Treasurer's REPORT

APPRECIATION FOR WORK OF TREASURERS

Distinctively, we are thanking all the local church treasurers, assistant treasurers, and deacons who volunteered their time weekly to collect the tithes and offerings and manage the finances and physical facilities of the local churches. Your commitment found even greater meaning during the pandemic years.

We are pleased with the support from our treasury team and our counterparts from the wider organization. Special thanks to our immediate past Treasurer, Elder Donmayne Gyles, elected in 2014. He served six years, including half of the current quadrennium (two years), laying a solid foundation before accepting another assignment in January 2020. This report is a compliment and tribute to the work of all these individuals.

THE PROMISE

We experienced a quadrennium that was divided into halves by the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic. The first half found thousands of Adventists across our constituency being able to join each other weekly in a face-to-face manner to worship their Creator. The second half saw our usual mode of worship being displaced. Members had

to practice social distancing, experiencing disruptions and anxiety in the new economy and social order occasioned by the global pandemic. But this one thing remains the same: they remain dedicated to spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ around their territory and the world. They have given their time, energy, and money to this cause.

Together, we pooled our resources as a Conference to spread the gospel further, more comprehensively, and more efficiently.

When we read Matthew 24:14, a great promise leaps at us that “this gospel of the Kingdom shall be preached in all the world.” It is also a significant challenge. For over 131 years, we have been taking the Third Angel’s Message to a fallen world, particularly on this island. There have been great triumphs – the birth of fields, a union, and 78,899 (in 2021) members remaining, but “there remains very much land to be possessed.” Our constituency, says the Statistical Institute of Jamaica, had 764,712 persons (in 2018), so many remain to be reached. God has promised us success – His words will not return void. As did Caleb, after crossing the Jordan, it is time for us to say, “Give me this mountain.” It is “not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the LORD of hosts” (Zach. 4:6). To this end, “I WILL GO!”

THE COURSE (ECONOMIC ENVIRONMENT)

Another quadrennium commenced with the usual incremental growth, with the real gross domestic product (GDP) averaging 1%. Then in 2020, it suddenly contracted by (9.1%) as COVID-19 marched through the land. Foreign exchange rates relative to the United States Dollar soared 22.79% from JM\$126.30 in 2017 to JM\$155.09 in 2021, and COVID-19 disrupted supply chains.

Together with other factors, they caused an economic earthquake. Many Jamaicans lost their jobs, survived on leaner margins, or relied on assistance for survival. Our members were not immune. Together we walked the plank, knowing Jesus cares. By the end of 2020 through to 2021, partial recovery began. GDP change was up 4.5%, and unemployment was down to 8.4% from 10.2%. These gains have seeped into our performance, allowing us to smile with God.

THE FINANCIAL PICTURE IMPROVES

The quadrennium just ended was a continuation of the previous one, which was focused on the financial stability of the Conference while carrying on the mission with no less urgency in a time of uncertainty and scarce resources. This Administration is pleased to report that the picture of church finances at the end of the quadrennium is much stronger than it was four years ago.

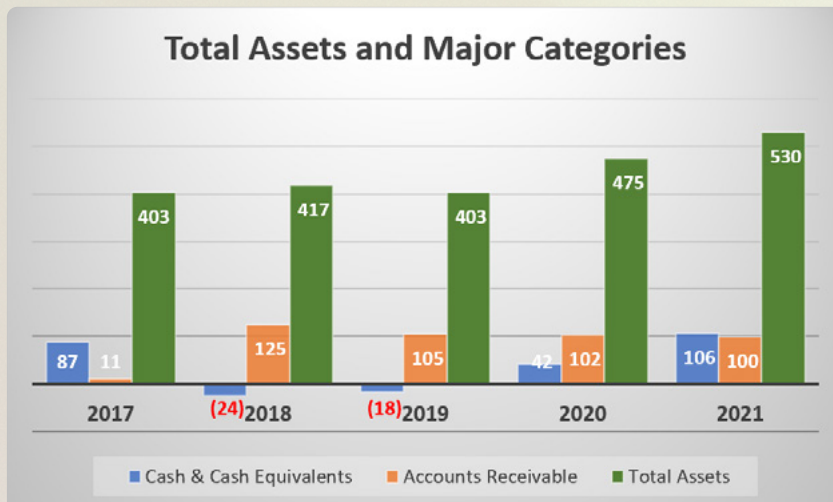


FIGURE 6: Graph showing Total Assets and Major Categories

Several areas of the financial statements show positive trends for which we can only give glory to God. The total assets under management grew by 31.70%, from \$402.52M to \$530.14M between 2017 and 2021. This growth shows in cash, which increased from a deficit of \$23.67M at the end of 2018 to a positive \$106.07M in 2021. Also, in 2020 Land, Building and Equipment increased by \$42.70M, net, primarily on the acquisition of Mae's Building, which will serve as a center of influence and home of the Pembroke Hall SDA Church. Other acquisitions for the quadrennium were mainly the systematic replacement of old air conditioners with energy-efficient models, equipment for the "Virtual Church" platform, and office furniture. As we advance, the titling of existing church properties has returned to the fore and will also add to the total assets under management. Accounts receivable declined from \$124.89M in 2018 to \$99.54M in 2021, or by 25.47%, bolstering cash in hand.

Another bright spot was the improvement observed in total liabilities. These declined from \$190.25M in 2017 to \$186.91M in 2021, or 1.76%, extinguishing external and organizational debts prudently.

The corollary to these changes is a 61.69% or \$130.96M increase in Net Assets from \$212.28M in 2017 to \$343.24M in 2021.

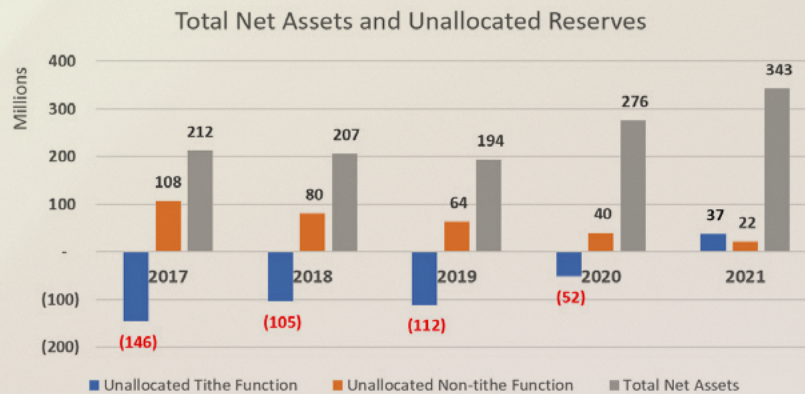


FIGURE 8: Graph showing Total Net Assets and Unallocated Reserves

While we note that the outcome of Net Assets' general non-tithe reserves (Unallocated Non-Tithe Function) runs south, the opposite is true of the available tithe reserves (Unallocated Tithe Function). At the end of 2017, Unallocated Non-Tithe Function was \$107.59M, which declined to \$22.09M or 20.54% by 2021. The decline was partly due to the acquisition of the Pembroke Hall property and the maintenance of properties other than Headquarters, which we can only do from non-tithe funds. Lamentably, the pandemic has exacerbated the already challenging task of replenishing these non-tithe funds. On the other hand, there was significant growth in Unallocated Tithe Function (portion) of Net Assets from a decade of deficit (-\$146.25M, 2017) to a surplus of \$37.34M in 2021, by 125.53% or \$183.59M. With other areas of Net Assets also improving, the financial base of the church has strengthened. God kept the ship afloat in a remarkable fashion during this quadrennium.

CAREFUL MANAGEMENT

Beyond the essential role of God's blessings, a positive result would not have been possible but for the careful management of resources and sources of income.

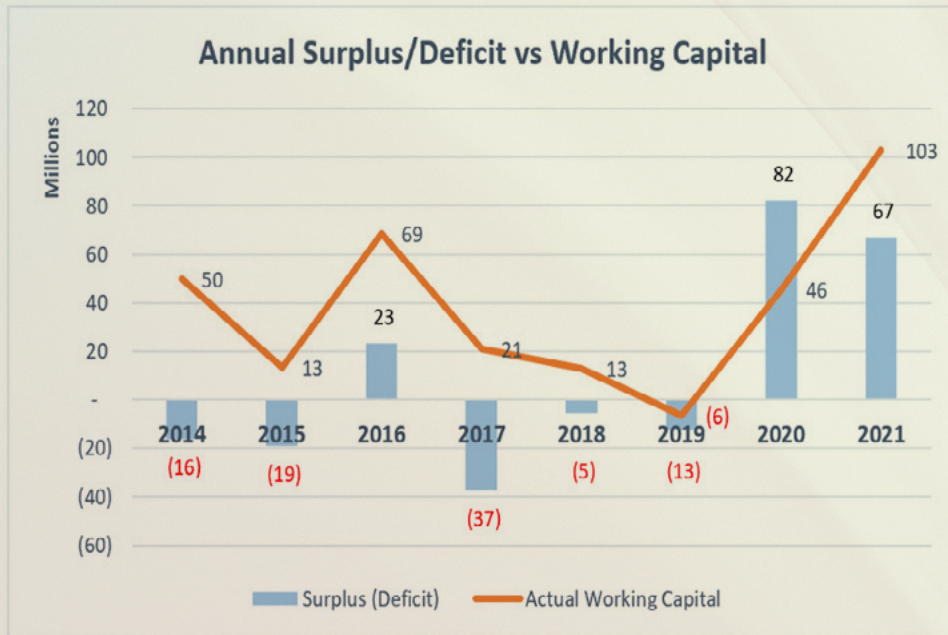


FIGURE 9: Graph showing Annual Surplus / Deficit vs Working Capital

As we experienced annual operating deficits through 2019, the working capital available for operations declined to a shortage of \$6M, on the cusp of the pandemic. It was time for business unusual (as Elder Smiley often said). With the Administration's mind concentrated on the strategic pillar of stewardship, including corporate stewardship, we made difficult decisions.

These included reducing operating expenses by 4.68%, from \$676M in 2018 to \$645M in 2021. Some elements of this were reduction of salaries and allowances expenses, departmental expenses, containment of appropriations, eliminating some in-house services, and avoiding unnecessary costs. We negotiated the troubling waters with the understanding and support of departmental directors, staff members, and church members. Let's praise God for the "Peace speaker" whom we obeyed. The results were positive working capital of \$45.79M and \$102.96M in the next two years, 2020 and 2021, respectively. These resources are used to service obligations, re-equip for the new normal, and harden our vulnerabilities to continuing threats and shocks.

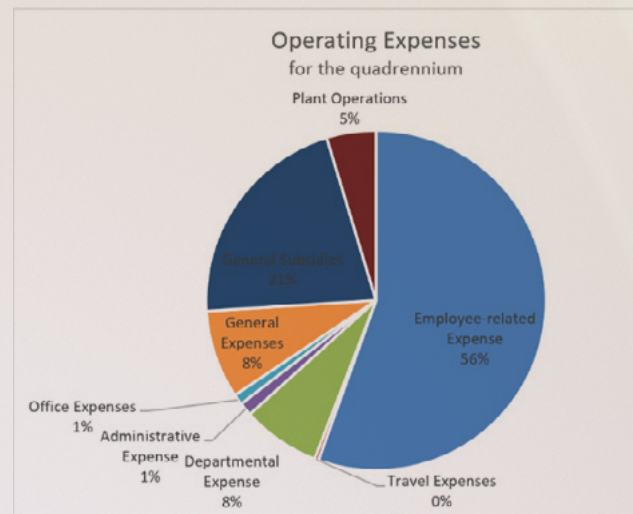


FIGURE 10: Graph showing Operating Expenses

OPERATING: INCOME VS EXPENSE

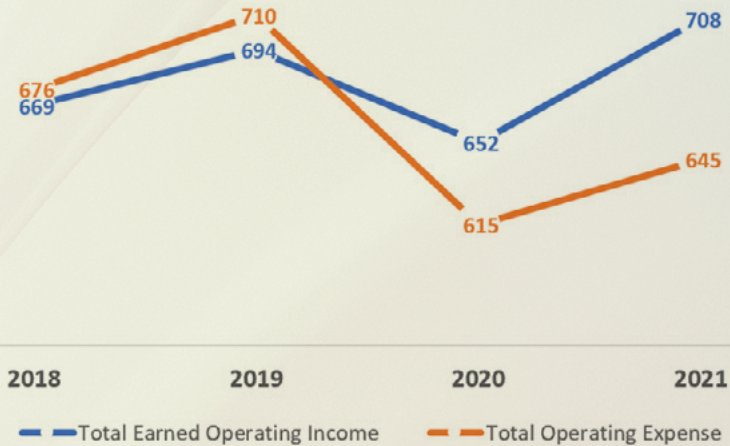


FIGURE 11: Graph showing Operating: Income vs Expense

During the quadrennium, the Conference had total operating revenue of \$2.72 billion and total operating expenses of \$2.65 billion, resulting in an operating surplus of \$78.06 million. When the regular appropriation of \$17.03M and capital appropriation of \$35.87M from the wider organization are added, the gross surplus was \$130.96 million.

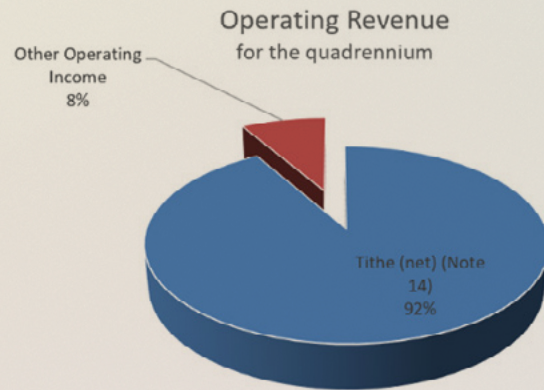


FIGURE 12: Graph showing Operating Revenue

THE PROVIDENCE OF GOD...GIVES HOPE

The story of the widow of Zarephath found in 1 Kings 17 may well have a secondary application for us. The woman representing the church, under destitute circumstances, shared her last meal with the man of God. So too have our churches, especially members during the ongoing pandemic, to assist those in need.

Your faithfulness to God has not gone unnoticed and may your jars overflow with oil. Accordingly, we share the following highlights and critical performance indicators:

Tithe & Offering

Over the last four years, annual tithe increased 25.98%, from \$673.33M in 2017 to \$848.24M in 2021. World Mission Offering over the quadrennium increased 11.66% from \$25.39M to \$28.35M, while Conference Wide Development (CWD) Offering increased by 40.85% from \$22.79M to \$32.10M. “The latter highlighting the expanding shift towards project-giving. We praise God for this! However, attention span can be very brief and easily diverted to newer or better promotions.” (Treasurer’s Report, GC Session 2010)

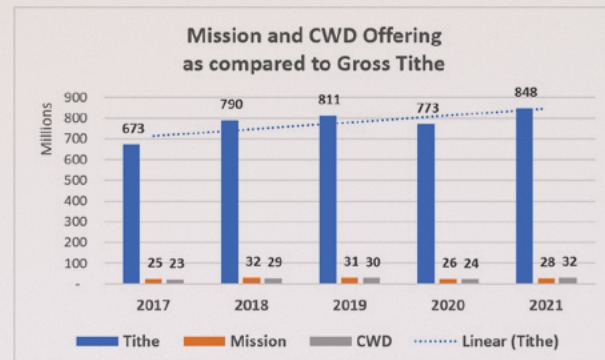


FIGURE 13: Graph showing Mission and CWD Offering

Working Capital & Liquidity

The annual decline in working capital took a toll on funding the mission. Alas, the brook of Cherith dried up at -4% in 2019. Then God showed up! Amid a pandemic, the working capital ratio increased from 14% in 2017 to 65% in 2021, our highest in more than a decade.

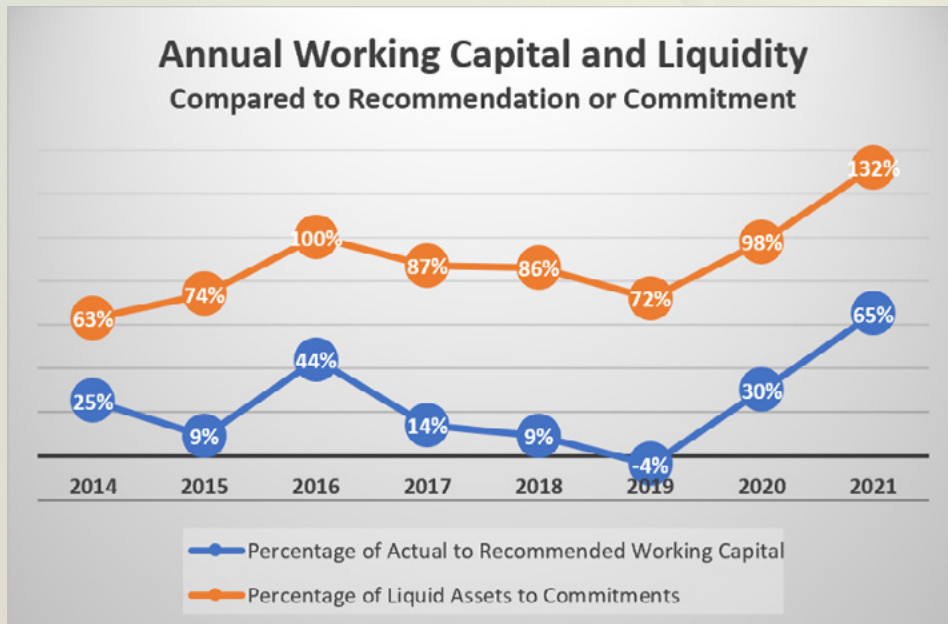


FIGURE 14: Graph showing Annual Working Capital and Liquidity

We achieved this through prudence and constriction of activities occasioned by the pandemic. Similarly, Liquid Assets to Commitments increased from 87% in 2017 to 132% in 2021.

MISSION, A PRIORITY

Amidst uncertainty, turmoil, and economic fluctuations, the mission stays the same. Our commitment to the mission remains the same. And we encourage all church leaders and members to remain faithful in their support of God's mission with their means. With confidence in God, we grasp the theme of this 6th quadrennial session, "Embracing change; I WILL GO!"

Focusing on the strategic pillars, growth, consolidation, and the church in the community, look with me at the following perspectives from which we have gone to impact mission over the quadrennium.

Traditional evangelism

We still believe – "that this gospel shall be preached in all the world...", so "lift up the trumpet and loud let it ring" (Strout, Jessie E, 1872). While we spent \$60.43M on direct evangelism or 83.53% of the previous quadrennial outlay, the trumpet was



FIGURE 15: Graph showing Evangelism Expenses 2018 - 2021

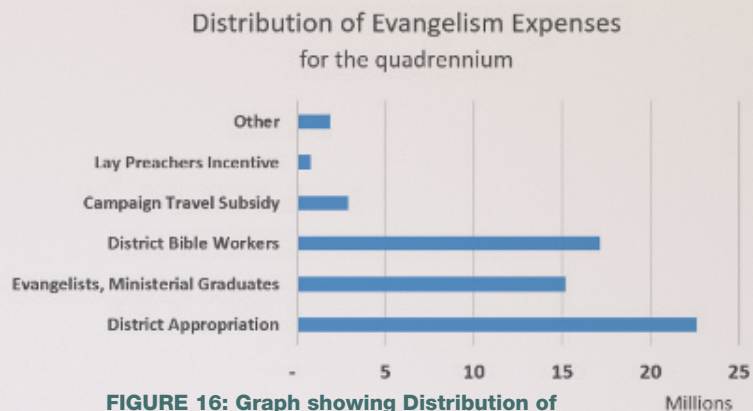


FIGURE 16: Graph showing Distribution of Evangelism Expenses for the Quadrennium

never silent. The health protocols ushered in by the pandemic since 2020 were foreboding. We moved online and achieved the best conversion rate per dollar, especially in the cross-cultural campaigns on the various zoom platforms. Let's embrace the change and lessons learned from the pandemic era. Every church has a megaphone to reach the world through social media.

Education

We still believe – “In the highest sense, the work of education and the work of redemption are one.” (Education, pg. 30). Accordingly, education support increased 22.91% this quadrennium from \$429.02M to \$527.29M. This total included a 75.11% increase in constituency scholarships, from \$3.56M to \$6.23M. Through the Conference's Financial Oversight

Committee's intervention, financial management at our schools improved. Kingsway High School, the foremost beneficiary, turned its canteen into a profit center, improved collections, and better compensated its committed workers. The preparatory schools received the Sage (Peachtree) software through the treasury. This software improves their accounting, reporting, and decision-making. Thanks to Andrew and Tashika Francis, the preparatory schools were also gifted with refurbished laptops to run their accounting and other productivity software. These mark the beginning of a new epoch. Our most vulnerable members and accredited schools need more of your support. Let us partner with them to build the capacity of our citizenry and mission.

Conference Wide Development – Structural and Social

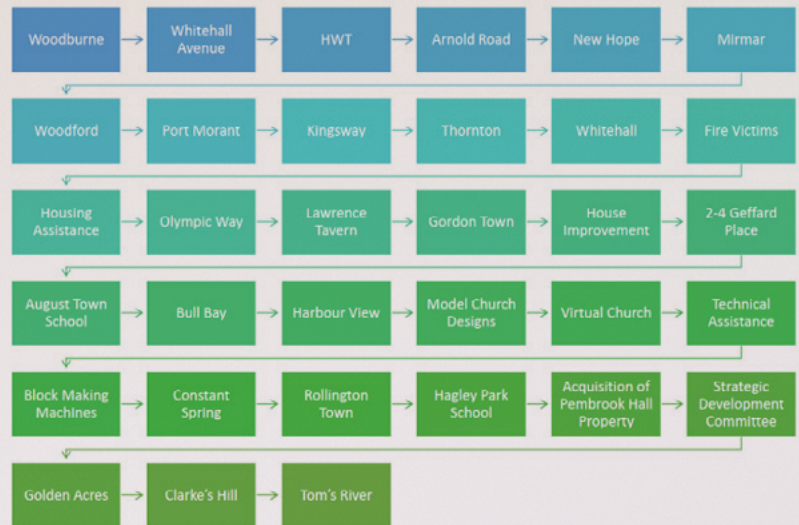
We still believe – in collective funding and volunteerism that transform our vulnerable structures, members, and participation in the mission. Up to March 2022, the CWD Management Committee approved and executed projects over the quadrennium totaling \$105.86M. From fire victims to faulty buildings, from education assistance to evangelism projects, food packages to the Phillipsfield campsite, the CWDMC has strategically distributed limited resources. Some received a fish, and others were taught to fish.

Such was the purpose of acquiring two block-making machines for the Conference. One is at Oakglades SDA Church, and the other is earmarked for the Phillipsfield campsite. We know some are still waiting, but their day is coming. Until then, be hopeful, helpful, and supportive until the day of your increase.

Ingathering

We still believe – it is beautiful and fitting for our communities to partner with God, through His church, to impact lives. Each year our members joyfully engage and allow community members to thus participate through ingathering campaigns. Despite half of the quadrennium being affected by pandemic concerns, ingathering intake grew 33.10%, from \$34.74M to \$46.23M. Look at God! The Conference used these resources to help our health care, education systems, and many needy individuals get back on their feet. Of note were those severely affected in the parts of St. Thomas during 2020, where the Community Services Department and CWD Management Committee distributed hundreds of care packages.

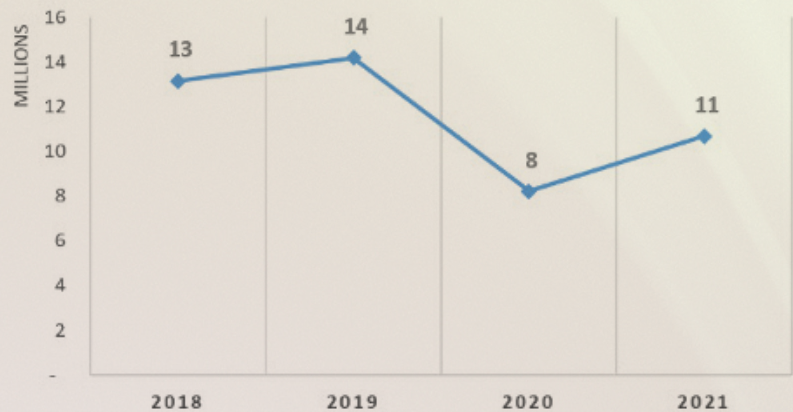


FIGURE 17: Graph Showing Annual Ingathering Intake

Ingathering Outflows: 2018 - 2021

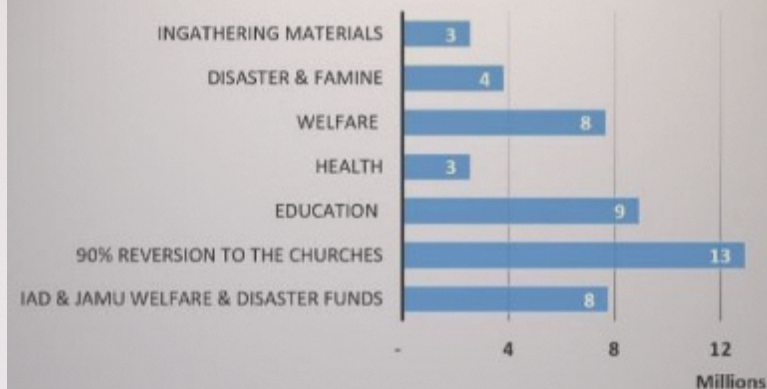


FIGURE 18 : Graph Showing Ingathering Outflows

Good Samaritan Inn

We still believe - in the living gospel in "Sharing Love Giving Hope." Currently, over nine hundred (900) lunches are distributed each week beside articles of clothing, shoes, medical and dental care, and overnight and shower facilities for the vulnerable in surrounding communities. We are grateful for the volunteerism and benevolence received, locally and overseas, corporate and individual, that keep the lights on and lives touched.

That support accounted through the Conference totaled \$32.39M during the quadrennium. Although contributions declined during the pandemic, the work never stopped—the exposure of homeless and needy persons crested when the government's pandemic control protocols and lockdowns were the most restrictive.

Risk & Treasury

Finally, we still believe in protecting the mission from undue delays by natural and human activities. The first steps are to understand, avoid or reduce risks as far as possible. Thus, our annual consultations emerged. These often included our treasurers, auditors, and risk/safety officers.

In 2019, experts from the Tax Administration of Jamaica shared on payroll tax exposure and compliance. We also celebrated the longest-serving church treasurers as the crowning act of our event. Then in 2020, in our last face-to-face session, we introduced Ecclesia 7 Remittance system, under the powerful and fun tutelage of Elder Alrey Stewart, from Jamaica Union. This online tool helps pastors, treasurers, and auditors to have real-time church finance reports, at-a-glance informative dashboards, and emailed receipts to members while maintaining fund balances for all departments. Remittances are more accurate and timely, reducing the risk of losses. Other treats at the consultation were digital copies of the Church Treasurers Manual and the Church Manual, distributed conveniently through our EJC Church Treasurers WhatsApp group. Through the same group, answers and updates are shared through real-time questions. Beyond the meetings, in 2020, our giving platform, give.ejcsda.com, relaunched new and improved, facilitating your faithfulness to our King, Jesus. What a timely blessing that has been!

It was now 2021, and another consultation to charge and encourage new and returning officers bloomed. With the Jamaican dollar depreciating, we poignantly introduced the idea of churches investing cash being held for later use. Doing nothing is a poor option. Even the ultra-conserva-

tive church can open a saving or investing account with the West Indies Union Revolving Loan Fund, allowing the money to earn interest. Our corporate stewardship has breadth. Other components are servicing obligations/loans, securing tangible assets, and maintaining a safe worshipful environment at church. It does require more than an annual consultation to ventilate these issues.

Thus in 2021, the quarterly Risk Management Newsletters were introduced by Kay Scott, the Risk Officer. They contain tips and fun facts and address potential vulnerabilities. Yes, they are must-read four paged releases. We helped prepare our congregations for the various risks through this and previously mentioned avenues.

Those unavoidable risks, which are too large to treat on our own, were insured per policy. After a subsidy of 25 percent, the associated annual insurance premiums still posed a challenge to some of our congregations. However, with prayer and consultations, about 80% of our churches

SDA entities within EJC Territory

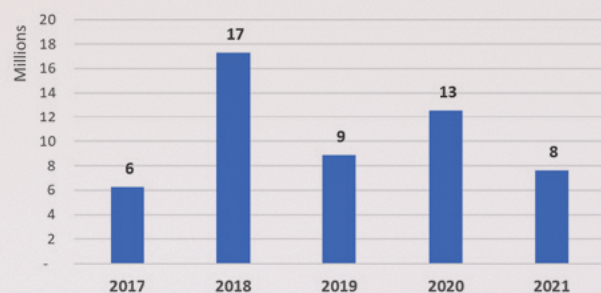


FIGURE 20: Graph showing Accounts Receivable

acceded to a payment plan to extinguish their insurance premiums (accounts receivable). We are pleased to observe that accounts receivable attributable to our churches declined from a high of \$17M in 2018 to \$8M in 2021. Notwithstanding, provision for doubtful debt grew from \$1.01M to \$2.44M. Let us continue this path until all our churches are on a plan to reduce all balances to zero. In so doing, the churches would liberate well-needed cash for other aspects of ministry.

These vital insurance coverages mitigate the financial exposure when an adverse event affects the church. During the quadrennium, the claims realized were \$4.38M, as detailed below.

INSURANCE CLAIMS REALIZED 2018 - 2021

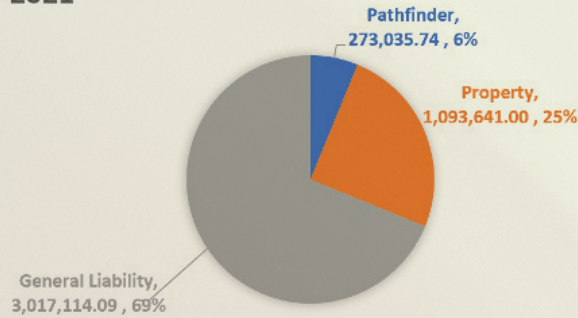


FIGURE 21: Graph showing Insurance Claims Realized

It was a bonus to have Ashley Frazier, legal counsel at Adventist Risk Management Inc (ARM), assigned to the Jamaica Union portfolio, paying a courtesy visit to our shores and the Conference, among her stops. Along with Angel Barrios, she oversees our claims and policy in general.

We have come to difficult times without surprise.

Matthew 24 constantly reminds us of the travails of end-time living. Therefore, let us be ready to meet the moment and manage the risks.

Church Audits

Conducting local church audits is one way of helping congregations to manage risks and perform best practices. Therefore it is imperative for auditors from the Conference and their counterparts in the local church to discharge this function faithfully. In 2018 our veteran auditor Mr. Henrick McKenzie retired after serving for forty-one years. Sir, we salute you. Over the quadrennium, the Conference conducted three hundred and sixty-five audits. The annual average is 91.25 audits, with a low of 86 and a high of 96 from a population of 98 organized churches.

THE WAY FORWARD

Another of our strategic pillars, ownership, reverberates in Caleb's call, "give me this mountain." But the call also focuses our attention on new frontiers for the ministry or unconquered territory needing continuous thought. As we lean forward, let us look at:

1. Increasing working capital and liquidity

1. **The goal at the onset of achieving a minimum of 75% Working Capital by 2022 is within touching distance (65%). Attaining the full measure of 100% is the new mountain. Policies (IAD) taking**

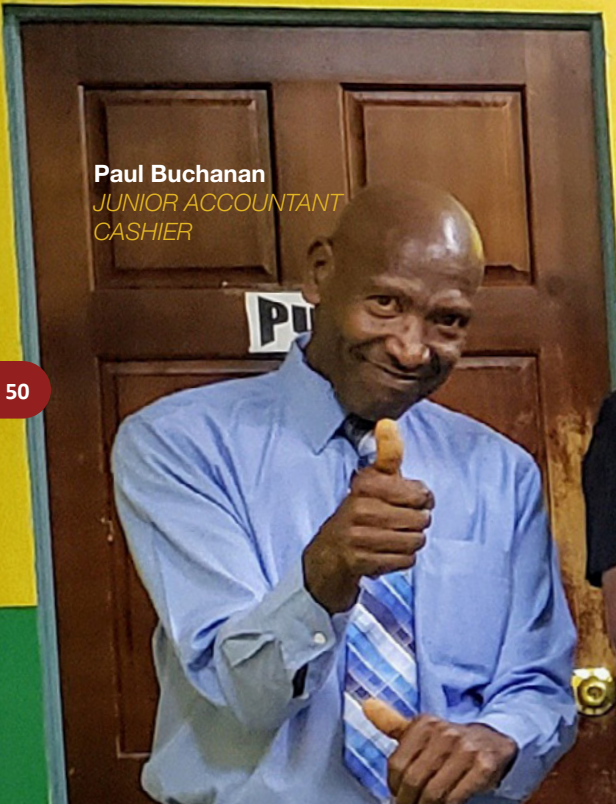
effect in 2022 will require at least six months of working capital reserves.

2. **The discipline of aligning resources to mission priorities and budgets over legacy designs will receive more significant effort.**

3. **Improve the intake of non-tithe funds with urgency.**

CONVENTIONS

Children's Convention is a recurrent feature on the Conference's calendar. The main objective of these conventions is to encourage spiritual growth through the spoken word, the display of talents and fostering of upright Christian fellowship. Annual consultations for Children and Adolescents' Ministries leaders was held face to face in 2019 for all zones; three in Kingston and the other in St. Thomas. Thereafter because of the pandemic consultations were held via Zoom.

District Conventions: May 2019 **conventions** were held in zones one & two at the Omara Road and Constant Spring SDA Churches respectively. Both churches were packed and saw the children displaying their love for God with creativity and enthusiasm. However, due to the pandemic things changed for the period 2020-2021 with restrictions for gathering. The children were placed in cyber space to deliver their talents and show the world that a little child can lead others to Christ. "Children on the King's Highway" was the theme for the 2020 Convention. Dakari Williams and Ajani Campbell from Trench Town and Dallas Castle respectively were the speakers. Elder Lorraine Vernal, JAMU Family, Women, Children and Adolescents' Ministries Director was elated and transfixed by the depth of the presentations from the Children.

CHILD MONTH BAPTISMS

Between 2018 – 2022 the call continues in the constituency to engage our children in Bible study to equip them to make thoughtful, Spirit-guided decisions, as a result of this our baptisms have been swelling. Approximately 300 children were baptized over the period.

BASKETS OF LOVE PROJECT

'Baskets of Love' Project started in 2008 and have grown over the years. The children enjoy being engaged in this community outreach initiative which provides goody baskets to children's homes and seniors. In adding an extension to this project the department in 2020 started a clothing and pampers drive. We say special thanks to Pastor and Sister Patterson and friends for their kind donations of clothing and other goodies. Special thanks also to Dr. Pearce Dennis and Sister Jones Pryce and others for their contribution to the department. I'm pleased to report that the involvement of the children in giving donations has multiplied.

SHOE BOXES FOR ST. VINCENT:

On April 9, 2021, the La Soufriere volcano erupted on the main island of Saint Vincent & the Grenadines, causing the displacement of hundreds of people to include our Adventist family. The Children's Adolescent Ministries decided to engage the children in decorating shoe boxes with needed necessities for the youths and children. The creativity, and love from the children could be felt and seen in the many hundreds of boxes that came to the Conference office.

ADOLESCENTS FOCUS

In 2017, an initiative was taken by Inter American Division who made it mandatory to treat our adolescents as a separate group. This was done intentionally so as to meet the holistic needs of the adolescents. In December of 2017 IAD launched its Talking Backpack initiative to proclaim the birth of this new thrust. This mandate is still in effect for the adolescents. The Bible Spell for Earliteens, mini "Toast Master's" training and "OPTIONS", a talk back forum for adolescents is aimed at ministering to our adolescents.

TODDLERS DAY

The department continues to give increasing attention to each sector of the family, to protect our children and to make church a place where they will feel loved and wanted. All churches have been tasked with the responsibility of ensuring that every child is paired with a church "Auntie" or "Uncle"

The department each year has a bonding activity for toddlers outside of church activities to Dunns River Fall Children's Park. Eight (8) non-SDA were in attendance at one of our excursions. The day was packed with much fun and excitement for both children and adults. Evangelising amidst the enjoyment is also accomplished as the children connected and shared with visitors by giving away small books.

Too much importance cannot be placed on the loving, interactive attention that should be given to our children. We continue our appeal to our church 'aunties' and 'uncles' to join in this ministry to create an extra bond of love among our church family.

PARENT TIPS

Parent tip is a half-a-minute piece of advice that is delivered to a captive audience by a child each Sabbath at children's time. These tips contain vital information that can better help guardians/caregivers with raising their children. These tips have been compiled in a booklet for ready use with information gleaned from the Bible.

EVANGELISTIC ACTIVITIES/CRUSADES

Trained, equipped and ready to serve, our children will not be outdone. Amidst a pandemic the children could be found engaged in online evangelistic crusade, participating in EJC virtual church programmes, zoom prayer and fasting and seminars, extending invitations both locally and abroad.

Jewels Symposium - Jewels was launched April 6, 2013. This group represents children 0- 12 years. Below is a symposium that was held at the Harbour View SDA Church where young Dakarai Williams of the Trench Town SDA, then 6 years of age spoke on the theme: "Develop the Culture Fit for Jesus – Courtesy and Respect"

In 2021 the children were engaged in the reading of the book "Beyond Imagination. As an activity they were given various chapters to read and summarize this they then shared with their peers.

ADVENTIST LAY-PERSONS SERVICES & INDUSTRIES (ASI)

ASI CRUSADES

With a new era of children comes the demand to operate outside of the box. The ASI missionaries were determined to do just that, with their new mantra "Mission a Life Style not a Holiday" saw this cadre of young people ministering for God in a series of Evangelistic campaign. The Florence Hill district of churches led by then host pastor, Brian Shaw consist of five churches namely: Florence Hill, Lawrence Tavern, Cavaliers, Peat Hill and Toms River was captivated by the "Sound of the Approaching God" evangelistic campaign (May 4-26, 2019) led by youth preachers Sayeed Bernard, Brandon Daley, Michael James, Sandre Rhoden, Abigail Whittingham, Victoria Bennett and child preacher Dakarai Williams. At the end of the 4 weeks 15 persons were baptized.

In partnership with the Shortwood SDA Church led by host pastor Paul Bailey the missionaries during the period July 17-31, 2021 held an online 3 weeks' evangelistic campaign themed "Increase: It's Already Done." Leading up to the start of the campaign the missionaries took to the streets of Shortwood and Grants Pens giving out invitations, tracks, priority magazines and offering prayers. 12 powerful youth speakers took to the podium each night. At the end of the 3 weeks 7 persons were baptized.

Since 2012 the missionaries of the ASI Junior Chapter have been engaged in sharing their skills and talents with missionaries from other islands in humanitarian projects while bridging cross cultural differences in evangelism. Each year these young missionaries accept the challenge, giving up their 4 weeks' summer breaks to go on mission. However, the global pandemic allowed only two mission trips.

- **2018 Impact Tobago (July 25 – August 21). Just over 30 plus Missionaries took up the task as Preachers, Singers, and Bible worker.**
- **2019 Impact Guyana (July 31 – August 26)– A contingent of 43 persons attended the mission. 179 persons, mostly adults were baptized.**

The 4 weeks spent on mission each year includes the following activities: -

- **Health Clinics and feeding programs to schools**
- **Construction site and painting**
- **Doctrinal Study**
- **Evangelism**

Each year an average of 30 to 40 missionaries, including adults have participated in mission trip. Each year participant can testify of the awesome experience of the many faith encounters, the spiritual growth, the social improvements and academic life. Through the years the testimonies from the missionaries has caused many parents to make great sacrifices to have their youngsters benefit from this spiritual climb.

We continue to fulfill our aim to keep our missionaries engaged locally. They contribute to crusades, camp meetings, JAMU Global Baptism, LTM/TMI Convention & Baptism, CWD projects, GSI and Children's homes and many others. It has been a mountainous challenge, however they are buoyed up and committed emanating from the support from constituency members, JAMU, CWD and EJC. Our ministry has grown. It now has over 100 members with representatives from all 4 Zones. I was blessed to work with them as they extended themselves to facilitate the department.

ASI CONSECRATION AND THANKSGIVING SERVICE

Each year a consecration service is held before the missionaries depart for mission and a thanksgiving service on their return. Our consecration speakers 2018 -2022 were Elder Nigel Coke. For the 10th year anniversary programme special guest speaker was President of JAMU, Pastor Everett Brown

TRAINING OF CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES LEADERS

Our certified leaders have been asked to train the persons in their churches and to assist others.

CHILD PREACHERS' TRAINING

Though not able to meet physically the training continues for our child preachers via Zoom platform. Complementing the training package were topics on social graces, forming good habits, grooming, public speaking, responsible behavior and time management.

CHILDREN & ADOLESCENTS PRAYER & FASTING

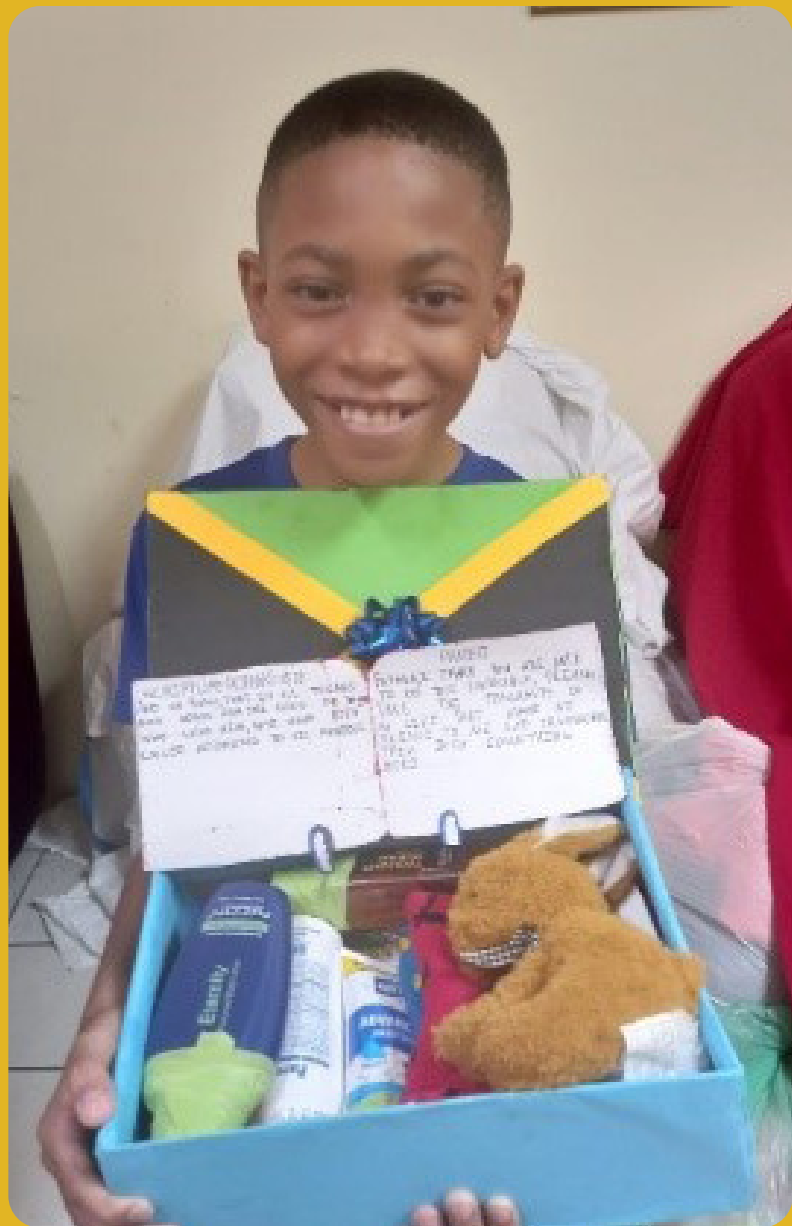

This proclamation played out in the paradigm shift from traditional face to face worship services to online services, resulting from the global and local country lockdown. As a result, the main objective of the Communication Department was achieved.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The main goal of the Communication Department is to represent the work of Christ and His church in the best possible light through the use of contemporary technologies and other methods of communication.

"Building Bridges of Hope" is the mission statement of the Communication Department and when the pandemic hit the country, there was wide scale uncertainty and despair but hope was regained when the East Jamaica Conference Communication team members jumped into action in collaboration with our team of young volunteers to take Christ to the world. The team approached the situation with confidence and with Christ as the ultimate communicator and commander, success was assured.

EJC's Communication Department created a favorable image of the church and in the process, created a blueprint for other local churches and Conferences to follow.

EJC VIRTUAL CHURCH AND JA ADVENTIST ONLINE

At the start of the period, the Communication Department continued the work of serving and supporting all departments in the Conference with graphic and artwork for their various fliers, provision of audio / visual support for programs, kept our web based content current and kept the constituency updated with the latest news and information in keeping with our general goals.

Then on March 10, 2020, the first case of the Corona Virus (COVID19) was confirmed in the island, bringing with it dramatic changes in movement across the country which had the overall impact of increasing the demand on the Communication department resources and all our services. With the physical closure of churches, the need for online churches became necessary and the

EJC Communication Department hit the ground running and provided online church services which satisfied the need for spiritual content for people both in and outside of Jamaica.

Our quick reaction was noticed and brought to national attention by Television Jamaica News (TVJ) one evening, who compared our actions to those of other denominations who at the time were struggling, as their doors remained closed and they were not equipped to go online.

Our online Sabbath services soon became quite popular and the name 'Ja Adventists Online' became a brand and was subsequently taken over by the Jamaica Union Con-

Churches quickly made adjustments to their services to incorporate hosts and to make their church services more interactive and visitor friendly. This was done at a time when many other denominations closed their doors due to resource constraints and lack of pro-activeness.

Thanks be to God, despite the pandemic we achieved our goals and objectives which were:

- To capitalize on and utilize the resources of media and technology to enhance the reach of the everlasting gospel message.

ference of Seventh-day Adventists (JAMU) to represent the online work of the Seventh-day Adventist (SDA) Church in Jamaica. A new name and logo (EJC Virtual Church) was soon developed by our Communication Department from which content could be created and shared. The launch and airing of the first Ja-Adventist On-line programme took place on March 21, 2020. This was just 11 days after the first case of the Covid-19 virus was confirmed on the island.

With online services being streamed consistently, our viewership and subscribers increased dramatically from an average of three or four hundred to three or four thousand a typical sabbath. Thanks be to God, we far exceeded the expectations of many as we rolled out our multi-media facilities with the help of volunteers.

During the heights of restrictive measures and protocols imposed by the government to curtail the movement and gathering of people, churches were impacted as well and were asked to close their doors. The Communication and Production Team, which is made up of volunteers from across the constituency, found a way to strike the right balance between compliance and service to ensure that the Word of the Lord was shared to provide comfort and hope to the world in this time of hopelessness.

The performance of the East Jamaica Conference Production Team during the difficult time of the COVID-10 pandemic is one of the great achievements of the department over the period. The our YouTube channel, especially after March 10, 2020.

During the quadrennium and in particular over the past two years, after the pandemic began, YouTube emerged as the most popular social media platform for churches in our constituency. In a survey conducted in February 2022 with 65 communication practitioners covering 50 churches in our constituency, YouTube emerged as the social media of choice to fulfill the mission of the church. Fifty five (55) of the 65 participants who took the survey indicated that YouTube was the social media of choice to share the gospel. This represents 84.6% of those who participated in the survey. Youtube emerged as the leading live streaming platform as well with 83.1% of persons who participated in the survey confirming that YouTube is their preferred platform for live streaming in their church. The Zoom platform emerged closely in second place with 81.5% of participants who said that the Zoom platform was their live streaming platform of choice since the onset of the pandemic.

EVANGELISM - LET'S TALK ABOUT HIM (LTAH) & FOOTPRINTS OF HOPE

Who would have thought that in the midst of the worst pandemic the world has experienced over the past one hundred years that the Seventh-day Adventist church in East Jamaica Conference would have been able to successfully stage an island-wide evangelistic campaign during the period October 3 - 24, 2020 ?

History will record that the first island-wide digital evangelistic campaign in Jamaica was held under the theme "Let's Talk about Him, I follow Jesus"- (LTAH). While this was held under the leadership of the Jamaica Union Conference (JAMU) with campaign speaker Pastor Dane Fletcher and co-evangelist Pastor Omar Oliphant, the Communication Production Team behind the campaign was from East Jamaica Conference. Just over 350 persons were baptized during the series which was transmitted each night across the Communication platforms of all five Conferences in Jamaica. This campaign was the largest multi-site evangelistic campaign in East Jamaica Conference and Jamaica Union Conference of Seventh-day Adventists (JAMU) up to that point.

In February 2022, the Communication Department of East Jamaica Conference along with communication team members across the constituency played a pivotal role in the successful staging of the Footprints of Hope Evangelistic Series which is now on record as the single largest evangelistic campaign held on the island. This was a collaborative event with the five English speaking Unions of the Inter-American Division (IAD) with presenter Pastor Glen Samuels from West Jamaica Conference. Over 4,000 persons were baptized during the six-week long campaign of which over 400 were in East Jamaica Conference.

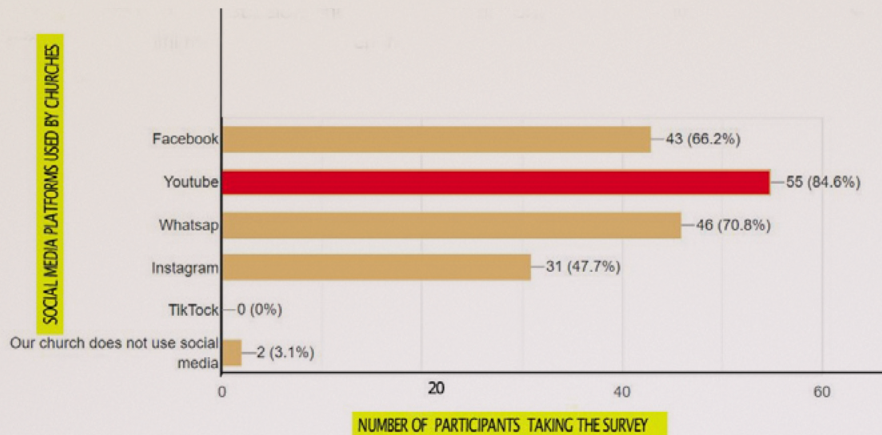


FIGURE 22: Graph showing Social Media Platforms being used by churches

The Communication team members across all our churches worked well together as a cohesive team to ensure their local churches were kept in sync with the meetings which were held every night, weekly except on Thursdays.

The last quadrennium was one which saw a dramatic shift in how people were able to move and interact with others, especially during the time when the public was curtailed in

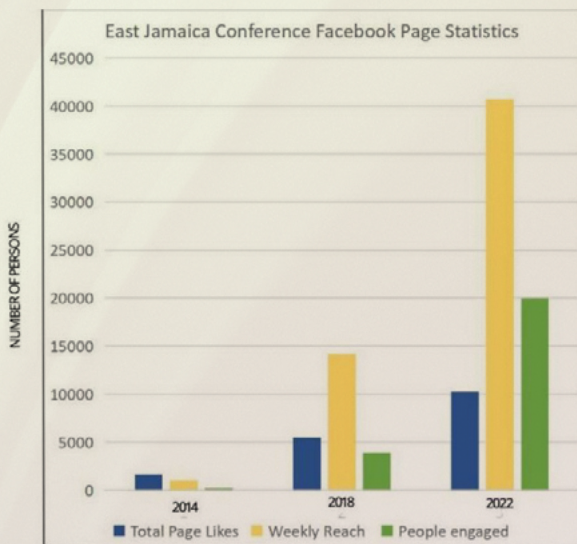


FIGURE 23: Graph Showing EJC Facebook Page Statistics 2014 - 2022

movement and laws were passed to reduce the number of persons who could gather at any one place. This included places of worship which were significantly impacted by the government as it sought to reduce the spread of the Corona-virus disease (COVID19) in our country.

Notwithstanding laws to regulate movement and the spread of COVID19, the EJC Facebook page grew significantly over the period under review. The Facebook page 'likes' grew by over 87% moving from 5,500 'likes' in 2018 to over 10,200 in 2022. The weekly reach of the page has grown significantly as well, moving from over 14,000 contacts to over 40,000 contacts in 2022. We have seen the greatest growth in Facebook over the past quadrennium in the area of engagement. These numbers have grown significantly, moving from an average of just below 4,000 people per day to just below 20,000 per day in 2022. We can only give God the glory for what has been achieved over this period in spite of the challenges. These numbers confirm that there has been significant growth in the use of social media by our Conference and also that a significant number of persons have moved online to interact with the church in the digital space.

USE OF FACEBOOK IN LOCAL CHURCHES

From a survey conducted in February 2022 which was responded to by 65 communicators from 35 churches across the four zones, 66.2% of the respondents indicated that Facebook is now being used as a platform to fulfill the mission of the church. This suggests a decline compared to a survey conducted four years ago where over 80% of respondents indicated that they use the social media platform as a platform used by their church.

The growth and use of the East Jamaica Conference YouTube channel over this quadrennium has been phenomenal. In March 2018, the subscriber base of our Youtube channel was just over 2,800. In March 2022, that number stood at just over 48,300 which means the channel has grown by over 1,625% in four years. Most of that growth however, took place over the last two years after the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. These numbers really tell an awesome story that the COVID-19 pandemic changed the world and how people relate to each other is an understatement. As I write this report, the incidents of death by the Coronavirus is significantly reduced in our country and the world at large is quickly getting back to normal, but we will not forget the state of confinement and the level of restrictions that was imposed on the population during the height

of the pandemic.

It was during this period of fear, confinement and uncertainty that our YouTube platform did its greatest work of reaching people with our messages of hope in Jesus Christ. The East Jamaica Conference emerged as the first Conference in the Jamaica Union Conference (JAMU) to create an online platform which was targeted in its approach to bring Christ to the world, after the first confirmed case of Coronavirus disease (COVID19) was identified on March 10, 2020.

We are thankful to God for lead the Communication Department in most of our local churches to improve their communication infrastructure to the extent that just over 81.5% of all our churches now have access to either Zoom or YouTube as a means of live streaming their church services should this be required.

EJCSDA.COM WEBSITE

The centerpiece of the East Jamaica Conference Communication platform is our website located at www.ejcsda.com. This is the gateway for access to the Conference with its over 100 churches, its administrators, directors and pastors. The website continues to be the place where people go to access information about the Conference and its activities. Here, news items, announcements, upcoming events, photographs of past Conference events and important information pertaining to the various departments are posted for everyone to see. Click here to view ejcsda.com website.

The East Jamaica Conference website was upgraded in April 2022. The website was changed to be more user friendly which improved the experience of accessing information from the website using mobile phones.

EJC COMMUNICATION ADVISORY

We continue to provide consistent, relevant information to our constituents every week through the EJC Communication Advisory which is the official vehicle for sharing information with our church members. During the period June 2018 – March 2022, 196 issues of the Advisory have been sent to the constituency.

Twelve years ago when I assumed the role of Communication Director, there was no consistent means of sharing information with the church in an efficient manner. The EJC Advisory over the years has been the main vehicle for communicating information to the constituency.

The number of subscribers to the weekly Communication Advisory has grown slowly over the past four years as we have seen an increase of only 33.83% in the number of persons who have subscribed to receive the document over the four-year period. Over the period 187 editions were sent out to the constituency.

FLICKR PHOTO ALBUMS

One of the important works being performed by the EJC Communication Department is the documentation in photos of some of the significant events that have occurred in the life of the Church. If a picture is worth a thousand words, then the East Jamaica Conference Communication Department's photo library has said volumes. With over 300 photo albums spanning every type of programme or major event spearheaded by Conference departmental directors or administrators, members of the church and the world over, have at their fingertips; a body of photographic work which is now valuable with respect to the history of the Conference. This, with the passage of time will become priceless. Our photo albums however, continue to grow and we invite people to visit our Flickr photo album which can be accessed from our website at ejcsda.com.

Special thanks must be made to Miss Ruth-Ann Brown and Mrs. Sophia Dormer who over the years would have worked with the Communication Director to create the significant photo library which now reflects a significant part of the history of the Conference over the past few years.

LATEST NEWS

Another critical success factor of the ejcsda.com website is the news reporting section listed under "Media" and referred to as "Latest News". The "Latest News," as the name suggests, is the section of the website where news items are written and posted for all the world to see. News items over the past four years have declined in frequency from local church communicators but we thank God for those team members of our church who take the time and make the effort to share activities from the church with the rest of the world.

Special thanks to Communication Secretary - Herma Rose-Reynolds, Sophia Dormer and our Social Media Coordinator, Ruth-Ann Brown who have made contributions in this area over the quadrennium. Sometimes news items written by local church communication personnel are sent to us and are posted on the Conference's website to provide wider viewership. News items from public media relating to the church in Jamaica or important news items emanating out of the Jamaica Union Conference or Inter-American Division (IAD) are usually posted for the benefit of readers. From time to time also, news items written and posted on our website are carried on the Jamaica Union Conference (JAMU) website.

RADIO PROGRAMS & MEDIA RELATIONS

The Department continues to produce two radio programmes: "Healthy & Happy" and "Word from Heaven" which are both aired on Northern Caribbean University (NCU) FM at 91.3 on the FM dial. The host of "Healthy and Happy" was Pastor Jovan Whyte and later Mrs. Adiese Murphy with Producer Mrs. Sophia Dormer. "Word from Heaven" on the other hand was aired at 5:45 a.m on Friday mornings with host Pastor Enroy Ferguson.

Community Services announcements for the Conference are carried via radio on NCU FM radio on Fridays evening at 5:00 pm and Saturday mornings. They also carry Advertisement of events for the Conference based on our entitlements with them.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING

In addition to our main focus of spreading the gospel through our various communication mediums the department placed great emphasis on education and training our church communicators. Early in the period, team members across Jamaica were invited to attend the Jamaica Union Global Adventist Internet Network (GAIN) technology retreat July 4 - 6, 2019 under the theme, "Connect and Share - The Gospel according to Technology". Some of the topics covered over the three day even included: Advent Global Identity, Cinematography, Techniques in live Streaming, Digital Discipleship, Technology for persons with Disability, Website design and Crisis Management.

One of the main highlights of the Conference was the recognition of 15 individuals including Phillip Castell from East Jamaica Conference who made significant impact in the field of Communication within and outside (traditional media) of the Adventist Church.

The Communication Department continued on its path of training communicators and church members during the pandemic through our training sessions and workshops. Over the past two years, we were not able to have physical training sessions but we were still able to successfully conduct these training sessions via the Zoom platform.

- **The ABC's of News Writing and the use of Photography in Membership Retention,**
- **Internet, social media and effective discipleship**

Changes were made to the Communication Department team in 2019 when Mrs. Adiese Jonas- Murphy rejoined our Conference after serving in the West Jamaica Conference for three years. East Jamaica Conference benefited tremendously from her skills and giftedness in the area of music and online media ministry upon her return. Her contribution to the rise and growth of our online media ministry over the past three years has been significant. We give God all the glory for what we were able to achieve due to her ceaseless efforts and dedication to the work of God during this period.

Mr. Errol Vaz retired from active service at the start of 2021, after serving at the East Jamaica Conference for

more than 25 years. His contribution to the EJC Communication Department was priceless and his impact and pioneering work in the field of audio engineering will never be forgotten.

During the quadrennium, Mrs. Sophia Dormer who served in the Communication Department for over eight years was asked to serve in another department. She was replaced by Mrs. Herma Rose Reynolds who started serving in this department in February 2020.

CHALLENGES

HIJACKING OF YOUTUBE CHANNEL

On the morning of January 15, 2022, the day of the launch of Footprints of Hope Evangelistic Campaign across the island, we discovered that our YouTube Channel was hijacked and we lost control of the email address associated with the site and more than one thousand videos associated with our YouTube channel. The Department immediately advised our Administrators of what transpired and began the process of lodging a complaint to Youtube via Twitter, that our YouTube site was hijacked by malicious persons. They immediately began to use the site for their personal use. We disclosed what had transpired to our various stakeholders and requested prayer for the restoration of the site and its content although the prospects for restoration seemed dismal. Prayers were offered on the Conference's behalf by Pastor Glen Samuels during the Footprints of Hope series on the night of January 16, 2022 and the Directors of the East Jamaica Conference held a special prayer service to petition the Lord's intervention in the situation. Our YouTube Channel was returned and restored with all its contents in less than 48 hours. This is certainly answer to prayer and we are overjoyed that the Lord intervened on our behalf.

CONCLUSION

As new members join the church, the need for reliable and consistent information becomes critical to the smooth operation of the body of Christ. Members need to know what is happening in the church whether they attend church every week, occasionally, rarely or are considered home members or inactive members.

The Communication Department recognizes its role and importance in taking the gospel of the Kingdom far and wide as we see the signs being fast fulfilled. We sense that the coming of the Lord is even at the door and deem it a privilege to participate in the fulfillment of these words spoken by Christ himself in Matthew 24 : 14 "And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations; and then shall the end come."

INTRODUCTION

Sincere christian greetings to you delegates, distinguished guests and friends attending the 6th Quadrennial session of the East Jamaica Conference of Seventh-day Adventist Church.

In 1874 the Dorcas Society was organized. It was later called the Welfare Society. The name Seventh-day Adventist Welfare Society (SAWS) became popular among Seventh-day Adventists for a period of time. The name was subsequently changed to Adventist Community Services (ACS).

Today, with the greater vision, the church is encouraged to expand its services to the community through various ministries.

Being a part of the Personal Ministries in East Jamaica Conference, the Community Services department seeks to support the other departments in carrying out their mission of evangelism.

It is one of the objectives of the Community Services department to encourage every member of the Church to become involved in ministering to the needs of the community through his or her unique gifts and talents.

This concept is solidly supported by the following statements made by E. G. White in the book *Christ's Object Lessons*: "Not more surely is the place prepared for us in the heavenly mansion, than is the special place designated on earth where we are to work." COL, p. 326. She also recommends that wherever a church is established, the members should engage actively in missionary work. They should visit every family in the neighborhood and know their condition. CS, p. 12. In the book, *Welfare Ministry*, she made the suggestion that every church member should feel it a special duty to labor for those living in his community. WM, p. 190.

If every church member had sought to enlighten others, thousands upon thousands would today stand with God's commandment-keeping people. WM, p. 72.

It is gratifying to know that there are churches in our Conference that are following the counsels of E. G. White and are using the resources of the churches to serve the communities.

God has blessed our church with some committed, hard-working, and faithful members who carry the work of the church on their shoulders and in their hearts. The Community Services department of the Conference has been blessed with many of these members. One of these members who has been giving service beyond the call of duty is Elder Lorna Fowler, Community Services Federation President. Even before I assumed the position of Community Services Director towards the end of 2018, Elder Lorna Fowler along with myself, had been galvanizing the forces, ensuring that the work of the department continues to grow.

The Community Services Department believes that “Christ’s Method Alone Brings Success - Christ’s method alone will give true success in reaching the people. The Saviour mingled with men as one who desired their good. He showed His sympathy for them, ministered to their needs and won their confidence. Then He bade them, ‘Follow Me’” — The Ministry of Healing, p.143. This gave rise to our Mission Statement, Vision Statement, Motto, and Pledge:

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Adventist Community Services (ACS) International is to motivate, equip, and mobilize Seventh-day Adventist church members worldwide to meet unconditionally the expressed needs of people around them, thus fostering a trust relationship between Adventist churches and their surrounding communities, and nurturing people towards a restored, abundant life in Jesus (MH, p. 17; 1 John 10:10).

VISION STATEMENT

The vision of the Adventist Community Services International is that every Seventh-day Adventist church is a transforming agent in its community, following the method of Jesus, to help bring hope through ministries of compassion in His name (see Luke 4:16-21; MH, p.143).

THEME: Touching lives through Christian Service.

MOTTO: By the Grace of God, I will carry the gospel on the wheels of Community Services in my community.

PLEDGE: Loving the Lord Jesus, I promise to be kind and merciful to all in need so that the name of God will be glorified in my community.

TRAINING/EQUIPPING/DISASTER RELIEF

The consistent need for the church members to reach out to the community, demands that we train and equip members of the Federation as to how to effectively carry out the mission of the church and fulfill what the Master expects of us: “He showed His sympathy for them, ministered to their needs, and won their confidence, then He bade them, ‘Follow Me’” — The Ministry of Healing, p.143.

During the period under review (2018 - 2021) we have had training done in Proposals Writing in order to access funding from donor agencies. We also had training in Shelter Management as well. These were done by the Office of Disaster Preparedness and Emergency Management (ODPEM) as the whole range of activities necessary to effectively carry out the work of the department. Our intensive training came during the times that we had our retreats/convocations at Golden Acres, April 8 – 10, 2018 and February 2 - 4, 2019. In 2018 we had approximately 95 persons and in 2019 there were approximately 110 persons who were in

attendance. The Community Services directors from the churches were also involved in the ACS School of Evangelism, conducted by Pastor Carl Cunningham. In the months of June and July, 2021, this was done online.

There are approximately 120 trained Shelter Managers across the constituency. These managers, along with the uniformed groups in 105 Churches are ready to assist with humanitarian needs that may arise from natural or manmade disasters. In February 2019, we conducted a combined Community Services, Publishing and Spirit of Prophecy Consecration Service at the Half Way Tree Church. The theme was "Transformed to Serve - I will go." We had our Community Services Federation Convocation, under the theme, "Transformed for His Service." We also conducted training in Publishing and Spirit of Prophecy.

Every fourth Sunday of each month the Federation meets for planning, instructions, training and encouragement. Members meet from across the four zones – Kingston and St. Andrew (zones 1–3) and St. Thomas (zone 4). Members are encouraged to do needs assessments of their communities and plan for projects that will be of utmost benefit to all and sundry.

We continue to count our blessings! For the period in review, we have not had to deal with any major disaster from across the constituency. We had one major threat which necessitated our having to make preparations and activating our shelter at the Edith Dalton James High School.

From time to time the department receives from Food for the Poor, a small quantity of food items. As a rule, we distribute to the churches where there is an active community feeding program and then to those who have dire needs in their churches and communities. Pastors and Community Services personnel call and visit the Conference weekly, seeking assistance for members; community persons; and often, fire victims. The sad fact is that we do not have the resources to meet the requests of all these genuine needs.

In order to gather funds to assist with our programs, the department staged a fundraising Concert - Festival of Praise, on April 9, 2018, at the V. H. Percy Multipurpose Centre, Kencot. This was a successful venture. Thanks to all those who contributed to the event.

Our Community Services representatives in the churches continue to conduct training programmes such as sewing classes, manual arts, cooking classes, evening classes and training in Community Services Management.

With the start of the Food Bank initiative, training sessions were conducted by Pastor Lorenzo Brown, coordinator, Pastor Adrian Cotterell and Sister Lorna Fowler.

DISTRIBUTIONS

During the period under review, we established distribution centers throughout the four zones in the Conference. These serve to make distribution accessible to the community members.

Special donation was made by Food for the Poor: we received five (5) sewing machines, eighteen (10) two-burner stoves, and two (2) small refrigerators, three hundred 300

The Department also received food stuff, and other items, which were distributed among the four zones in the Conference, during the period under review. Altogether, we were able to deliver to the constituency, food, clothing, building material, bedding, medical assistance, and educational assistance.

Six hundred (600) pairs of reading glasses were made available to the department by the Kiwanis Club of Kingston.

Since the establishment of the Food Bank in 2021, we received our first supply of ground provision and grocery items and we were able to supply some 12 districts. We say, to God be the glory! Special thanks to our Community Services Federation members who are always willing to get together and prepare packages for distribution, whenever the need arises.

The Gordon Town SDA Church Community Services Department for the years 2017-2022, led by Bro. Donovan McNee and his team, through sponsorship from different entities, we were able to make packages of food items, clothes, and shoes which was delivered to hundreds of persons in the Gordon Town church and community, food packages were also given to other churches included,

Woodford, Mavis Bank, Bull Bay, Shashire village etc, as well as needy individual that has no connection to any of the above named churches, since 2013-2019, we were able to do year-end treat consisting of cooked meals, gifts, snacks as well as health clinics, with nurses, pharmacists, issuing of medication, HIV testing, body mass testing, games and concerts. Food packages are being issued at least once per quarter to over 100 persons, over 350 persons benefited from the year-end treat.

FLOODING

The Community Services Department, along with ADRA has always been willing to respond in times of disaster. During the period, volunteers from the Churches assisted flood victims in the parishes of Kingston, St. Andrew and St. Thomas.

During the flood rains in November 2020 and 2021, communities in St. Andrew, especially Bull Bay, were severely affected and the Community Services department was called upon by the Government and ODPEM to assist in the assessment and registration of victims. The team, consisting of the Community Services Director, the Youth Director, Pastor Brian Shaw along with Master Guides, as well as scores of volunteers from the churches, rallied to the cause, after which the findings were submitted to the Office of Disaster Preparedness and Emergency Management (ODPEM). We thank all those who gave so willingly of their service.

Through the local Community Services departments, we were able to put in place provision for over 2,500 lunches daily.

Special commendation must be given to all our Pastors and members, our Master Guides, under the direction of the Youth Director, Pastor Brian Shaw and some of our secretaries, for assisting in cleaning up the homes of these victims in Wees Road and other communities. Special mention must be made of 15 Pastors from East Jamaica Conference who, for two consecutive days, went into Wees Road, Bull Bay to do counselling and pray with families and individuals during the terrible ordeal in the 2021 flood. The New Haven and St. Benedicts Community Services department's centers were used as shelter for those whose homes were flooded out in that area.

The flooding of November 2021 in Kingston, St. Andrew, and St. Thomas allowed us once more to witness a practical demonstration of the tremendous ability of the Seventh-day Adventist Church to respond in time of disaster and to deal effectively each time.

We must pause to give God thanks in all of this, that the churches here in East Jamaica Conference, along with the Community Services Department, are doing their part in helping suffering humanity to get back on track.

Special thanks to members of the Port Morant, Seaforth, Morant Bay, Yallahs, Harbour View, Kencot, Constant

Spring and Washington Gardens churches for their selfless efforts.

COMMUNITY SERVICES TRAINING AND WORKSHOPS

The Community Services Department, in collaboration with the Health Ministries Department, conducted cooking workshops in all four zones throughout the Conference. About 150 persons were taught how to prepare vegetarian dishes.

Joint workshops involving the Community Services, Publishing, and Spirit of Prophecy departments were also conducted for the four zones within the Conference on how to be aware of the Community's needs and how to minister to these needs.

The highlight of our workshops was a retreat in Robin's Bay where we had over 130 individuals attending. We were blessed by presentations from Pastor Meric Walker, Pastor Adrian Cottrell and President Nathan.

Since the year 2018, the Community Services department of the East Jamaica Conference has conducted a number of training workshops to educate members on several relevant topics to minister effectively in their communities. To date, almost 100 individuals have completed training in First Aid. It is encouraging to see the many individuals who continue to express their desire to be trained for service in their communities.

OTHER OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

A special week of community outreach usually takes place in October and is called the **Week of Generosity and Day of Kindness**. During this week each church member is encouraged to perform special acts of kindness to their neighbors and each church should Community Services directors, along with Pathfinders, distribute care packages and physically assist where possible.

In October, 2019, furniture valuing over \$1,500,000, donated by members of the churches, was presented to persons in Trench Town, August Town and Bull Bay, as well as St. Joseph's Hospital, and The Golden Age Home.

In 2021, five stoves, five sewing machines, two refrigerators, 200 pairs of shoes were given out in the Bull Bay area. These were gifts from Food for the Poor.

A special programme "Love in the Marketplace" was planned for December 4 – 11, 2021, in collaboration with all the Departmental Directors, ASI, GSI, CWD, the Youth Department, Pastors and all our Churches joined hands together in preparation for "Breaking the Evangelistic Glass Ceiling." A tremendous impact was made on the communities around. East Jamaica Conference spent over \$2,000,000, with another \$500,000 from CWD; \$1,300,000 from churches and \$300,000 from ASI. We have distributed thousands of care packages, school supplies, wheelchairs

and conducted health clinics, family counselling, education awareness and repairing of homes.

27 individuals received material to help with the repairs of their houses, in the four zones across the Conference.

Nineteen (19) individuals who were affected by the flood rains in Bull Bay were given building materials and human resources to help with cleaning up to get individuals back on track.

REPORT FROM CHURCHES

One of the challenges that departmental directors have experienced with the churches over the years is non-reporting, however an estimated report shows the value of over thirteen million 13 in cash and kind was being distributed by various churches during the period.

THE GOOD SAMARITAN INN

The Good Samaritan Inn (GSI) is without a doubt, the flagship Community Services program in East Jamaica Conference and by extension, Jamaica Union. It is operated by the East Jamaica Conference (EJC) and the Adventist-Laypersons Services and Industries (ASI). It is located at 2 - 4 Geffrard Place, Kingston (Heroes' Circle).

Commendation must go to the members of the GSI committee, in particular, Elder Vermont Murray, a member of the Andrews Seventh-day Adventist Church, who has been giving sterling service to ensure that this program continues to grow from strength to strength. We sing the praises of all those who gave financial assistance and continue to do so, as well as those working on the grounds among the thousands of needy persons who depend on the Inn.

For the past several years the Good Samaritan Inn has been an oasis in the desert of human needs, existing in and around the communities in which the Inn is located. The Inn provides a number of services, namely:

- hot meals
- overnight shelter for those in dire straits
- laundry facilities
- sanitary facilities – 6 days per week
- health care on a limited basis
- clothing
- education assistance

THRIFT SHOP

The idea of the Thrift Shop was conceptualized by the Community Services Federation a few years ago. This idea was re-established in 2019 in East Jamaica Conference to provide goods and services to the constituency at a significantly reduced cost and to provide a market for the items produced from the skills training programmes of the various Community Services departments in the churches, along with individual's contributions.

Special thanks must be given to several individuals from our churches, both locally and overseas, who gave clothing to the shop. Special mention must also be made of Spencer's Tailoring Establishment, that made an outstanding contribution in 2020 of over 300 men's suits and in 2021, 40 shirts. Thanks to Sister Spencer for her generosity.

Between 2018 and 2022 over 300 persons (fire victims and scores of other individuals) were assisted from the Thrift Shop. These gifts included care packages, medical assistance, furniture, blankets, stoves, personal effects, and over \$1,879,000 in cash. Altogether, through the Thrift Shop, goods and services given during the four-year period, totals over \$3,000,000. We say, to God be the glory!

HOUSING DISTRIBUTED AND REPAIRED

The Community Services department, along with East Jamaica Conference, Food for the Poor and ADRA was able to assist with the construction of 4, 16 x 12 one-bedroom units – one each, in Trench Town, Tom's River, Seaforth and Constitution Hill. Repairs were done to over 47 houses and

The Good Samaritan Inn continues to partner with the Heroes Circle Seventh-day Adventist Church and corporate Jamaica to build a holistic ministry, catering to the mental, emotional, physical, and spiritual needs of some of the most vulnerable in our society.

Each Sunday Community Services Federation members from the churches in the zones take turns to prepare approximately 280 meals for the Inn to feed those who visit with the hope of obtaining a warm meal. The meals are prepared in the Community Services kitchen in each church throughout the Conference. Plans are far advanced for the meals to be prepared in the recently constructed kitchen on the grounds of the Inn.

Meals are also provided every other Monday by the Half Way Tree Seventh-day Adventist Church; on Tuesdays, by the University College of the Caribbean (UCC); and on Wednesdays by the Fosrich Group of Companies, headed by Elder Cecil Foster. Special thanks to the afore-mentioned individuals and groups, as well as Hose Assembly and Supply for sponsoring the Christmas Treat last December.

In the year 2018 the Inn served over 27,000 meals at a value of \$7,501,993; provided medical treatment to 4,615 persons at a value of \$7,100,000; and given out scores of pieces of clothing to many in need. All this was made possible by the support coming from:

- church remittances - \$4,930,186;
- church donations - \$1,500,000;
- corporate donations - \$1,875,597;
- ingathering - \$1,019,708;
- donations in kind - \$13,069,545.

The Community Services department thanks all who support the Inn and wants them to know that their contribution is eternally appreciated.

CHURCHES WITH FEEDING/OUTREACH PROGRAMS

It is our settled conviction that, if the work of the Community Services is done in the proper way, there will be no need for expensive evangelistic campaigns. Consequently, we must commend the churches across the Conference that have an active community outreach program. Some of these churches are:

OVERVIEW

The Education Department of the East Jamaica Conference of Seventh-day Adventists exists for the purpose of promoting the unique causes of Seventh-day Adventist, Christian Education, based on its philosophical foundation. The Seventh-day Adventist Church was founded on biblical principles that are intertwined with the SDA Education System across the world. The Education program of the church places the utmost importance on building characters in the lives of our children and young people. It also offers ample provision for the acquisition of the skills which help in the mental, social, vocational and physical development of the students, with emphasis on spirituality and service.

The Department strives to place a heavy emphasis on the role of the schools as being gateways to the Kingdom for its learners, recognizing that “the work of education and redemption are one.” (Education, p.13).

MISSION STATEMENT

“To provide Adventist Education that seeks to prepare students to be thinkers rather than mere reflectors of other’s thoughts, thus developing their highest potential through the four main aspects - Spiritual, Physical, Mental and Social, for productive service in this world and the world to come.”

SPIRITUAL EMPHASIS

Surrounded by teachers and staff who have made their relationship with Jesus Christ, the Master Teacher, the foundation of their lives, students were encouraged daily in their spiritual walk with God through a number of spiritual activities. These activities included Weeks of Prayer, Daily Devotions, Noonday Meditation, Bible Class, Community Impact Days, Day of Kindness, School's Evangelism Emphasis Week, Prayer and Fasting Sessions for Staff and Students and many more. In addition, all our schools were actively involved in the "Lord Transform Me" and "Breaking the Evangelistic Glass Ceiling" Initiatives. The Annual IAD Day of Prayer has made a very powerful impact on our schools. On this day, all academic work ceases and the focus is on prayer and praise.

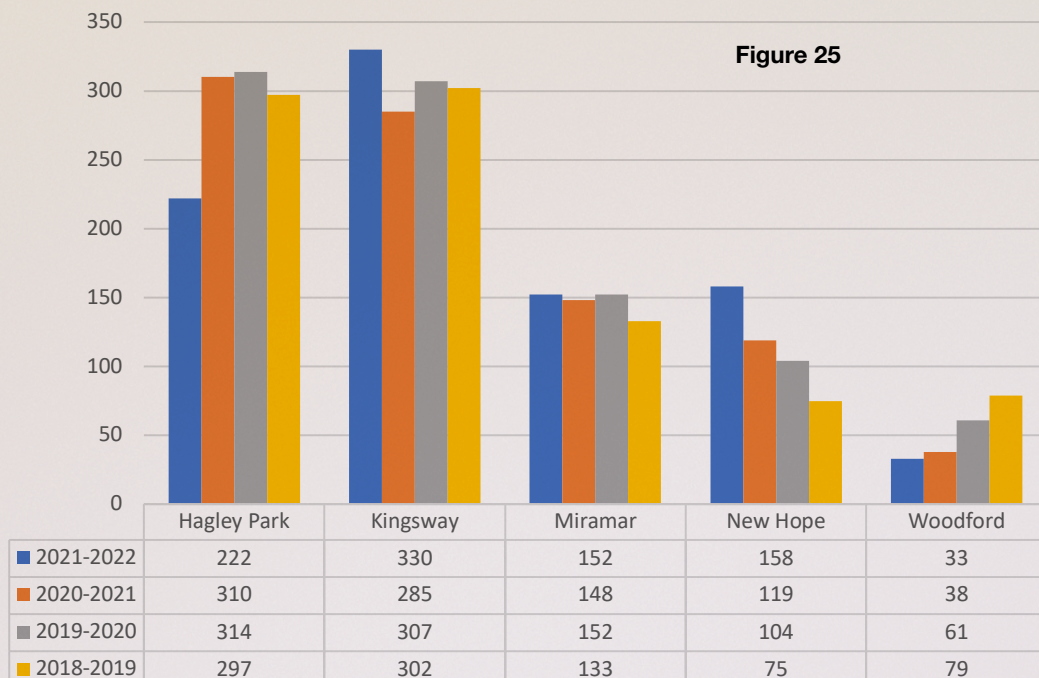

TEACHING STAFF AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Within our schools, there is a team of qualified, passionate and dedicated teachers. These teachers are trained to utilize cutting-edge technology to enhance learning both in the virtual and physical classroom. The teaching population consists of 65 teachers in the Preparatory schools and 26 teachers, including 3 part-time teachers, in the High School, thus making a total of 91 teachers. A total of 53 (58%) of our teachers hold a master's or a bachelor's degree in specific and/or related disciplines. Those without a first degree are currently pursuing/preparing to pursue same.

During the quadrennium, three of our schools changed principals: Mr. Lambert Forrest, in 2020 retired after serving the New Hope Preparatory School for over ten years. Our profound appreciation to Mr. Forrest for the tremendous contribution that he gave to the growth of Adventist Christian Education within the East Jamaica Conference. We wish for him a happy retirement. Mr. Forrest was succeeded by Mrs. Joette Smith-Jumpp, former Principal for the Miramar Kinder Preparatory School. We thank Mrs.

Smith-Jumpp for the sterling contribution that she gave to the Miramar Kinder Prep School and welcomed her to the New Hope Preparatory School family. Mrs. Frys-Butler succeeded Mrs. Smith-Jumpp. Mr. David McNeish who served the Woodford Preparatory School as Principal for over nine years was transferred to the Kingsway High School. He was succeeded by Mrs. Iona Newland. Sincere gratitude to Mr. McNeish for the service given to the Woodford Preparatory School and we welcome Mrs. Newland to the Woodford School family.

During the period under review we said goodbye to five of our outstanding educators. Mrs. Pauline Jackson, Mrs.

Beverly Hutchinson and Mrs. Veleta Barnett who served the Hagley Park Preparatory School for more than 25 years. Mrs. Metlyn Lewis and Mrs. Joyce Tucker served for over 19 and 16 years, respectively at the New Hope Preparatory School. We thank them for their service and desire God's choicest blessings on them as they enjoy and experience this chapter of their lives.

STUDENT ENROLMENT

At the start of the quadrennium in 2018, our schools had a combined population of 1,332 students: 886 in our preparatory schools and 446 at Kingsway High School. We ended with enrolment of 895 in our preparatory schools (an increase of 1%) and 376 at Kingsway High School (a decrease of 10%). Both Preparatory and High School enrolment fluctuated during the period under review. Kingsway, New Hope and The Miramar Kinder Preparatory schools saw a steady increase for the 2021 - 2022 school year. Hagley Park Preparatory had a decrease within the same period and Woodford Preparatory continues to struggle with the issue of low enrolment for the past three years. The

current Adventist Ratio for both our Preparatory Schools and our High School is of great concern. Currently we are at an overall average range of 38% SDA to 62% non-SDA students. The recommended ratio is 70% SDA to 30% non-SDA. There is a significant need for us to strive for a renaissance of parental interest in Adventist Education.

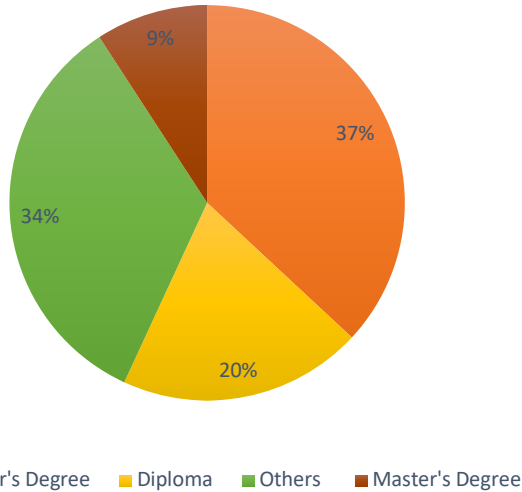


Figure 26: Teacher Qualifications for the preparatory schools

Academic Staff Qualifications

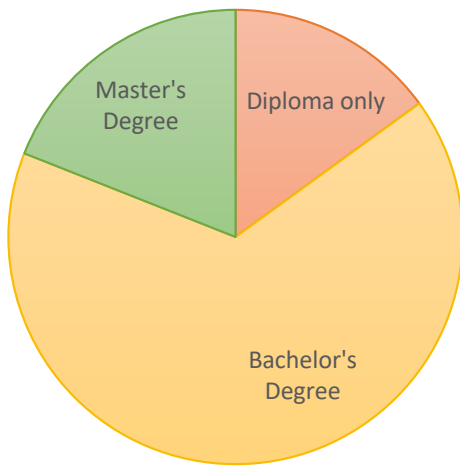


Figure 27: High School Academic Staff Qualifications

Professional Development among the teacher staff is of utmost importance. During the period under review, numerous development seminars were conducted to increase teachers' expertise in their respective fields and build confidence in the work that they do. Outstanding specialists and practitioners in the field of Education, Health, Counseling, Finance, Human Relations and Leadership engaged staff members in developmental activities to motivate and enhance their personal and professional skills and competencies, as guided by the maxim to "meet the tasks and challenges of each new school year."

All our teachers participated in the Jamaica Union Teachers' Retreat held at the Iberostar Hotel, St. James, during the month of October 2019. It was a time set aside for education, relaxation, fellowship and stimulation. Dr. Newton Hoilette, former Vice President of Andrews University, was the keynote speaker. He was joined by a team of distinguished presenters, including Dr. Faye Patterson, then Associate Director of the Inter-American Division; Dr. Faithlyn Wilson, President of the Jamaica Independent Schools in the Ministry of Education and other resource persons. The Retreat ended with an exciting awards ceremony where outstanding teachers from our preparatory and high schools were recognized. We say congratulations to Mrs. Sherene Brown-Townsend, who was the recipient of the most outstanding teacher's award from the East Jamaica Conference.

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE, CURRICULUM AND EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

This quadrennium saw a steady improvement in the preparatory schools' academic performance on the various national standardized examinations. However, there has been some level of inconsistency in the level of CSEC passes. The year 2018 was the final year of the GSAT external examination and subsequently the Primary Exit Profile (PEP) was implemented in 2019. An average of approximately 83% of our students were placed in traditional high schools during the period under review. For the Grade 4 Literacy and Numeracy external examination over 95% of our students maintained the Mastery Level. Special commendations to the Kingsway Preparatory School, who in 2018, from a list of over 262 Preparatory Schools was ranked 48th in the island and was labeled a Gold Standard School by the Gold Standard Preparatory School Guide. Also, commendations to the Hagley Park Junior Schools' Challenge team for their hard work and dedication in making it to round 2 in the 2021 TVJ Junior Schools' Challenge Quiz competition. "Hats off" to the committed teachers for their hard work and consistency in the preparation of the students.

There has been some level of inconsistency in the level of CSEC passes for the Kingsway High. The school recorded an average pass rate of approximately 70% over the past four (4) years. Four (4) subject areas, namely: Food, Nutrition & Health, Information Technology, and Physical Education have seen 100% passes over the four-year period. The School's performance in Mathematics saw a marked improvement in 2020 and Biology in 2021; however, the other Science subject continues to be a challenge for us. Three students were entered for Additional Mathematics for the first time in 2019. Congratulations to Garcia Gordon who was successful in obtaining a passing grade in the subject. Garcia graduated in 2019 with 13 subjects. Special commendations also to Amenda Allen who graduated with 11 subjects and Shevon Williams, one of our Government-sponsored male, non-Seventh-day Adventist students who graduated with ten (10) subjects in the same year. History was created at Kingsway High when we had our first Kingsway Preparatory, 8 years old student, Josiah

DiCarlo the youngest student ever to sit and pass the CSEC examination in Electronic Document Preparation and Management.

Despite all the challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, Kingsway High and Preparatory School was able to officially launch its website and YouTube channel. Parents are now able to submit Applications online, pay fees through wire transfer and do business in the comfort of their homes or wherever they choose. Students' performance can be tracked and monitored by parents from anywhere in the world, using our school management system - Renweb and our Google platform. All Kingsway students, upon registration, are assigned a school email address and parents are able to monitor assignments given and see due/submission dates. Please feel free to visit the school's web site at <http://www.kingsway.edu.jm/>. There is currently a plan in place to ensure that all our other schools will be able to implement a Renweb school management system with similar features, as quickly as possible.

Over the past four years, most of our schools were able to expand their co-curricular activities, which in turn has served as an impetus for the growth of our population. These activities include, though not limited to, the following: Swimming, Gymnastics, Football, Netball, Keyboard, Violin and Creative Expression. Some of the schools have also implemented /expanded several clubs and societies, including: Food & Nutrition, Speech & Drama, Bible, Junior Schools' Challenge Quiz, Spelling, Art & Craft, Choir, Sign Language and Girls of Eloquence and Moral Standards (GEMS). Students also actively participated in Refinement Week and Friendship Week programmes. With the advent of the COVID-19, some of these activities had to be placed on hold, however, since March 2022 most of the schools have begun the process of resuming some of the activities. Special commendations to the New Hope Preparatory School where the students received multiple gold medals in the JCDC 2018 and 2019 Festival competitions in the areas of: Speech and Musical Performances.

INFRASTRUCTURAL DEVELOPMENT

Over the past quadrennium, tremendous efforts were made in improving the physical plant of all our schools. With the assistance of the Conference-wide Development (CWD) Committee, five (5) additional classrooms were constructed at the Kingsway High School. The facility now hosts the Literacy Laboratory, Music Room, Auto Mechanic Room and a "state of the art" Food & Nutrition Laboratory. The CWD committee, in collaboration with the Andrews Memorial SDA Church, Mrs. Novelette Tai and the Alumni Associations, also renovated the Science Laboratories. The Chemistry,

Biology, Physics and Integrated Science students now have comfortable, fully-equipped facilities to conduct their experiments. Due to the success of the "Mediathon 2020" hosted by all four (4) chapters of the Kingsway Alumni Associations, the school was able to renovate the Information Technology Laboratory, purchasing a new server, desktop computers, laptops for teachers to use for online classes and the repainting of the room. Many of the students were also beneficiaries of tablets that were donated and distributed at this event. Thanks to the Alumni Association, New York Chapter, that continues to give its best to Kingsway over these many years. The first phase of a Solar Lighting Project has been implemented. This has resulted in a significant drop in the electricity usage of the school.

The aesthetics of the Kingsway Preparatory School has seen great improvement. A recreational Gravel Park was created for the benefit of the students' social life. Flowers

have been planted in the gardens along the walls of the school. The derelict building that was on the compound has been removed and now houses the caretakers, one classroom and the library. In addition to the Pre-Kinder Class that was added in 2014, one more Pre-Kinder was added for the 2017 - 2018 academic year. To date, there are a total of 13 classes in the Preparatory School. The major building of the school was also repainted and renovations were done to all classrooms, which included additional desks and chairs in most of the rooms. A pantry was also added for the staff.

The school has installed Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) Cameras around its compound for monitoring, surveillance and security purposes of the compound. The school can now obtain a visual record of most activities, as well as maintain proper security and access controls. Thanks to the partnership of the school with the East Jamaica Conference

Youth Ministries Department and the Kencot SDA Church: the school's playfield got a long-awaited overhaul and is no longer a dust bowl.

The New Hope Preparatory School also experienced significant growth and expansion within the period under review. A vision, years in the hearts and minds of the stakeholders, was finally realized – a brand new classroom block was erected during the height of the pandemic. This development saw the addition of three (3) spacious classrooms, one (1) library, one (1) reading room, a music room, counseling room and an assembly area. This quadrennium also saw the Andrews Memorial Hospital refurbishing the main restrooms for the students as well as providing the needed fire extinguishers to complement the school's fire-safety program. Finally, in 2019 and 2021, the New Hope Preparatory Home and School Association refreshed the school's play area, bringing great joy and cheer to all students on a daily basis and hosted a very successful Fish Fry which helped the school to purchase over 90 student desk-chair combos.

Among the infrastructural developments at the Hagley Park, Miramar and Woodford Preparatory schools were: refurbishing of bathrooms, setting up of isolation rooms, along with other COVID -19 requirements, the painting of school buildings and the securing of additional classroom spaces. The Woodford Preparatory School is currently in the construction stage of acquiring an upper floor to the current school's structure. This new floor, upon completion, will host additional classrooms, a library, a Principal's office, additional rest rooms and an assembly area for the students.

FINANCE

Among the various challenges facing the operation of private schools is that of keeping the institution financially viable. We are extremely grateful to God that today all our schools are still in operation despite the challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic. We express profound gratitude to the members of the Executive Committee of the East Jamaica Conference for voting for the establishment of an eight-member subcommittee (chaired by Dr. Noel Morgan) called the Financial Oversight Committee (FOC) on September 18, 2018. The primary role of its five-point Terms of Reference was to provide financial oversight and support for schools operated by EJC. This came against the background of the ongoing financial challenges experienced by the schools in attaining and maintaining financial self-sustainability. Among the major accomplishments of the Committee during the period under review are:

- **Conducting Training Seminar for School Principals, Vice-Principals, and Bursars on “Prudent Financial Considerations for EJC Schools;”**
- **Meeting with the Kingsway High School Accreditation Team and advising the team of its partnership and of work done for the School by the FOC;**

- **Assisting Kingsway High School with preparing Financial Statements and securing Financial Audit;**
- **Providing (in collaboration with the CWD) additional classroom space for KHS and Miramar;**
- **Ongoing advice to the Schools' Leadership on having up-to-date financial statements, operating canteen as a profit centre, involvement of PTA in reducing past receivables via awareness, and preparation of monthly cash flow statements;**
- **Collaboration with Kingsway High that resulted in the significant reduction of outstanding taxes.**

Today all our schools have implemented several cost-cutting measures and are planning on executing various fund-raising activities, restructuring of the Marketing and Recruitment programme and engaging greater collaboration of all stakeholders, including the policy makers, as they continue working assiduously to alleviate this problem.

ACCREDITATION

All our schools were able to complete their accreditation exercise for this quadrennium. Kingsway High had their accreditation assessment done in December 2018. The Director of the team was Dr. Faye Patterson from the Inter American Division and the school received accreditation status for three (3) years. In September and October 2019, Hagley Park, Kingsway, Miramar, New Hope and Woodford Preparatory Schools had their accreditation exercise conducted. Extra special commendation to the Miramar School family for reaching such a significant milestone in completing their first accreditation exercise.

FORMATION OF ALUMNI ASSOCIATIONS

During the period under review, we saw an increase in the number of Alumni Associations formed within our schools. Indeed, we are grateful for these associations as they help in fostering a spirit of loyalty to their respective alma maters and contribute to the promotion and financial support of our institutions. “Hats off” to Mrs. Clover Burrows and her team for keeping the KHS New York Alumni Chapter going for all these many years.

EARLY CHILDHOOD INSTITUTIONS (ECI'S) OPERATED BY THE LOCAL CHURCHES

Over the period under review, special effort was made for a greater collaboration among the Early Childhood Institu-

tions (ECI's) within the constituency. These schools do not receive any appropriation from the Conference. The New Haven ECI celebrated their 30th Anniversary in the 2020 - 2021 school year and the Sunbeam Beam ECI, operated by the Meadowvale SDA Church, celebrated their 30th anniversary during this (2021 - 2022) school year. All the stakeholders deserve special commendations for the tremendous support given over the years in helping to provide Christ-centered Adventist Early Childhood Education for children within the church's community. The pandemic has affected the operation of some of these ECI's and at least four (4) had to close their doors, with the intention of reopening for the 2022 - 2023 school year.

Despite the challenges presented by the pandemic in the education sector, the Education Department is pleased to report that many of the churches within the consistency conducted various Education Activities (face to face and online) within the period under review. Some of the activities and events included:

- Providing financial assistance and scholarships for needy students;
- Assisting in sourcing Tablets and Laptops for needy students;
- Preparing and disseminating of online tutorials to assist students in navigating the virtual space;
- Celebrating of annual Education Week;
- Conducting Evening Classes and Marathons for GSAT and CSEC students (online/face to face);
- Having face to face and online recognition programmes for students who have excelled at different levels of their educational pursuits;
- Ongoing promotion for the support of Adventist Christian Education.

Entrenched in its operation is the preparation of families for the Kingdom and to make the family an evangelistic centre.

Cognizant of the fact that the family is a significant social unit, the department, driven by needs assessment, focused on relationship building during its tenure. We provided growth and wellness activities for couples, parents, children, adolescents, singles, widows and widowers, and members of the community. Based on the brokenness experienced by individuals and families, we encouraged the application of grace and forgiveness.

1. WIDOWS & WIDOWERS

When the bond of marriage is shattered by death, life changes for the surviving spouse. In 2017 we started our first session for widows and widowers. Reflecting on the need to be more intentional with our widows & widowers led to the formation of a ministry in 2021. This is coordinated by Markion Stanbury, and Joan Stewartson as the Vice president. Our last forum was held in February 2022 on the zoom platform. Quarterly activities will be held for this group.

2. RETREATS

Relaxation and restoration were sentiments echoed by the family members who invested in the many weekend getaways. Many churches went to various retreat sites including exotic hotels. This was a welcome treat to those who wanted to rejuvenate as also for those who came seeking a marital or family reunion boost to enhance their walk with God.

Iberostar Hotel, Montego Bay on October 15-18, 2021 was the venue for our last EJC Family Ministries Retreat, themed "Creating Memories". This was a retreat with a difference. Families spent 90% of the retreat hours basking in quality time together instead of the regular seminars. For many

families, this was a most touching moment. Still others said this was the first time they had the opportunity to be listened to in this impactful way. There were short nuggets for singles and couples, singing of favourite Sabbath songs, and husbands affirming their wives in the presence of their children.

3. COUNSELLING SERVICE

The department is passionate about relationship mending and building. A cadre of thirty (30) volunteer counsellors availed themselves to the constituency and community for guidance and counselling services. These were offered in group and individual counselling sessions and seminar presentations. Based on request from zone four, a mobile wellness service was set up at the Yallahs Church offering service every 1st Wednesday from 10 a.m. – 1 p.m. since 2017. Various types of wellness services have been made accessible to the constituency. In our effort to connect and share we have extended the service to members of the public. In 2019 we added online zoom service to our offering.

The impact of the services from our volunteer counsellors has been tremendous. Many persons have either delayed or dismissed planned negative actions as a result of the counselling offered. GRIEF COUNSELLING

Since 2019, numerous grief sessions for loss of loved ones, death in relationships, separation, broken relationships with parent child or significant others were conducted. This was partially due to the negative impact of COVID19 and the resulting traumatic and sudden deaths. Our proactive approach in conducting seminars at various churches to equip team members and the church on how to handle the reality of the challenges related to grief has helped the congregants to better help families and individuals cope and handle issues caused by death, separation, loss or abuse. At our last group session held March 13, we trained our Health, Family and Women's Ministries department leaders how to respond to grief. We are grateful to the Northern Caribbean University Behavioural Science Department and the team of volunteers in EJC who continue to assist, especially those caused by tragic situations.

All churches should endeavour to be a base for building single and single again adults. The department gave support to the single forums that were held in the churches, sourcing speakers or making presentations on the EJC platform. Some of the topics covered were:

“Loving You”, “Clashes & Matches”, “Getting to Know Before You Go”, “Court in Trouble”, “Ants Nest” & “Predicting Marriage Failure”.

We hope to respond more fully to the call to provide focused support for the divorced and separated as well as understand how we can encourage and engage more males to the seminars and retreats.

We pause to acknowledge Elder Joan Clarke (now deceased) who gave of herself to this ministry for decades.

Hats off to the executive team that worked assiduously during the period led by the EJC ASAM Coordinator, Lenroy Stewart.

4. ADVENTIST SINGLE ADULT MINISTRIES (ASAM)

The life of a single adult with its unique demands, necessitates an understanding of the issues related to groupings. Single adults fall into four classifications never married, divorced, separated or widowed. A further grouping, single parents can be an additional subgroup of any of these four categories. Some activities were held throughout the four years at the church, district and conference level. However, it's disconcerting to know that in many churches no one has been appointed single ministries leader and so that uphill struggle exists to grow the ministry in all churches. Additionally, the perceptions that some members hold about this ministry has created an impediment. Our last report in February 2022 revealed that only 25 churches had selected ASAM leaders.

5. COMMITTED WIVES MINISTRY

Information garnered from assessments conducted based on the March 26, 2017 **Moments with My Forever** held at the Liguanea Club and “Made to Love You Forever” on February 10, 2018 at the Jamaica Conference Centre indicated that there was a need to give full attention to the matter of intimacy. The findings of the family ministries spousal informal survey indicated that increased emotional attention could stem the slippery direction of many marriages. The response was to provide a space where wives can model support and provide mentorship for younger wives.

This gave birth to EJC **Committed Wives' Ministry, March 13, 2020**, out of the need to help wives better understand how to be intentional in maintaining their marriage as well as how to manage marital obligations. Our main objective ...to explore ways to protect and sizzle intimacy, is making inroads, as well as creating a tremendous inspiration and impact. Each couple was asked to pledge “I Promise God under the setting of the February 10, 2018 sun that we WILL LOVE each other until DEATH do us part”. We are tracking the results.

Quarterly forums are held where practical strategies are shared as well as daily and monthly activities. Additionally, there is a monthly wedding anniversary focus where wives ensure that activities are done leading up to and after the anniversary. In addition, prayers and little surprise ideas are shared and executed. This ministry is led by Marsha –Jay Marshal with a fine cadre of dedicated wives.

6. COMMITTED HUSBANDS' MINISTRY

A similar ministry of support was also needed for the husbands to practise and or reinforce the PPC principle of being a committed husband. On December 13, 2020 we launched the Committed Husbands' Ministry. Of note is the original song that these male spouses have put together titled 'Committed Men' and the inroads and mentoring that has taken place. It is expected that the PPC principle to P- Pause to gain patience especially when tensions are raging; P- Pray to air positive attitude and C- Choose Christ and His Words to battle with the marital enemy virus, will be used as the renewed antidote for greater bonding.

COUPLES IN ACTION MOMENTS

Couples in Action (CIA), a name adopted by EJC from zone 4, Hampton Court in St. Thomas is making inroads throughout the other three zones. Many couples are benefiting from the daily spousal devotional nuggets and gems being done in the groups.

It is pleasing to report that many churches had a variation of couple's celebrations at different venues in various styles throughout the 4 years. Spiritual bonding and intimacy are the objectives underlying this CIA group, or CIAF (the name used by the Andrews Memorial Church). The number of couples participating in this ministry has grown over the years.

The discussions in these groups are focused on communication, prayer, intimacy and finance. This is in answer to the needs presented in the evaluation at a forum at the Jamaica Conference Centre. The summary of the evaluation chronicled commendations in all areas presented except that most couples underscored a need for a fulsome discussion on intimacy. Highest commendations to the St.

Thomas, Arcadia group who have shown a steady growth in the number of non SDAs in their group as well as the CIAF group for their wide reach.

7. COUPLES DATA

We continue the process of collecting data re the number of couples in each church. The assistance of Dirk and Amala Harrison in creating the database and inputting the information in 2015 has made it less challenging since then. See below the updated information.

8. IN LOOK

During the quadrennium seminars were presented to different family groups including grandparents, in-laws and divorcees. Our intention is to have the individual churches continue the ministry in the churches.

The General Conference (GC) FM Directors Dr. Willie and Elaine Oliver provided resources to guide the activities of the FM. Resources include sermons, seminar material, stories for the special family weeks and Sabbaths. These resources contain material for the four annual calendared dates: Christian Home and Marriage Week (February) and Family Togetherness Week in September.

The resource material, sent annually to the churches, covers all areas of family ministry including step parenting, grandparents, in-laws, family sermons, children stories and seminar material.

OUTLOOK: Immediate Areas of Need

1. Seminars to cover areas such as:
2. Changing values related to marriage
3. New challenges facing families
4. Interracial marriages
5. Changing sex and family roles
6. Continue to optimize ways to strengthen marriage
7. Churches to select a male representative for ASAM

INTRODUCTION

Mr. Chairman, esteemed delegates, brothers, sisters and friends, Christian greetings on behalf of the East Jamaica Conference Health Ministries Department. The Seventh-day Adventist church has long held the conviction that God has called and endowed her with the responsibility to champion the cause of health reform through the practice, preaching and teaching of the health message since 1863.

Over the years we have witnessed the proliferation of life-threatening diseases across the globe; diseases that are lifestyle related are called non-communicable diseases (NCDs). The World Health Organization (WHO) has reported that NCDs killed 41 million people each year, equivalent to 71% of all deaths globally. Cardiovascular diseases account for most of the deaths or 17.9 million people annually, followed by cancers with 9.0 million, diabetes (1.6 million) and respiratory (3.9 million). There is no doubt that since Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19), millions have died from this virus-some countries have reported up to five million covid-19 deaths in two years, but it is believed that global excess deaths are estimated to double the figures. However, lifestyle diseases continue to be the major cause of deaths in every country worldwide including Jamaica. The good news is that many of these NCDs can be prevented or reversed.

During the period under review, East Jamaica Conference Health Ministries continued to hold up before the constituency the principles of health reform, which is Bible-based and is supported by the Spirit of Prophecy. In our messages we encourage everyone to focus on the importance of plant-based diet; the practice of the eight laws of health; the eight healthy habits, CELEBRATIONS and many more. Let us look at some activities that took place during the quadrennium.

GOAL AND OBJECTIVES

GOAL

Every member of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in East Jamaica Conference is to present the Health Ministry, focusing on the healing ministry of Jesus and using it as a wedge to enter areas where the gospel must be preached, to motivate and sensitize every member to practice healthy lifestyle.

MAIN OBJECTIVE

To train local church members and leaders in conducting a credible and effective health outreach programme in their churches and communities, and to make changes in their lifestyle.

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

The Department's specific objectives were to:

1. **Increase the membership of the Adventist Health Volunteers Association (AHVA) by 70%.**
2. **Help decrease substance abuse in the communities served by the church by 10%.**
3. **Increase the promotion of health evangelism in EJC by 80%.**
4. **Foster the awareness of practising a healthy lifestyle in children.**
5. **Develop in our members an interest in exercise and fitness.**
6. **Educate and teach 90% church members how to prepare vegetarian dishes.**
7. **Baptise 100 new members each year as result of Health Ministries.**
8. **Increase the services offered by the EJC clinics to 90% of the communities they serve.**
9. **Increase the number of health clinics and services offered through our Health Professional Association by 30%.**
10. **Increase awareness of family life, men and women health issues.**
11. **Develop interest in the study of SDA health classics, such as Ministry of Healing and Counsels on Diet and Foods.**
12. **Conduct health promotion and health education in the SDA churches in EJC.**

13. **Assist our pastors and workers in making lifestyle changes in keeping with the health principles of the church.**
14. **Educate the Jamaican society with regards to our health message through radio and the print media.**
15. **Train 100 persons to be Medical Missionaries each year.**

ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

The 2018-2019 theme was Wholistic Health for Personal and National Transformation. The following are some of the activities that took place during the period under review. Health projects reported:

Health Days and Health Weeks

Our health days and health weeks have always been times of inspiration and education for our members. Sermons and health materials were issued to the churches. Many churches invited guest speakers, such as Medical Doctors, Health Educators to assist with their activities. Seminars, workshops, health marches, health clinics and health walks were conducted by our churches. We had four Health days and four Health Weeks over the four years under review.

Major Health Expos

On November 22, 2018, zone 1 (churches in Kingston and parts of St. Andrew) conducted their health expo in the St. William Grant Park, Downtown, Kingston. Many churches in the zone were involved. Over 800 persons received health checks and many were invited to the prayer tent and

tion (AHPA), as well as other SDAs and non-SDAs. An internationally recognized certificate and a manual were issued to each successful trainee.

5K/1.5K Health Run/Walk

In June 2019, EJC embarked on its 19th 5K/1.5K Run/Walk as an annual event that is conducted by the Health, Youth and Children's Ministries Departments. Over 1,000 young and older participants were involved in the event. The objectives of the event was to sensitize all participants concerning the importance of keeping one's body fit and healthy. Several participants won either gold, silver or bronze medal. Participants ranged from age six to 80 years old. The event attracted persons from all walks of life including some government and non-government organizations (NGOs).

received prayer along with health magazines. The Andrew Memorial Hospital, Andrews Memorial SDA Church and Adventist Laymen's Services & Industries (ASI) conducted an expo at Emancipation Park in Kingston on January 27, 2019. Many persons received medical attention and several educational pamphlets on health. Also, on February 3, 2019, the Good Samaritan Inn (GSI), EJC and Andrews Memorial SDA Church conducted a health expo at the GSI where over 400 persons received medical attention and several educational health pamphlets. Then on February 7, 2019, zone 4 (St. Thomas) conducted a health expo at the Rudolph Elder Park in Morant Bay where 200 persons received health checks and helpful information from the various booths that were present.

A Health Ministries consultation was held each year EJC with over 91 Health Ministries Leaders from our local churches in attendance.

First Aid, CPR and AED Training

First Aid, CPR and AED training was conducted between 2018 and 2019 at the EJC boardroom where 38 members and non-members were trained and certified as First Aiders and First Responders including two members of the EJC staff. Also, since the COVID-19 pandemic, 16 members and non-members were trained at the V. H. Percy Centre including one EJC staff member. Each training session covered 16 hours in two days. The First Aiders and First Responders are members of the Adventist Health Volunteer Association (AHVA), Adventist Health Professionals Associa-

Health Ministries Certification Programme, July and October 2019

Over 40 Health Ministries Directors from the local churches were trained and certified by the EJC Health Ministries Department in the area of health promotion level one, covering subjects such as: medical terminologies, how to give health talks, hygiene in food preparations, planning health programmes, expos, history of health reform, role and function of the local Health Ministries Directors, anatomy, physiology, and nutrition.

Mental Health and Grief and Recovery Seminars

In October 2019 the EJC Health Ministries Department conducted a mental health seminar in the EJC boardroom with over 70 attendees. Presentations were done on Identifying Dementia and Alzheimer's; *Identifying and Prevention of Suicide*; *How to Deal with Depression*; and *Identifying Mental Health in Children*. The presenters were Dr. Ishtar Govia from STRIDE Jamaica; Elder Leon Nooks from the Bellevue Hospital and Ms. Shelly-Ann Shaw.

In March 2022 during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Grief and Recovery Seminar was conducted on the Zoom platform as a joint effort with the EJC Family Ministries; over 100 persons were online. The presenters were: Guidance Counsellors - Mrs. Janet Grant and Mrs. Taniesha Goodlitt; Family Ministries Director, Dr. Roy Dennis (JAMU) and Chaplains -Pastor Alton Heslop and Dr. Kevin White. The topics covered were: Breaking the News; Journey of Grief; Emotional Psychology, Trauma & Grief and Grief Management.

Health Summit 2019

During the period November 28 – 30 the EJC Health Ministries Department and the Adventist Health Professionals Association (AHPA) in association with the Jamaica Union (JAMU) Health Ministries Department conducted health summit 2019 at the Kencot SDA Church in EJC.

The theme was “Wholistic Health for Personal and National Transformation” and the guest speakers were Mrs. Belkis Archbold, Health Ministries Director (HMD) of the Inter-American Division (IAD) and Professor Jason Aragon, Academic Dean at the School of Public Health at Montemorelos University in Mexico. Three days of presentation were made on “Fit for Life” Cancer Prevention, Grief and Loss

and its Impact on NCDs; How to Prevent and Deal with NCDs Through Nutrition, Obesity in Children and Adolescence, and Comprehensive Health Ministries. The summit was well supported by members and non-members. The presenters were Dr. Dudley Hosin, Health Ministries Director at JAMU; Dr. Michelle Hamilton, President of AHPA; Dr. Fred Sergile; Dr. Claudine Anderson-Atkinson; Mrs. Cordell Dallas and Dr. Heron Grant.

WORKERS' HEALTH

East Jamaica Conference saw the importance of investing in its workers' health. As a result, two very important pieces of equipment, Micro Current and Alkalizer Water Machines, were bought by the Conference to help enhance the health of the workers and church members, which also was extended to non-members at a small fee. Two persons were trained to operate these machines; one member of staff and one health professional. The results have been looking very good based on the testimonials of those who benefited from its usage.

1. **The Micro Current Machine helps to enhance overall wellness and also helps persons who are recovering from injuries and surgeries. It energizes the body cell and aids them to function in an optimal manner and heals the body.**
2. **The Alkalizer Water Machine is reconstructed water where all the artificial compounds are removed to help maintain a perfect “ph” range balance of the body.**

EVANGELISM

In August 2018, over 60 persons from St. Thomas to Kingston and St. Andrew registered for the Lay Medical Missionary (MM) Course which covered subjects such as: Massage Therapy, Hydrotherapy, Natural Home Remedies, among others as well as practicum and assignments. However, only 40 of the 80 graduated from the School of Evangelism on April 27, 2019. Some of the 40 persons were also trained in the school as Bible Counsellors, Lay Preachers and Sabbath School Teachers. I am happy to report that many of the students have gone on to start their own small businesses such as health food shops, health entrepreneurs, Home Health Aide and Health educators; while some persons have gone on to conduct Lay Preachers' campaigns and souls have been won to Christ as a result of the evangelistic efforts of these graduates.

Medical Missionary/Comprehensive Training

East Jamaica Conference (EJC) Health Ministries Department conducted a six-week MM training (July 14 – August 18, 2019). Over 60 persons were trained in the areas of Massage Therapy, Hydrotherapy, Natural and Herbal Remedies, preparing vegetarian dishes, food preparation, Health Evangelism, nutrition, physiology and anatomy, lifestyle disease and risk reduction, basic first aid, medical terminologies, methods of cross cultural communication, and many more. Special thanks to our 16 instructors for their invaluable time and sacrifice.

The Health Ministries Department started the year, 2020, with strong intentions to accomplish its goal and objectives as outlined in its strategic plan. The emphasis was on Health Evangelism and the theme was “Let’s go Back to Eden.” The recommended text book for reading was Counsels on Food and Diet by Ellen G. White.

We were able to accomplish all the activities we had outlined in the EJC calendar of events for the first quarter. Unfortunately, we were awakened to a new norm in March; at that time, we were informed that COVID19 virus had touched down on Jamaica soil. As a result, the Department had to make a radical adjustment to its programmes and we were now communicating all our activities on social media in order to observe the Ministry of Health and Wellness’ protocols. With these new health protocols, we have had to collaborate with other departments of the Conference, churches, institutions and Jamaica Union Conference (JAMU). In this report, a summary of some of the activities done by the Health Ministries Department of this Conference in collaboration with the local churches and JAMU Health Ministries.

LOCAL CHURCHES HEALTH MINISTRIES DIRECTORS:

1. worked with other departments in distributing food and care packages;
2. made health presentations and gave health tips;
3. One member opened a health food store and helped the community members to change their way of eating;
4. Some local Health Ministries Directors are Medical Missionaries who helped persons with serious health issues such as cancers and have gotten encouraging results from treatment given.
5. In April 2020, majority of the local directors prepared the churches for reopening and had put in place the Ministry of Health and Wellness’ (MOHW) protocols.
6. EJC had a zoom meeting with over 200 persons outlining the protocols from the MOHW with presenter Elder Michael Williams from the MOHW and Whitehall Avenue SDA Church.
7. We started preparation for the hurricane season and had selected a disaster committee in which the local church directors would become an integral part of the committee.
8. Some local church health directors have been filling prescriptions for the elderly of the church and the church community.
9. Dr. Michelle Hamilton also made a presentation to our pastors on COVID-19 and its effects on the church members.

OTHER HEALTH ACTIVITIES

1. A Paraprofessional training was done by Northern Caribbean University (NCU) and Jamaica Union Conference (JAMU) Health Ministries Department in Basic Counselling Skills. Eighty percent local Health Ministries Directors (HMDs) benefitted and approximately 40% invited non-Adventists on the zoom platform.

2. **Some activities conducted by local churches' HMDs included:**
 - a. **Webinars on health presentations such as exercise, women's health, men's health, and family health.**
 - b. **Reinforcing the health protocols such as mask wearing, temperature checks, sanitization and social distancing.**
 - c. **Assisting the elderly and children to purchase medications.**
 - d. **Distributing food items in their communities.**
 - e. **Mental health/First Aid training.**

HEALTH CLINICS

There are two health clinics that are under the umbrella of East Jamaica Conference Health Ministries Department: Trench Town and North Street Health Centres that are staffed and financed by the Conference. There are two other clinics, Penwood Dental and Medical and the Rollington Town Health Centres that are operated by the individual churches. The North Street and Trench Town Clinics continue to serve the communities in which they are situated. These clinics have been recognized by the Ministry of Health as the most outstanding in achieving a 90% immunization goal in the communities they serve. The clinics have a dedicated team of workers who not only display skills in their area of work but who also work under

adverse circumstances. The staff is supervised by Nurse Iona White. Other nurses are Mrs. Yolanda Morris Ebanks and Mrs. Jenice Montaque Bennett along with clinic assistant Ms. Marcia Young.

ADVENTIST HEALTH VOLUNTEERS ASSOCIATION

The Adventist Health Volunteers Association (AHVA) is comprised of a team of dedicated Christian men and women who render voluntary service through the Health Ministries Department, helping suffering humanity, both physically and spiritually. They consider health evangelism a tool that can be used to bring men and women to Jesus. There are two chapters in EJC: St. Thomas and Kingston. The teams conduct screening for blood pressure, glucose, cholesterol, eye screening of eye conditions such as near sightedness and glaucoma, foot care, height and weight checks.

Referrals to hospital are also done. Sometimes there is a medical doctor with the team to perform medical examinations. This team of workers are always available to serve the EJC and have participated in all Conference programmes, rendering first aid and emergency treatment. The Association conducts regular training and an annual retreat for its members. Membership is open to any Adventist who is in good and regular standing in their church.

The Men's Ministries Department of the Seventh-day Adventist Church was established to address the specific concerns and needs of the male membership population in our churches. It is an international Ministry aiming to support men in their roles as leaders, fathers, husbands, mentors and committed Christians.

The constituency of East Jamaica Conference is not oblivious of the negative statistics circulating in the world as it relates to the male gender. We accept the challenge with great zeal and commitment to be agents of change in the environment of our constituency. It is our desire to send a strong message to our women that we stand united in Christ, and with His help pledge ourselves to be better leaders, husbands, fathers, mentors and more committed to our christian responsibilities.

I assumed the responsibility of this office in April 2015 with a zeal to continuously embrace the vision of our President, Pastor Eric Nathan, in having a Men's Ministry in all 105 churches. To date there are 90 elected Men's Ministries leaders. Our first step was to elect a committee of men from the 4 zones to guide this department. Soon the machinery, got rolling, and we encouraged each congregation to elect their own executive committee to consist of the following personnel /officers:

1. **Leader**
2. **Secretary**
3. **Treasurer**
4. **Public Relation Officer**
5. **Chaplain**

The executive also had the option to elect other officers as needed.

The aim of the Men's Ministries is to engage the men in our congregations to become active and involved in church and family life. The East Jamaica Conference Men's Ministries holds a Conference Wide Men's Ministries day annually, and we also encourage each church congregation to do likewise. We also hosted a father/son symposium in 2018. Here we shared tips on father/sons relationship, with the intention to build a stronger relationship with father and sons in our congregation. We also gave incentives to fathers and sons who exhibited qualities worth emulating by others.

MEN'S MINISTRIES DAYS CONFERENCE WIDE

The highlights of Men's Ministries Day showcased to the congregation the innate potentials and abilities of our men. Some of the areas they were engaged in:

1. **Praise & Worship.**

THE "ALPHA" OF BEAMS

The idea of creating a formal structured mentorship ministry for our young males began in April 2013. It was born out of a need to partner with, encourage and motivate our young males to be more decisive in attaining and raising their standard of dress, speech, academic attainment and morals. The appellation, Brothers of Excellence Attaining Morals and Standards (BEAMS) is uniquely peculiar to the Jamaica Union and was born in the East Jamaica Conference.

The name was coined to provide a unique branding, meant to reflect the image that every young male should seek to portray. The name was coined to provide a unique branding, meant to reflect the image that every young male should seek to portray. The name BEAMS was suggested

by Bro. Dave Allen of the North Street SDA Church. His thinking was that, males, just like "BEAMS" in a building which give support to the roof or floor. In the same way young males should be mentored for the role of being "sturdy timber or metal" that will give support to the family.

The BEAMS launch took place in 2014 under the auspices of Pastor Glenville Carr, the then Family Ministries Director. Since 2014 the desire of the East Jamaica Conference constituency is to have a chapter of BEAMS in every church. Our Conference has linked the BEAMS group with the Men's Ministries group and has proposed that wherever there is the Men's Ministries, there should be a BEAMS Ministry. However, since its inception, until today it has been a struggle to realize this dream despite several efforts to motivate our young men to participate in the programme.

I wish to commend the various churches over the years



that have contributed to the BEAMS groups which were established over the period. This quadrennium saw a flicker in just over ten of our churches in which there has to be a constant fanning of the flame to encourage survival. The onset of the COVID-19 pandemic has caused the BEAMS Ministry to revert into a state of inactivity. The restrictions caused the closure of some of our churches and as a result efforts to mobilize the young men into action were stymied. Nevertheless, there were few activities which were done during the period.

BEAMS ACTIVITIES DURING THE QUADRENNIUM

1. **Executive committee meetings were held to formulate strategic ways to maintain the continuance of the group in our churches.**
2. **Men's Ministries groups were encouraged to form BEAMS groups and assist them.**
3. **The launch of the BEAMS at Morant Bay SDA Church, zone 4, Constant Spring SDA Church, and Kencot SDA Church, zone 3 on February 23, 2019, February 6, 2020 and March 27, 2021 respectively.**
4. **The BEAMS groups were active in Conference events in the local churches, such as Day of Kindness, Love in the MarketPlace, International Youth Day.**

“Solemn are the responsibilities resting upon those who are called to act as leaders in the church of God today” (E.G. White, The Acts of the Apostles, p. 92).

The Office of the Ministerial Secretary exists to ensure that the leaders of the Seventh-day Adventist Church who have embraced these solemn responsibilities receive support as they serve God and His church. The department ministers to the needs of these leaders within the church:

- **The pastors**
- **The pastoral families (spouses & children)**
- **The local church leaders (elders, deacons, and deaconesses)**

As its core mandate, the Ministerial Department of East Jamaica Conference implements strategies to empower, motivate, and support our spiritual leaders through continuing education and training, recognition and appreciation, evaluation, and spiritual growth programmes. During the quadrennium, this multifaceted approach to providing support to spiritual leaders aimed to achieve these strategic objectives:

- **To build spiritual maturity through doctrinal study.**
- **To promote personal and corporate witnessing/evangelistic efforts.**
- **To facilitate continuing educational and professional growth.**
- **To facilitate family enrichment opportunities.**
- **To facilitate strong collegiality and comradery among leaders in ministry.**
- **To foster the engagement of pastors and elders in mentorship programmes.**
- **To assist with the development of programmes to enhance preaching techniques, skills, and competencies.**
- **To encourage pastoral governance at the local church.**
- **To support pastoral internship programme.**

A) WORKFORCE COMPLEMENT & TENURE

“And I will give you pastors according to mine heart, which shall feed you with knowledge and understanding” (Jeremiah 3:15).

The conference has a complement of forty-four (44) pastors who currently serve as conference administrators, departmental directors, district pastors, and interns. One of the challenges the conference faces is the unexpected loss of pastors. These losses result in a gap in senior pastors for assignment to pastoral districts across the constituency. During the quadrennium, the pastoral workforce experienced loss through migration, illness, retirement, and death. Table 1 indicates the summary of the nature and number of pastoral workforce changes.

A total of sixteen (16) pastors are no longer with the conference. Two pastors and their families, Darren Murphy and Anthony Taylor, returned to serve as district pastors. Four (4) new interns also joined the team at East Jamaica Conference.

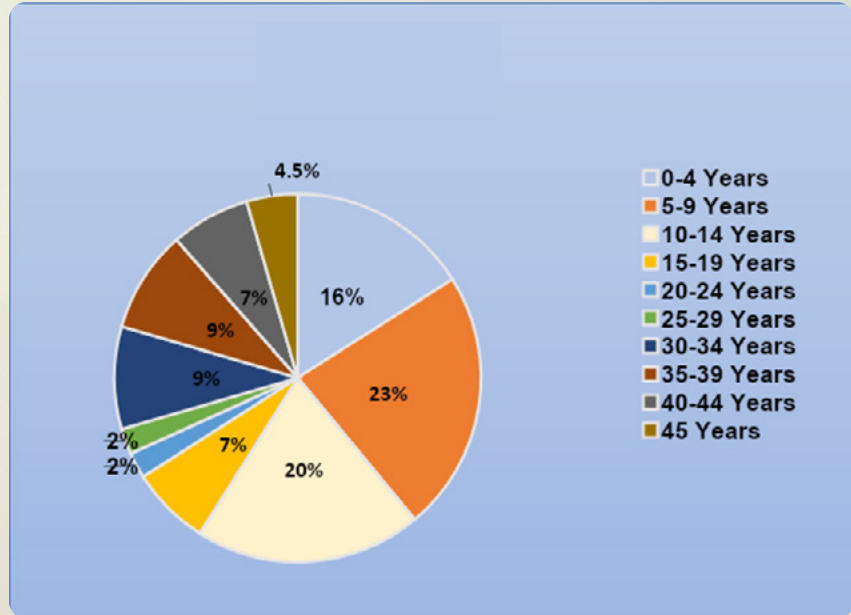


Figure 28: Tenure of Pastors

To a significant extent, the tenure of pastors ranges from 0-45 years. Figure 1 depicts the summary of the tenure of the pastors.

The highest percentage of the pastoral workforce has tenure of 5-9 years of service. Overall, 68% of the pastoral workforce has tenure from 0 to 24 years, while the other 32% of the pastors have been in pastoral ministry from 25-45 years.

B) ORDINATION OF PASTORS

“And he ordained twelve, that they should be with him, and that he might send them forth to preach” (Mark 3:14).

During the quadrennium, six (6) pastors - Sadekie Beckford, Ryandro Brown, Michael Lewis, Sheldon Schooler, and Brian Shaw - were ordained at the Kencot SDA Church on Sabbath, November 16, 2019. The total number of ordained ministers in East Jamaica Conference is now thirty two (32).

C) THE MINISTERIAL FRATERNITY

“The Lord has not qualified any one of us to bear the burden of the work alone. He has associated together men of different minds, that they may counsel with and assist one another” (E.G. White, TM, p. 499).

The Ministerial Fraternity comprises all pastors and ministerial graduates. The fraternity holds monthly meetings that facilitate the pastors:

- **spiritual growth and development**
- **social and physical interactions through sports and games**
- **professional growth and advancement**
- **exploration and comprehension of ministry-related issues**
- **Involvement in community outreach programmes**

The Ministerial Fraternity operates on an established constitution that allows for an annual election of an executive body. In most instances, the executive is composed of district pastors, primarily, because it fosters separation from the conference administration. Table 41 indicates the pastors who served as Presidents of the Ministerial Fraternity during the quadrennium.

D) PASTORS' QUARTERLY MEETINGS

Pastors' meetings are usually held quarterly. However, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the frequency of the meetings changed to a weekly schedule but later resumed the regular schedule. The administration and departmental leaders utilize these meetings to discuss work challenges, highlight outstanding performances, provide empowerment, and propose future targets. More specifically, this forum allows for:

- **pastors' evangelism reports**
- **administrators & directors' updates/reports**
- **discussions on current issues affecting the ministry**
- **seminars/workshops/lectures**

E) EVANGELISM REPORT

“Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you...” (Matt. 28:19-20a).

Collectively, the constituency had 5386 baptisms during the period under review. Zone 2 pastors had the highest baptisms (1539), Zone 1 had the second highest baptism total (1479), followed by Zone 3 with 1423 baptisms. Zone 4 had 945 baptisms. (Please refer to the evangelism report from Personal Ministries for a detailed summary).

F) CONTINUING EDUCATION & TRAINING

“Education should continue throughout the minister’s lifetime—A minister should never think that he has learned enough and may now relax his efforts. His education should continue throughout his lifetime; every day he should be learning and putting to use the knowledge gained” (E.G. White, *Gospel Workers*, p. 94).

Training is one of the tools to facilitate the pastor’s personal and professional growth. Equipping and empowering the pastors was a collaborative effort by the Ministerial Department of East Jamaica Conference, Jamaica Union, and Inter-American Division. These efforts included the pastor’s certification programme, K.G. Vaz Lecture Series, educational resources, as well as other seminars and webinars held during Ministerial Fraternity and Quarterly Pastor’s Meetings.

1) Pastor’s Certification Programme:

The annual Pastor’s Certification Programme initiated by the Inter-American Division forms the primary continuing education for all pastors and interns. During the period,

all pastors completed the twenty (20) hours required for certification which included training modules on leadership, family life, and stewardship. Each year a prescribed book is the primary resource.

- **In 2018, the virtual training for pastors focused on the review of the book on church leadership: “Dream Big, Lead & Make a Difference”.**
- **The book assigned for study in 2019 was “Joys and Challenges of the Pastoral Family”. As a result of COVID-19, we rescheduled the certification service to November 2020.**
- **For 2020, the pastors studied from “Making Disciples”.**
- **“Leadership that Transforms” was the assigned book for 2021.**

2) K.G. Vaz Lecture Series:

The pastors participated in the annual K.G. Vaz Lecture Series hosted at Northern Caribbean University. Since the Covid-19 pandemic the organizers offered the series virtually.

3) Resources

All pastors have access to resource materials for preaching, leadership, evangelism, and other content through the Logos Bible Software provided by JAMU. The department in collaboration with Jamaica Union continues to source and disseminate the Ministry Magazine which the General Conference produces quarterly for pastors. The conference purchased other books on leadership and other relevant



aspects of personal and church growth materials and distributed them to pastors. Additionally, training videos and other resource materials are accessible through the IAD platform, Everyelderinvolved.com.

4) Other Seminars/Training Sessions:

- a) **Based on the pastors’ evaluation report for 2018, the ministerial department facilitated three (3) training seminars to address the recommendations of the local church boards regarding pastoral training.**
 - i. **Pastor Pavel Goia, Associate Ministerial Secretary of the General Conference and Editor for Ministry Magazine, presented on pastoral leadership on December 7, 2018, at V.H. Percy Centre, Kencot grounds.**
 - ii. **On March 7, 2019, the pastors were engaged in another seminar with guest presenter Dr. Carlton Byrd, Speaker/Director of the Breath of Life Television Broadcast and Senior Pastor of the Oakwood University Church.**
 - iii. **On March 26, 2019, a stewardship seminar was hosted in collaboration with JAMU and EJC Stewardship teams. The encouragement to the pastors was to make stewardship an important focus of their ministry. The main presenters were Dr. Leonard Steele, Stewardship Director of EJC, Pastor Bancroft Barwise, then Treasurer of JAMU.**
- b) **At the Pastors’ Quarterly & Monthly Fraternity Meetings, presentations by guests include:**
 - i. **Coping Mechanisms during the**

COVID-19 Pandemic

- ii. **Accessing Benefits through the Ministry of Labour & Social Security**
- iii. **Applying for COVID-19 vaccine incentive**
- iv. **Navigating the New Normal: Refocus, Refuel & Renew**
- v. **Let’s Talk Ministry (from the perspectives of retired and senior pastors).**

G) Annual Pastoral Evaluation & Consultation:

The department continued its annual evaluation of pastors. The Ministerial Secretary disseminated the results to the administrators and local elders as well as to JAMU Ministerial Director. The EJC Ministerial team held one-on-one consultations to review and discuss the individual results with each pastor.

H) RECOGNITION & APPRECIATION

“Withhold not good from them to whom it is due, when it is in the power of thine hand to do it” (Prov. 3:27).

The dedication of our pastors in the East Jamaica Conference does not go unnoticed by the administration and directors. The pastors who continue to maintain excellence in evangelism and educational advancement receive commendations and in particular cases, gifts. Each year, we celebrated Annual Pastor’s Appreciation Day in October.

- **In 2018, the department in partnership with the Ministerial Fraternity hosted a special Sabbath celebration at the Mona Visitors Lodge**

- A similar event planned in 2019 did not materialize due to the outbreak of Covid-19. Subsequently, in 2019 and 2020, the department celebrated with tokens of appreciation to the pastors.
- On October 9, 2021, the Ministerial Department hosted a virtual celebration in honour of the Pastoral Families under the theme: 'Celebrating the Call'. Drs. Dolphy & Beverly Cross were the guest speakers.

Each year Jamaica Union recognizes a model pastor in the conference who would have demonstrated outstanding performance in evangelism and general pastoral care. Table 42 highlights the EJC Pastor of the year for the quadrennium.

PASTORAL FAMILIES

"It is not so much the religion of the pulpit as the religion of the family that reveals our real character. The minister's wife, his children, and those who are employed as helpers in his family are best qualified to judge his piety. A good man will be a blessing to his household. Wife, children, and helpers will all be better for his religion" (E.G. White, *Adventist Home*, p. 354).

The pastoral families - spouses and children - are integral to the success of the pastor's ministry. The highest privilege that can come to a young woman is being the wife of a minister. Her role in spreading the gospel is a sacred calling. The Ministerial Secretary provides support to the pastors' families in this regard.

The Shepherdess Association

"A sister laborer in the cause of truth can understand and reach some cases, especially among the sisters, that the minister cannot....These sisters are closely connected with the work of God, if he has called their husbands to preach the present truth" (E.G. White, *Gospel Workers*, p.212, 215).

The Shepherdess International organization is an initiative of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists for pastors' wives. The East Jamaica Chapter Shepherdess Association is an arm of the Ministerial Department. The association operates under the supervision of the Ministerial Secretary who provides a similar role to that of the Ministerial Fraternity. The Shepherdess Association has responsibility for the coordination of the Pastors' Kids. The aim of the Shepherdess Association is to work in collaboration with the Ministerial Department to:

- empower pastors' wives to demonstrate Christ's character for other women within and without the church.
- equip pastors' wives to execute their role as support workers in the Cause of God.

- serve as a support system to pastors' wives emotionally, socially, physically, and spiritually.
- cater to the holistic development of the pastors' children.
- provide counselling for pastors' wives and children.
- inspire pastors' wives and children to utilize gifts and talent in service to others.
- promote personal and professional growth.

The association conducted its annual election of officers to serve on the executive. Table 44 indicates the presidents during the quadrennium.

A) CONTINUING EDUCATION & TRAINING

1) Seminar

The Inter-American Division recommended the study of the book, *The Joys and Challenges of the Pastoral Family*, as the main resource for the 2020 certification programme. The pastors and their wives submitted a book report to highlight their takeaways from the material. Jamaica Union gifted the top three (3) submissions with monetary rewards.

The shepherdesses and their husbands participated in the virtual training held on November 15, 2020. The Ministerial Secretary of IAD and co-author of the book, Pastor Josney Rodriguez, was the presenter. The IAD hosted the virtual certification ceremony for the pastors and spouses on December 5, 2020.

2) Resources

The pastors' wives have access to online and printed quarterly resources that provide inspiring articles and stories geared to pastoral families (wives and children). The publications:

- **The Journal for Pastoral Spouses, from General Conference is an international publication featuring diverse cultural experiences**
- **Connected, The Journal of the Ministerial Association is an on-line resource publication for Pastor's Wives published quarterly by the Inter-American Division.**
- **East Jamaica Chapter produced its first issue of Virtuous Woman in 2021.**

B) SPIRITUAL SUPPORT & EMPOWERMENT

"And be renewed in the spirit of your mind" (Eph. 4:23).

To support the pastors' wives in maintaining her character after the Bible pattern, the department facilitates and collaborates with Shepherdess Association, JAMU and IAD to offer spiritual empowerment. This, the department achieved through the following programmes:

- **Prayer Breakfast hosted by the executive of the Shepherdess Association in 2018**
- **The Ministerial Department facilitated a JAMU-wide communion service for the pastoral family.**
- **From February 1-6, 2021, JAMU spearheaded a Week of Prayer for pastoral families.**
- **EJC Shepherdesses Association hosted a special biblical prophecy series for the pastoral wives and families.**
- **JAMU Shepherdess Association hosted Shepherdess Virtual Empowerment Convention on July 18, 2021.**

C) SOCIAL & FAMILY ENRICHMENT OPPORTUNITIES

The social support systems for pastoral families established by the church allow for a rich experience. There is mutual obligation and trust based on the pillars of Christian principles. The department hosted quarterly family enrichment events for the pastoral families. The Covid-19 pandemic affected the usual face-to-face interactions, however, we met virtually. A summary of the engagements include:

- » **EJC hosted Part 2 of The Joys & Challenges of the Pastoral Family, on November 28, 2020 - a virtual panel discussion with Pastor & Sis. Phillips, and the late Pastor and Sis Devon Osbourne**
- **EJC hosted the annual Pan Jam Sports Day on April 25, 2019, at Jamaica College grounds. Pastoral families across JAMU engaged in friendly competitions in football, cricket, and other games.**
- **The Ministerial Fraternity hosted a pastoral family enrichment retreat at Bahai Principe Hotel in Montego Bay from May 28-30, 2021.**

LOCAL CHURCH LEADERS

"A disciple is not better than his teacher. But everyone who is fully trained will be like his teacher" (Luke 6:40)

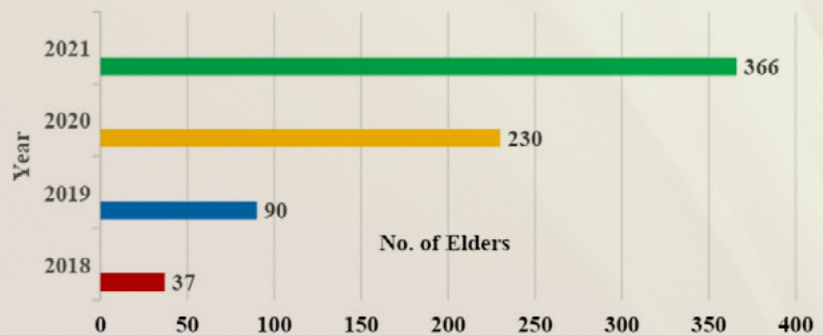


Figure 29: Annual Total of Elders Certified

1) Seminars/Convention/Congress

The Ministerial Department hosted three major events:

- **September 30, 2018 - Elders' congress on the Spirit of Prophecy at the EJC Board Room. The guest speakers were Drs. Robert Wright, NCU FM Radio Host and Director of E.G. White Research Centre at NCU, and Astor Bowers, then Ministerial Director of JAMU.**
- **January 20, 2019 - Elders' Convention at V.H. Percy Centre, Kencot. The late Dr. Newton Cleghorne made two presentations - "Ministering to Youths in the Church" and "Servant Leadership". More than 100 elders from zones 1 to 4 were in attendance.**
- **August 30, 2020 - virtual training session under the theme: "Leadership in Times of Uncertainty".**

3) The Heritage Quiz

The department in collaboration with the AY Department and the Elders' Association engaged the constituency in the study of the history of the Seventh-day Adventist Church and Prophecies from Revelation through the heritage quiz. The studies

culminated in a conference-wide quiz on September 28, 2019. Morant Bay SDA Church team comprised of Elder Patrick Bennett and family emerged as the

winner. They went on to represent EJC at the JAMU finals hosted by EJC on October 12, 2019. They placed 5th.

4) Resources

The department continued its distribution of Elder's Digest and other resources to expand the knowledge and practice

of the elder. Other available sources of information include videos and PowerPoint presentations on the IAD's Every-elderinvolved.com website.

C) RECOGNITION AND APPRECIATION

Annually, the church celebrates Elder's Appreciation Day in March. The pastoral districts continue their efforts to acknowledge and appreciate the elders within the local churches. In 2019 Zone 4 hosted an Elders' Recognition Service, where they awarded plaques to elders with outstanding years of service.

On March 26, 2022, the Ministerial Department expressed appreciation to 140 elders who gave 25-45 years of service as an elder. During the service, the zone leaders collected the certificates for the 366 elders who qualified for the IAD Certification.

THE DIACONATE

"For those who have served well as deacons obtain for themselves a high standing and a great confidence in the faith that is in Christ Jesus" (1 Timothy 3:13).

The body of deacons and deaconesses is a group of service-oriented church leaders. The work of the diaconate complements the work of the elders while embodying the example of Jesus' ministry.

A) LEADERSHIP TRAINING FOR THE DIACONATE

- The Ministerial Department hosted a historic Deacons & Deaconesses' Convention held at V.H. Percy Centre, Kencot grounds on July 7, 2019. 231 deacons and deaconesses from zones 1 – 4 attended. Dr. Joseph Smith, Ministerial Secretary, JAMU, Dr. Eric Nathan, President of EJC and Pastor Linton Williams, Executive Secretary of EJC were the main presenters.
- The Ministerial Department hosted a Deacons & Deaconesses' Seminar held at the EJC Board room on February 9, 2020. The theme was "Mission 2020, I Will Go". More than 200 deacons and deaconesses attended.
- The diaconate participated in a virtual training session on November 15, 2020, under the theme: "Leadership in Times of Uncertainty".
- On Sunday, February 13, 2022, the department hosted a seminar under the theme: "Leadership that Transforms". The four (4) intern pastors – RuPaul Livingston, Selvin Stewart, Damain Phillips, and Dwayne Blake – were the presenters.

B) THE DIACONATE ASSOCIATION

The Ministerial Secretary acted on the need for a structured association like that of the elders. Thus, a steering committee of deacons and deaconesses drafted a constitution and the first Diaconate Association formed in EJC on Sunday, February 9, 2020.

Zone 1-3 elected Bro. Kenneth Phillips of Rollington Town SDA, to serve as the president along with a team of other executives. Zone 4 elected Bro. Neville Bedward of Woodbourne SDA to the office of president with a team of executive members. The pandemic has since impacted the full functioning of the executive bodies.

The department of Planned Giving and Trust Services is integral to asset management and planning and also in the life cycle of each member of the church and the wider community. During the period under review, the department not only provided useful financial, estate, gift planning information and services but also discussed how to arrange care for children, elderly and individuals who are not able to make decisions for themselves. The department focused on five objectives during the quadrennium.

Objectives:

1. **To point to the Bible teachings which reveal God as owner of all things and individuals as recipients of His benevolence and stewards of His assets.**
2. **To present admonitions found in the Spirit of Prophecy writings regarding the steward's responsibility to God and family.**
3. **To encourage preparation of Wills and other legal documents, by sharing relevant, current information regarding statutes of law and tax matters, and directing constituents to competent legal advisors for drafting such documents.**
4. **To increase the number of members utilizing the services of the department.**
5. **To have an additional 20% of the church members make a Will.**

ACTIVITIES

A number of churches conducted seminars/webinars on Wills and Trust. Materials and information on Wills was given to the Planned Giving and Trust Services Directors in the churches.

STEWARDSHIP, PLANNED GIVING AND TRUST SERVICES WEEKEND, NOVEMBER 19-22, 2019

The attendance was overwhelming with over 300 attendees; the persons impacted were Pastors, Elders, Trust Services and Stewardship Leaders. SEMINARS

PLANNED GIVING AND TRUST SERVICES SEMINAR FOR PASTORS

On Thursday, September 19, 2019, a training seminar was conducted by the EJC Planned Giving and Trust Services Department for our pastors. The presenters were Dr. Dennis Carlson, director for the Planned Giving and Trust Services Department at the General Conference (GC) of Seventh-day Adventists and Dr. James Daniel, director for the Planned Giving and Trust Services Department at the Inter-American Division. The topics they presented on were: Planned Giving

in Scripture, Wills – a Better Way and Giving Back Using Endowment – a Plan for Financing Institutions. Over 35 pastors and local church directors were in attendance.

Sincere Christian greetings to our delegates and distinguished guests and friends in attendance to our Sixth Quadrennial Session of the East Jamaica Conference (EJC) of Seventh-day Adventist Churches.

THE OBJECTIVES OF PRAYER MINISTRIES

The main objectives of the Prayer Ministries is to lead each member to have a closer walk with God. Each child of God is afforded this wonderful privilege. God allows us to approach him, anytime we desire. He desires us to be in constant communion with him as a friend to a friend. There, prayer is a privilege and a spiritual discipline.

The Prayer Ministries department is organized to assist in fulfilling the mission of the church, focusing on the strategic issues of Growth and Consolidation. Each congregation was asked to select a prayer coordinator to lead a prayer team which was empowered to meet regularly to consider the prayer needs of the church and engage members of the congregation to become involved in prayer.

I am pleased to report that all 105 congregations and companies in our Conference territory have prayer band leaders that we now refer to as Prayer Coordinators. The responsibility is theirs to select a small group of consecrated members to address the prayer needs of their local church, the Conference and community. This group is referred to as the Prayer Band. We will be accepting the recommendation to use this name instead of "Prayer Warrior" which was previously used to identify this group.

ACTIVITIES DURING THE QUADRENNIUM

DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE NATION

Every year, East Jamaica Conference invites and encourages each congregation to adopt the recommendation from Jamaica Union, to set aside the first Sabbath in August as a day of Prayer for the Nation and its leaders. On this day each congregation is to invite civic leaders from within their community to worship with their congregation where they may be acknowledged, invited to the altar and prayed for. Some congregations make gift packages of spiritual books for these individuals. Many of our congregations are engaged in this effort and work along with the Conference each year. We however did not have a day of prayer for the nation service in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Public Affairs And Religious Liberty

INTRODUCTION

To the Chairman, delegates, officers, pastors and members of the Church, greetings on behalf of the Public Affairs and Religious Liberty Department of the East Jamaica Conference.

What a privilege to work in the Public Affairs and Religious Liberty department of the Seventh-day Adventist Church ! Working in this department as an Ambassador for Christ is an honour.

We are the ones who build bridges, try to resolve conflicts, improve legislation, and defend those who are persecuted for their faith, as well as promote and protect religious freedom.

PURPOSE STATEMENT

The public affairs and religious liberty (PARL) department promotes and maintains religious liberty, with particular emphasis upon liberty of conscience. Religious liberty includes the human right to have or adopt the religion of one's choice, to change religious belief according to conscience, to manifest one's religion individually or in community with fellow believers, in worship, observance, practice, witness, and teaching, subject to respect for the equivalent rights of others.

The department not only works for the religious liberties of both individual church members and organized entities of the Church, but also supports the rightful religious liberties of all people. In view of the Seventh-day Adventist understanding of the "great controversy" and the climactic events of human history involving union of church and state, eliminating

the free exercise of religion, and resulting in persecution of the faithful remnant, the Public Affairs and Religious Liberty Department monitors and seeks to interpret prudently current trends that may reflect the prophetic scenario.

DESCRIPTION OF THE DEPARTMENT

The Public Affairs and Religious Liberty (PARL) Department was recognized as a Department of the World Church of Seventh-day Adventists in 1902.

This department is akin to the Foreign Affairs Ministry in a government, or the External Affairs department in many corporations. The Department works mainly with governments, internal organizations, and religious authorities. Our field of activity deals mainly with human rights legislation and we are called upon, on most occasions to intervene when our members find themselves being discriminated against in

schools and the workplace because of their strict observance of the biblical Sabbath.

The PARL Department could be, without exaggeration, called the “Foreign Affairs Ministry” of the church. We are the ones who build bridges as we try to solve conflicts which arise, especially with people of faith in the workplace.

OBJECTIVES

- To promote Religious Liberty Day and media programs.
- To strengthen and enrich the spiritual lives of all our members.
- To encourage religious liberty leaders to be involved in evangelism.
- To keep current and up-to-date with information concerning the rights and freedoms of individuals.
- To share resource material with Religious Liberty Leaders to assist them to gain a better understanding of their role in the church.
- To increase the number of PARL Leaders in our churches who are engaged to the extent that they will provide the support for this department in their church.
- To increase the awareness of our general membership of the importance of religious freedom to the existence of the church.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

Below are some of the important accomplishments during the Quadrennium (2018 – 2022) that have served to keep the matter of Religious Liberty alive in the Conference and churches across the constituency:

1. Promoted Religious Liberty Day across the constituency each year in January as required by the world church except this year when the emphasis was made in April 2022 in order for the focus not to conflict with the Footprints of Hope Campaign which was held from January - February 2022.
2. Held Religious Liberty Consultations and / or Workshops each year.

3. Reintroduced the “Ambassador Training Program” in EJC - 2019
4. Defended the rights of members who were faced with challenges at work and school, due to their observance of the Seventh-day Sabbath.
5. Collaborated with West Jamaica Conference to have joint Religious Liberty Congress on January 15, 2021 via EJC Virtual Church.
6. Held Religious Liberty Day Service on EJC Virtual Church on April 9, 2022.

Religious Liberty Consultations and Training

During the period, consultations were held each year and leaders were sensitized with the objectives of the depart-

children who continue to suffer harassment, discrimination, and even imprisonment or physical harm, because they choose faithfulness to God, no matter what.

Religious Liberty day was celebrated in 2022 on April 9 and not on January 15 like the rest of the world. This change was made to give full focus and attention to the Union Wide Footprints of Hope campaign which began in January this year. We thank those churches that impressed their church boards to join with East Jamaica Conference for this special Religious Liberty emphasis.

Religious Liberty under threat but few cases being reported

One of the significant activity of the Public Affairs and Religious Liberty Department is to defend the rights of our members when it is being threatened. The current situation in the world sees countless individuals living in fear of losing their jobs, of being harassed and in extreme cases being killed because they made the decision to exercise their right to choose a religion of their choice.

During this quadrennium the number of religious liberty cases brought to my attention by pastors and members were relatively low (less than 10). Most of the cases were resolved when the member was confirmed to be a member of the Seventh-day Adventist Church with a written letter either from the church pastor or from the PARL director of the Conference.

There is cause for concern though as I have seen on more than one occasion that members of our church succumb to the request to turn up for work during the Sabbath hours when they are pressed to do so by their employers. This poses a problem for Adventists who decide to stand up for what they believe. When this happens, the faithful member is seen as a trouble maker in the organization as management usually point to other Seventh-day Adventists who willing work during the Sabbath hours without any problem.

I am grateful to God that here in Jamaica we have the support of the Constitution that guarantees freedom of religion and which gives us the freedom to gather and to worship. We still have the challenge where members are being denied work opportunities because of their request for time off on Saturdays to worship the Lord.

RELIGIOUS LIBERTY INFRINGEMENT

The attitude of the East Jamaica Conference Administration towards Religious Liberty is very positive and high commendation must be given to Pastor Eric Nathan and his fellow administrators for the level of support that was given by the administration to a new member who fell into difficulty with her employer in 2021. The case tested the mettle of the Conference administrators and confirmed their willingness to act in defence of our members.

This particular case involves someone who became converted by the Holy Spirit to become a member of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in 2021. The person was working with an organization for more than four years before she became exposed to the teachings of the Bible which led her to become an Adventist. She decided by faith in the Lord to be obedient to his words and cease working on the Sabbath. She requested her employer to accommodate her Sabbath observance by allowing her to have Saturday off as her rest day but they flatly refused. After her baptism, she decided not to attend work on the Sabbath and her employer subjected her to disciplinary proceedings with the view to dismissal.

The employer, realizing that the member was not alone but had the full support of the East Jamaica Conference and faced with a long legal process to resolve the matter, sought to arrive at an amicable settlement of the Sabbath observance dispute at the workplace.

Settlement terms were arrived at with her employer but the matter is not completely resolved as the employer wanted the member and the Adventist Church to be silent and not speak about the matter after the settlement terms were fully implemented. The Church has refused Satan's tactic to

silence the member and the Church about Sabbath observance and faith in the Lord

As the Conference and member approach the implementation of the final aspects of the settlement, we specifically ask for your prayers for victory, that the testimony of the member on faith and Sabbath observance will not be muzzled and that the Lord will be glorified as a result of the settlement with the employer.

Both Attorney Wendel Wilkins and myself attended several meetings that were held between the member and her employers during the tribunal hearings. I was there as her spiritual advisor and representative from the church, while Bro. Wendel Wilkins was her lawyer who guided her throughout the process.

Recommendations

I strongly recommend that our pastors ensure that someone is elected to fill the Public Affairs and Religious Liberty leader position in every church. The records I have suggests that less than 40% of our churches have a named leader for this post over the past four years. There is much room for improvement in this area of the work in our churches.

The next recommendation I have is for more of our churches to spend time to educate our members on the importance of religious liberty to the very survival of our churches. Our members need to be educated more in this area and in so doing more of our members will be encouraged to be strong and faithful to the Lord when the times of testing come their way.

Finally there is the ongoing need to increase public education and dialogue between administrators of tertiary insti-

tutions and the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Jamaica. The JAMU PARL director and Administrators may need to play the leading role in this regard.

Conclusion

The challenges that confronted us over the past four years, and how they turned out makes it easy for me to conclude that the Lord is on our side. Apart from the case with the member who had the religious liberty infringement last year, all other cases that was brought to my attention had an amicable resolution. It has been my experience that much can be accomplished with prayer and dialogue. My advice to every member is for us to place all our situations and challenges before the Lord in prayer and ask for his direction. He is more than willing and ready to help us resolve our problems because he cares for us. (1 Peter 5:7).

I thank God for his leading in this work over the PARL department during 2018 - 2022. The past four years came with their challenges including the disruption of regular face to face activities due to government imposed lock downs and restrictions on the number of people who were allowed to gather in their churches.

INTRODUCTION

Mr. Chairman, distinguished guests from the wider organizations, visiting workers from our sister Conferences and institutions, delegates and friends to the 6th Quadrennial Session, fellow workers, Greetings!

“The Publishing Ministries was established by the direction of God and under His special supervision. It was designed to accomplish a specific purpose; Seventh-day Adventists have been chosen by God as a peculiar people... He has made us his representatives. The greatest wealth of truth ever entrusted to mortals, the most solemn and fearful warnings ever sent by God to man have been committed to them to be given to the world our publishing houses are amongst the most effective agencies.” The PM, p. 42.

Stretching across the beautiful, green landscape of East Jamaica are 105 houses of worship where approximately 70,000 Seventh-day Adventists meet on Sabbaths and weekdays for worship. We also boast schools, hospitals and health centers.

The question is, how did this all begin? Through the publication of course - the light that Ellen White saw circling the earth. In 1890 a Literature Evangelist, William Arnold, in Antigua sold a book, “The Coming King,” to Henry Palmer, who sent it to his son, James in Jamaica. Shortly after, he found a tract from the same publishing house as the book he got from his father. Consequently, he sent for more publications and scattered them as “leaves of autumn.”

Dr. Ross of Kingston Public Hospital (KPH) got one of the tracts which he gave to Margarette Harrison, who was so excited she shared the information with her relatives and friends and soon they were worshipping on the Sabbath at her house and then to High Holborn Street in Kingston...the rest is history!

Evangelism through the publication was initiated by God in a vision given to Ellen G. White in 1840. After the vision she told her husband to “print a little paper.” It was shown that like streams of light they went clear around the world. This has truly been the experience of the Publishing Ministry. It is estimated that 808 of the new fields were first opened by Literature Evangelists.

August 21 - 24, 2019, East Jamaica Conference Literature Evangelists participated in the joint Congress in Curacao, along with the East Caribbean and the Netherlands Antilles.

SAMPLE ACHIEVEMENTS & PROJECTS OF OUR WINNING QUA DRENNIAL TEAM

Outstanding Evangelistic Achievements and Contributors include:

GOSPEL & HEALTH EVANGELISTIC EMPHASIS – 2019

Post Conference Session 2018 was a good opportunity for review and strategic planning. Hence, embracing our JamU leadership Gospel and Health emphasis, hundreds of powerful, community - building projects were implemented. Powerful Reaping Evangelistic Series by Pastors and Laity were multiplied. Examples include the following:

- **Evangelist Jeffrey Harriott partnered with Pastors Omar Oliphant, Michael Lewis, Christopher Atkinson and many consecrated members, baptizing 109 souls in the Bay Farm Road area.**
- **Pastor Melvin Francis, likewise, led others in Morant Bay baptizing over 65 souls in “Operation Rescue”.**

The General outstanding and dedicated work of all our various EJC participants, was especially recognized by the Inter-American Division and the Jamaica Union, resulting in the Evangelism Director and one of our Itinerant Evangelists (Jeffrey Harriott) being chosen and awarded participation in the delegation of an educational IAD, Holy Tour in 2019.

“I WILL GO” EVANGELISTIC EMPHASIS 2020

Under the General Conference (GC), Quinquennial theme, “I will go”, we began with great expectations and objectives for a massive onslaught against the enemy in 2020. Interestingly, we were organizing for a mega conference-wide online evangelistic series with Guest Presenter, Pastor Abraham Jules when Covid-19 announced its entrance. We were later reminded that “trust in God” must always be our watchword.

- **Visiting Lay Evangelist Hubert Tulloch joined with Pastors Melvin Francis and Ryandro Brown – baptizing over 62 wonderful persons in a tent series in Seaforth, Zone four.**
- **Elder Jeffrey Harriott with Dr. Alanzo Whyte and the Team from Zone One, followed suit baptizing over 63 precious souls.**
- **These two (2) programs historically signaled a break in the staging of major tent series, as we were rudely interrupted by the entrance of the pandemic in March 2020.**

COVID 19 VISITATION

Special recognition must be given to Sis Adiese Murphy with Elder Phillip Castell and the Communication Team for recognizing God’s leadership and our need of “embracing the change” in the use of technology as the new emphasis in the worship and mission engagement.

Thus, the beginning of world leading online worship strategies such as the JA Adventists Online, EJC Virtual Church, and many other online platforms mainly led by our dynamic youthful teams.

- **Jamaica Union led us in “Let’s Talk About Him” Evangelistic Online Series with speaker Pastor Dane Fletcher.**
- **A number of other virtually-staged evangelistic series and other programs continued to trend.**

Yet, our efforts were somewhat thwarted by the intensely intimidating impact of Covid-19, which resulted in many “lockdowns”, untimely casualties and loss of life. We join all others in expressing our deep regrets and continue in prayer for all the victims among our families and communities. But hereby, we are reminded of the dire urgency of our God-given mission.

EVANGELISTIC EMPHASIS, “I WILL GO” CONTINUED-2021

Despite the persistent assault of the pandemic continuing in 2021, we continued, under God, in resilience and determination.

The EJC PM Dept. Leader, with Pastor Sadekie Beckford, (Stadium Community Church) like several other Pastors and Lay Evangelists, went out in the heat of the battle, streaming online, from homes, offices and Church sites.

Via the EJC Virtual Church, our Young people under Family Ministries Leadership and the Music Department led the way in musical extravaganza as in faith, they claimed, ‘increase, it’s already done.’

EJC Virtual Church also staged ‘Christ, the Cross and His Coming Online Evangelistic Series’ led by three of our most outstanding Lay Preachers (Elders Noel Jumpp, Noel Morgan and Basil Powell) resulted in over 350 baptisms.

BREAKING THE EVANGELISTIC GLASS CEILING SERIES 2022 – IAD CENTENNIAL ANNIVERSARY INITIATIVES

Since 1922 – 2022, the East Jamaica Conference has played a central role, marking one hundred years in the ministry and mission of the Inter-American Division in this region. Hence, we are grateful for the privilege to be part of the “Breaking the Evangelistic Glass Ceiling Initiative” as we refocus with Resilience and a determination to forward the Advent message to our world in this ‘new normal.’

The staging of our first jointly conducted, ‘Footprints of Hope’ Evangelistic Series by the Five English Speaking Unions of Inter-American Division with our renown and beloved, International Evangelist, Pastor Glen O Samuels, preaching the word with power and authority. Our Division and Union leaders provided exceptional training, motivation and leadership to the vast number of passionate disciples, clergy and laity joining hands, resulting in “breaking the evangelistic glass ceiling” baptismal accessions of over five thousand souls. The East Jamaica Conference now continues to build on God’s blessing with over 518 precious infants won to Christ, in this program.

- In addition to the help from our Union SS and PM Dept., We have established a partnership with International Wheelchair donors and the Food for the Poor, thus enhancing and increasing our wheelchair distribution ministry to over three hundred (300) units and also other accessories for persons with disabilities including hearing aids, crutches and walkers.

In spite of these efforts, and more, however, we recognize that there is an enormous field of work to be accomplished in this area of ministry. With the thousands of disabled persons within our circle of influence and the unfortunate ill-preparedness of our cultural community, in relating to these vulnerable individuals, God’s call upon us is urgent and far-reaching.

POSSIBILITY MINISTRIES & THE JAMAICA DISABILITIES ACT

The EJC Sabbath School Department and some of our members have been very deliberate in seeking to carry on the ministry and passion of Christ for persons with disabilities. We have established the EJC Possibility Ministries; engaged our constituency in much training, education and special efforts in this area of ministry. Thankfully, we have partnered in the founding and establishment of the first church for the Deaf – (Portmore SDA Deaf) and a number of other relevant groundbreaking accomplishments to include the following:

- Introduction of training in Jamaica Sign Language (JSL) in Kingston & St. Andrew and in St. Thomas; Established Deaf Bible Class and Friend of the Deaf Training Program;
- Began preparation of Manual for JSL;
- Established Annual Possibilities Ministries Rendezvous (Social Treat) (every 1st Sunday – December);
- Departmental Leadership has led the way assisting the Jamaica Society for the Blind, distributing care packages and cooked meals for the blind and other disabled persons, for over two years, during the pandemic.

Thanks to God and President Nathan, a newly formed compliance committee, under the leadership of our noble chair, Lawyer Wendell Wilkins - has been recently commissioned and activated by our EJC Executive Committee. Every congregation and institution is being encouraged to do likewise.

BIBLE SCHOOL EVANGELISM

Bible School Evangelism, with the outstanding leadership of Elder Jennifer Dillon and many others, continues to be one of our epic means, seeking to engage the Church membership in “Total Member Involvement” in ministry and mission. In 2018 to 2022, we helped over thirty-five Churches to establish community Bible Schools. Through the EJC School of Evangelism, there has been much training and mobilization and the Bible School has been effective in helping to see thousands of persons studying the Word of God, over one thousand graduates and resulting in more than two thousand baptisms.

SMALL GROUPS EVANGELISM

Small Groups Ministry strategy and the Jethro principle have been divinely designed for all times. Thank God for the exemplary leadership of Elders, Noel Morgan (Small Groups Ministries Teacher) and Samuel Smiley (with “Business Unusual” Market Place Small Groups Ministry) who among others, continue to blaze the trail, in small groups training, practice and emphasis in this conference. The Seventh-day Adventist Church embraces the belief that spiritual gifts are relevant to the promulgation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. One of the gifts of the Holy Spirit is prophecy. The Gift of Prophecy is one of the ways God strengthens the church. The SDA Church believes that the Ministry of Ellen G. White is the manifestation of the Gift of Prophecy. The Spirit of Prophecy(SOP) is the literature or writings of E. G. White.

The Spirit of Prophecy Coordinator at the Conference aims to promote the study and practice of the Writings of E. G. White. The primary role of the Conference SOP Coordinator is to provide support to the coordinators in the local churches through training and sharing of current strategies and information.

The East Jamaica Conference Spirit of Prophecy Coordinator focused on three (3) major strategic objectives for the quadrennium:

- **Promoting spiritual maturity through the study and understanding of the Spirit of Prophecy.**
- **Advocating the appropriate application of E. G. White’s counsels.**
- **Facilitating continued education and professional growth of church leaders and members.**

The Spirit of Prophecy arm of the work twins uniquely with the Publishing Department of the Seventh-day Adventist Church and facilitated the natural collaborative relationship. In many local churches, the same person coordinates both departments. During the period under review, the strategies utilized to nurture and strengthen the spiritual life of the church membership and deepen trust in the written Word of God also incorporated partnerships with Northern Caribbean University (NCU), Jamaica Union (JAMU), and Inter-American Division (IAD). The highlights of the support provided through these partnerships are below:

CONSECRATION SERVICE

The consecration service hosted on Sabbath, January 25, 2020, saw the Spirit of Prophecy Coordinators, Community Services, and Publishing Directors in attendance. The Half-Way-Tree Seventh-day Adventist Church hosted the event. The event had the support of over seventy of the leaders across the constituency.

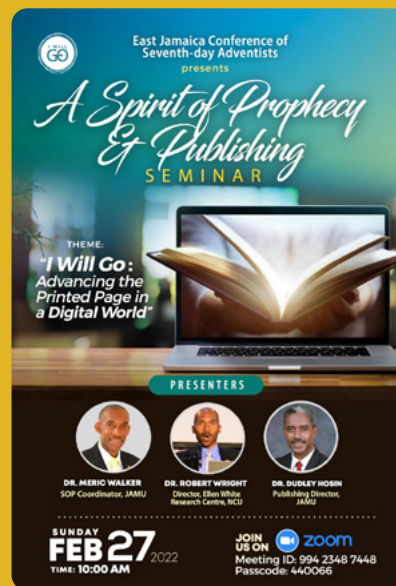

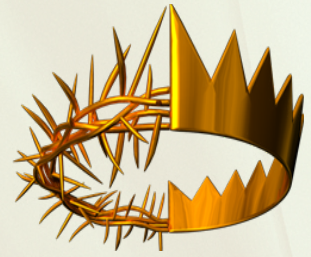

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Fundamental to our beliefs as Seventh-day Adventists is the teaching that God is creator, owner, sovereign Lord and ruler of our universe. Therefore, as stewards we are obligated to put Him first in every area of our lives. We must always remember that all that we have belongs to Him. We brought nothing in this world and we surely cannot take anything with us. Let us continue to be faithful.

It was a privilege and honour for me to have served the constituency of East Jamaica Conference over the period under review. I will confess that many times the challenges were overwhelming and at times the way seemed grim, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic but thanks be to God, we made it and the report will give you an idea of some of the things we made attempts to cover. I must express thanks to most of you who during the rough times you never give up on God or the church. Some have lost loved ones, some have lost their jobs while some almost lose their sanity, but through it all, you remained faithful to God.

With this in mind, we began the years under review with an aggressive educational and promotional campaign to assist members to remain on the Steward – ship; although at times it seemed as if the emphasis was on tithes and offering. I will remind you that we tried to cover as many themes and areas of stewardship such as Stewardship of the Body Temple, Stewardship of the Environment and even Stewardship of the family. Let us take a look at some of the things we tried to cover.

GOAL.

We are committed to teaching the principles of Stewardship throughout East Jamaica Conference in order that the members of each church will be motivated and challenged to adjust their lifestyle to that of Jesus.

OBJECTIVES

- a. **To achieve an annual increase of 20% in tithes above the current inflation rate.**
- b. **To have all churches adopt the Simplified Giving Plan.**
- c. **To certify all pastors, stewardship directors and local leaders.**
- d. **To increase faithfulness in each member in the areas of time, talent, body temple and treasury.**
- e. **To financially empower the members of the church.**
- f. **To provide information, resources and training for members.**

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Report on operations in some churches since the outbreak of COVID-19, March 2020.

WhatsApp, email and Zoom are the mediums used to contact, encourage and inform members of their stewardship responsibilities. Arrangements were made to collect the tithes and offerings through various means such as online payment as well as elders and pastors visiting the homes of members to distribute tithes envelopes and to do the collection.

Some churches were partially opened while others conducted their stewardship programmes and seminars on the Zoom platform. The Stewardship Ministries Department has been working with the Community Services Department providing care packages for members and non-members alike. Some members lost their jobs as a result of COVID-19, where some businesses were forced to close or downsize, but remained faithful in all areas of their Christian experiences. Most churches had a dip in their financial intake, however, by the end of 2020, thank God, we began to see an increase in tithes and offerings intake in the churches. Some Stewardship Directors created posters to use as educational tools to encourage members to be faithful in their giving.

STEWARDSHIP OF OWNERSHIP

Pastors' Certification Seminar

On March 26, 2019, a joint pastors' stewardship certification programme was conducted at our headquarters between Jamaica Union Conference and East Jamaica Conference Stewardship Ministries Departments. Pastors and Conference Directors were certified in the areas of budgeting and financial accountability and strategies for increasing financial stewardship. The number of pastors impacted was over 40. We give God thanks for our pastors and elders.

Stewardship Week, April 6 – 13, 2019 - Faithfulness

The purpose of the stewardship week was:

1. **to review God's ideal for His people.**
2. **to give consideration to stewardship principles as applies to life in total concept.**
3. **to make a call for revival, reformation and a spirit of sacrifice.**
4. **to provide opportunities for the church members to review their covenant with God.**

Each year the EJC Stewardship Department conducts two stewardship weeks; one in April and the other in December. During these two weeks, many churches conducted stewardship seminar, workshops, panel discussions on stewardship themes and Stewardship presentations.

MICRO-ENTREPRENEURSHIP TRAINING

The Stewardship Department in collaboration with the HEART TRUST/NSTA conducted a four-month training in Micro-Entrepreneurship on the Kingsway High School grounds and online with two groups; over 100 persons commenced the training, however, only 60 persons were assessed and completed certification. We are planning to continue the programme during the summer.

STEWARDSHIP REVIVAL WEEK, APRIL 18 – 25, 2021 ON EJC VIRTUAL CHURCH

The theme was “God First – Managing God’s Possessions”. Eight sermons from the Inter-American Division (IAD) were sent to all the churches with a nightly programme outline to be used in the revival. The Department started the week with a Business Empowerment Seminar, focusing on empowering our members to be self-reliant. The attendance on Zoom was over 90 persons. We ended the week with a Planned Giving and Trust Services Seminar with over 100 persons.

The Department utilized the Zone leaders on the two Sunday nights and on Wednesday night on the EJC virtual church platform; the support was overwhelming. On Sabbath 24th April we celebrated our Stewardship Convention and over 30,000 people tuned in on our EJC virtual Church. Our Divine Service speaker was Jamaica Union Conference (JAMU) Steward Director, Pastor Wenford Henry and a presentation was made in the afternoon by Pastor Bancroft Barwise. We ended the Sabbath with live testimonies from Elder Samuel Smiley, top Small Group leader, and Mrs. Mavis Burrell Spencer, owner of Spencer’s Tailoring, followed by Vesper Service from Elder Michael Porteous, EJC Treasurer.

There is significant room for growth as we seek to improve our tithe/offering ratio, and as the demand for non tithe funds increases, we must each ask ourselves, "Have I done my best for Jesus?" Remember that when we return the tithe that is the first part of giving. The real giving is that of a generous offering of one's total self.

The GEMS Ministry, started in East Jamaica in 2011 under the leadership of Elder Claudette Genas, can easily be tagged the youth arm of the women's ministry. The objective of this ministry is to establish strong collective mentorship support in assisting young girls, 12 years and older to recognize and utilize their innate abilities, while celebrating and affirming their journey from childhood through to womanhood and sisterhood.

SPECIAL DAYS

International Women's "Day of Prayer" in March, "Women's Emphasis Day" in June and "Endit Now Day" in August are observed each year by the churches. The sermons and relevant information to enrich and empower members in their spiritual walk were made available to all. Most Churches coordinated these activities during the quadrennium using the IAD package. In 2019 all 4 zone Women's Ministries Coordinators were awarded for their continued support and commitment to the department.

2018 – 2022 REPORT EJC GEMS COORDINATOR YVETTE CASTELL

The East Jamaica Conference (EJC) Girls of Eloquence, Morals and Standards (GEMS) Chapter had its genesis in 2011 initiated by Women's Ministry Director, Elder Claudette Genas. The JAMU Women & Children's Ministry Director, Dr. Lorraine Vernal, launched it in April 2012. GEMS, the youth arm of Women's Ministry, continues to grow since its inception with over 80 churches. The GEMS Ministry is coordinated by Sis. Yvette Castell from the New Haven SDA Church, and her assistant, Sis. Taneisha Goodlitt, from Johnson Town SDA Church

In April 2021 in the midst of the Corona-Virus pandemic, the GEMS celebrated ten years of GEMS Ministry utilizing the EJC Virtual church platform. GEMS and mentors were recognized and awarded for their dedication and commitment to the Ministry over the years. The first GEMS crusade was held over the period of one week in July 2021, under the theme, Going PR2 with the emphasis on Proclaiming, Reclaiming, and Retaining others for Christ. At the end of the crusade, one precious soul was reclaimed for Christ.

Between 2019 and 2022, the EJC GEMS accomplished several significant milestones as they continued to be involved in the spiritual, physical, mental, and social dimensions of the Ministry. Some activities held during the period were:

PRAYER AND TESTIMONY DAYS

Youth Week of Prayer remains an important part of the youth ministries calendar and typically takes place in the months of March and November. The youth department is pleased that many churches make it a period of spiritual revival and rejuvenation. In 2020, youth week of prayer took to the airwaves via EJC virtual church. Our Youth Ministries Director, ministerial graduate, and interns led out with dynamic preaching, ending the week with a baptismal service on March 27. The zones conducted Prayer and Fasting sessions under the guidance of their chaplains.

While we have reaped success, we do note the need for greater involvement of the youth across the constituency.

YOUTH CONGRESSOREE

Youth Congressoree is the signature event to culminate the year. The objective remains to focus our youth and youth leaders on the blessings of the past year and to be spiritually charged for the year ahead. We have been blessed with inspirational speakers who have challenged our youth to recommit their lives to Jesus Christ, to support the Church, and to be of service to their fellowmen. We continue to be heartened by the strong response of our youth to this appeal.

In 2019, under the theme “Divine Nature Activated (DNA), our young people gathered at the VH Percy center and were challenged by Pastor Amiel Summerbell, Youth Ministries Director from the North Jamaica Conference. In 2020, in the heights of the pandemic, Youth Congressoree was streamed live from the Kencot church via the EJC Platform.

The speaker was Pastor Ryandro Brown, then pastor of the Seaforth District. He challenged the youth to live the passion for mission. The day had its guest of honors Mr. Robert Miller, MP, and Senator Dr. Floyd Morris. At the end of the service, four of our youth gave their lives to the Lord in baptism. In 2021, Youth Congressoree was weeklong. Zonal outreach projects took place on Sunday, December 5. Zone 1 painted a mural in the park in Allman Town. Zone 2 painted the play area and the security guard booth at the Hagley Park Preparatory School. Zone 3 visited a Nursing Home in Stony Hill where they beautified the car park and garden area. Zone 4 distributed care packages and visited shut-ins in various communities. On Wednesday, December 8 there were online zonal fasting and prayer sessions early in the morning to seek the help of the Lord on behalf of youth who had left the faith and/or were on the verge of giving up. The chaplains of each federation coordinated this. On Friday night, the zonal vesper services were held in various churches across the zones. On Sabbath, the youth converged at the Half Way Tree Church to celebrate the goodness of God under the theme, His Will to do in 2022, YES (Youth Energized for Service). The keynote speaker was Pastor Oshain Stewart, pastor for the Hampton Court Church in Zone 4. The Honorable Alando Terrelonge, Member of Parliament and State Minister in the Ministry of Culture, Gender, Entertainment and Sports, and Senator Gabriela Morris, opposition spokes person on Youth.

Youth across the zones were formally recognized for their service and encouraged to continue to do the will of God in 2022. Commendation to the team for their hard work and commitment to the cause of God.

OUTREACH

GLOBAL YOUTH DAY (GYD) -

The primary objective of this program is the pursuit of a vision to recapture the reality of Seventh-day Adventist youth as a global movement. Youth are mobilized for service to contribute to the proclamation of the everlasting gospel to usher in the second coming of Jesus Christ. They go out into communities to “Be the Sermon” through acts of kindness to improve the welfare of those within and outside the church such as distributing care packages, building homes for the indigent, and constructing bus stops. East Jamaica Conference administrators also participated in the distribution of care packages to local business places around the conference headquarters. Over the years, some of the institutions that were impacted are Vineyard Town Golden Age Home, Bethlehem Golden Age Home, Maxfield Park Children’s Home, Denham Town Golden Age Home, and Sir John Golding Rehabilitation Center.

FELLOWSHIP

To ensure that leaders in every church, district, and federation, fully understand their role in equipping young people for service, a one-day workshop was conducted for Area Coordinators, Federation Presidents, and other youth leaders. This was facilitated by Pastor Charles Blythe, former Youth Ministries Director of Jamaica Union, Monday, April 5.

The East Jamaica Conference Youth Ministries Training Institute continues to be the ‘Bureau of Standards for the training of our youth. The Institute executes all the certified youth leadership training programs for Master Guides, Senior Youth Leaders, and Drill Instructors. Thirty-Four (34) have been invested to service the needs of our churches and federation across the constituency. The training school

was strengthened with the installation of a new principal in Maureen Campbell and a VP for curriculum in Karnette Batchelor Evering. The school continues to have oversight by the hard-working counselors and Christine Mundle who is an advisor to the Youth Director with responsibilities for Pathfinding and Master Guides. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the school provided online training and investiture services.

PATHFINDERING

In 2018, there were Forty-Five (45) Pathfinder clubs in EJC. This number decreased over the period 2021. Several Pathfinder clubs in EJC were dormant. The Pathfinder Adventurer Administrative Committee (PAAC) was formed to address this. However, it did not get off to the start that was expected due to the COVID 19 pandemic. After much prayer and consultation, the EJC Pathfinder club was formed to assist the struggling clubs, strengthen the strong ones, activate those in dormancy, and prepare the Pathfinders and Adventurers for examination. Under the leadership of the club’s director, Mario Jackson from the New Haven Church, and his team of counselors, the club was launched on November 21 and the first club meeting was held on November 28.

Despite the challenges, many pathfinder clubs had their induction and investiture services during the period under review. It is the hope of the Youth Ministries Department to have more churches actively involved in pathfinding.

I commend the Pathfinder and Adventurer leaders, for leading vibrant clubs over the years. Please keep up the good work as we intend to see an increased number of Pathfinders being invested.

PATHFINDER CYBOREE

The Jamaica Union Conference Pathfinder and Adventurer grand Cyboree virtual edition was held from March 29 to April 2, 2020. Several Pathfinders and Adventurers were treated with the online camping experience. They joined other Pathfinders and adventurers across the Jamaica Union field to celebrate these occasions. The special guests were Pastor Gary Blanchard, Youth Ministries Director for the General Conference, and Pastor Al Powell, Youth Ministries Director from Inter-America Division. Based on the feedback, it was a rich and rewarding experience for all who attended. Sincere gratitude is expressed to the committed and dedicated team of volunteers who made what seemed impossible possible.

YOUTH SPORTS EVANGELISM

The Youth Department continues to provide opportunities for youth to connect and share their faith through physical interaction. The pandemic presented its challenges, but with endurance, resilience, and determination we were able to use technology to overcome and have some sporting activities.

The youth of Zone 4, along with their pastor staged the first virtual sports day. This event sought to provide an avenue for the youth to channel their energies and foster camaraderie within the church and community at large while sharing their faith.

The Youth Ministries Department recognized the need for a suitable facility to engage our youth in wholesome physical activities. To address this issue, the Department decided to undertake the rehabilitation of the V.H. Percy Centre and the sports field at the Kencot grounds. The department intends to reestablish netball, volleyball, basketball, and cricket in our sports evangelism program. To achieve this initiative, we are currently developing the facility into a multi-purpose complex to accommodate the playing of these games. We are in collaboration with the Member of Parliament for the Ministry of Culture, Gender, Entertainment and Sports to have the project completed. It is expected upon completion of this complex, the atmosphere will be energetic with youth playing sports and sharing their faith.

SUMMER CAMP

In 2021, East Jamaica Conference hosted its first online

summer camp, "From Dust to Gold" The virtual Edition. This was held on August 4-8, 2021, for the Juniors (ages 5 – 12) and August 11-15 for the Seniors (ages 13 & over). As expected, there were challenges with our new online camp site, but, with the help of God, a committed planning committee, to include the EJC communication team, we pulled off a successful summer camp. We were encouraged and inspired by children, Women and Adolescent Ministries Director, Pastor Carolyn Brandon, and Youth Ministries Director Pastor Marvyn Smith both from the Guyana Conference of Seventh-day Adventists who served as the main Chaplains. District pastors along with interns assisted with the chaplaincy component.

ZONAL FEDERATION DAYS AND WORLD PATHFINDER DAYS

The decentralization and highly supportive and collaborative structure of the Youth Ministries Department is an important ingredient in the overall success of the department. Our Federations are the wheels that help to build the bonds of spirituality and social fellowship and facilitate our youth and their leaders to share in a cumulative experience. During the Covid -19, the federations continued to give support to the youth in their AY programmes and socials while observing the protocols under the Disaster Risk Management Act. The table below shows the Federation days and their speakers.

World Pathfinder's Day, September 2020 was celebrated on EJC Virtual platform under the theme "Reconciled". In 2021, the activities were done from the local churches promoting the importance of having pathfinder clubs in each church.

DRUM CORPS

This is another organized group within youth ministries over the period, they have been invited by several local churches, and civic entities to lead in various marches and ceremonies. The Drum Corps has grown over the years and there is increased interest expressed by local churches to establish their own. The EJC Drum Corps is assisted by the New Haven church in Kingston and Albion and Morant Bay in St. Thomas. Our Drum Corps has forged a relationship of service and mission with the Boy's Brigade. The vision is that soon the Training School will offer music training for the Drum Corps.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

The General Conference Youth Ministries Department created a mentorship for youth, adolescents, and young adults and coined the “PASS IT ON” initiative for adolescents, youth, and young. This program sought to equip, empower, and engage a generation of Spirit-filled youth to pass on the legacy of Adventism. One aspect of this program is Youth Leadership and evangelism which is celebrated throughout the month of November.

In preparation for this, each local church is asked to assign the youth to key roles/shadowing the church board, to lead out and to get a better understanding of how the church operates. The aim is to affirm our youth in the faith through training and understudying church leaders in their local churches. Youth leaders across several churches have executed the program with great success. Throughout the month, the youth the privilege to lead out in the week of prayer and by extension two weeks of revival. We continue to encourage the local churches to support this program as it provides an excellent opportunity to develop the leadership capacity of our youth and supports succession planning.

PUBLIC CAMPUS MINISTRY (PCM)

In 2016, the General Conference officially launched Public Campus Ministry. With over 80% of Seventh-day Adventists college-aged students enrolled in non-Adventist universities and colleges, the need for this ministry became evident. At East Jamaica Conference we oversee five (5) Universities and two non-Adventist Universities/Colleges. We have established a presence in most of these institutions by supporting their fellowships and fraternities.

The Youth Department supports the major program for worship and witnessing in these fraternities. The Adventist-laymen’s Services and Industries (ASI) and the Andrews Memorial Seventh-day Adventist church have partnered with the Youth Ministries Department in giving support to these fraternities. One initiative is the new student’s consecration service to start the school year. Since 2020, the service has been conducted on the EJC Virtual platform.

Phillipsfield Project - Phillipsfield Recreational Park and Oasis are the home for Easter and Summer camps and all youth recreational programmes. The story of the park has begun and we dream of its completion; however, the project needs funding. The department through the youth executive council met with the administrators and the chairman of the Conference Wide Development Management Committee (CWDMC) in October 2020 to chart the way forward for the completion of the project. One of the fundraising effort was crowdfunding.

Youth Connection App – This will be used

by the youth and youth leaders to receive information from the department on all-conference youth events and will allow the local youth to share information on all the youth events at their local church. This will help in planning and mitigating duplication in dates. The app will have a secondary feature which will be for the taking of reports from the Youth leaders of the local churches (e.g., the filling out of the blanks). This app is a work in progress and will be completed in short order.

Drill Manual in video Format – It is the intention of the Drill Corp Executive to create a drill manual. The team believes this will reinforce the techniques involved and will be useful and effective for trainees.
